Seven London fieldhouse records were shattered and one was tied as Marquette university's powerful track team crushed Michigan State's thinclads, 86-32, last night. Displaying tremendous power in the running events, the hilltoppers made a clean sweep of all the runs up to the one mile, and both hurdle races, and walked away with both the half mile and one mile relays. The Central Intercollegiate conference outdoor championships were 19 of the 24 events. In their smashing triumph, the Spartans bettered their previous records. Captain Bill Fehr lowered the mile mark to 4:27.7, and the eleven Dick Frey was checked in the one mile at 6:26 in the two mile.

Ag Board Revises Student Fee Setup

Tuition Raised to Forty Dollars Per Term; Affects All But Outstate Residents in Fall of Next Year

Graduation Fee Abolished

Michigan State college students will pay a basic fee of \$40 per term beginning with the opening of next fall term as a result of action taken by the State Board of Agriculture, college governing body, at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday.

The board also increased the out-of-state student fee from \$16 to \$20 per term for students enrolling after September 1, next fall. The out-of-state fee will apply until 1941 for students who enrolled previously to next September.

The new fee plan replaces the old method of charging a \$16 per term fee for out-of-state students. Under the new plan, the college will collect the \$40 fee per term, the following extra charges will be levied on the student's account:

- 1. Health charge.
- 2. Admission fee, regular student.
- 3. Miscellaneous charges.
- 4. Student organization dues.
- 5. Student organization dues.
- 6. Union building facilities.

The new plan will not include the State Board on the fee but will make provision for determining student sentiment on this question. The expression will be obtained from the student body during spring registration and will be presented on the basis of:

- 1. An assessment of 10 per cent for three years per year.
- 2. An assessment of 10 per cent for two years per year.
- 3. No fee for the State Board on the plan of the student body.

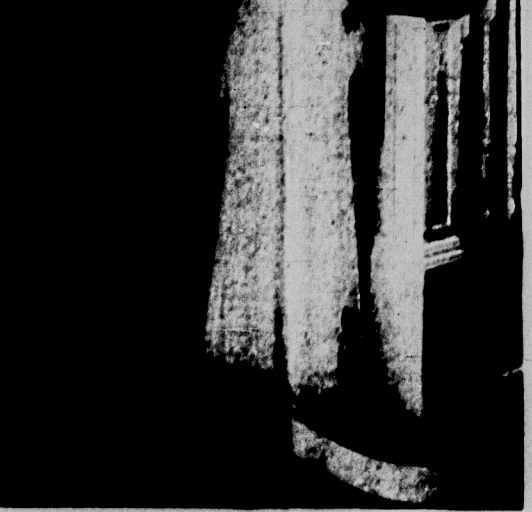

Russia Gains as Finns Hold Own; Germany Presses Rumania

Finns have held their front by weeks end, has moved back to include the industrial city of Viipuri. Last week Finland, for the first time in the war admitted Soviet gains. She has continued to do so though still holding her own, amid increasing pessimism as to her chances of outlasting Russia. An announcement came out of Sweden this week explaining her recent refusal to openly go to war on the side of Finland.

Fear of invoking Soviet enmity was given as the motive for refusal, while some sources outside Sweden attribute it to the fact that no backing was promised by the Allies. Russian bombs were dropped on a small Swedish border town this week, presumably by accident, threatening to awaken a concerted drive in Sweden for active participation.

Germany is taking steps to exert pressure on Rumania, who plans to limit gasoline shipments to the Reich. An economic embargo has been sent to Bucharest. Fear over the Altmark incident seems to have cooled down after Norway's avowal of a firm stand, defying British defiance, the government defended in a statement early in the week her freeing of the German prison ship.

Talk of cancelling Atlantic clipper ship stopovers at Bermuda was heard in Washington this week as resentment over British reversion of United States mail to the island increased. Armed British marines were said to have enforced confiscation of mails for reforwarding recently.

LONG MACHINE BROKEN

Twelve years' domination of Louisiana politics by Huey P. Long, long-time governor, was ended this week by defeat in state Democratic gubernatorial primaries of Gov. Earl K. Long, Huey's brother. He was replaced by a political newcomer, Sam Houston Jones.

July 15 was set this week as the date for the Democratic presidential convention to be held in Chicago this summer. Another state, Ohio, has endorsed a third term for President Roosevelt. High administration circles gave birth to rumors this week that Frank Murphy, latest supreme court appointee, may resign his post, about which he has never been very enthusiastic. He ran for the Democratic vice presidential nomination.

MCCREA INDICTED

That the heat is still on in Detroit's police department shakeup was demonstrated by surprise indictment this week of Duncan C. McCrea, Wayne County prosecutor, and Fred W. Frank, former police superintendent. Indictments handed down by steerman grand jury Judge Homer Ferguson, were on the basis of alleged conspiracy to operate a national baseball pool. Harry F. Colburn, chief investigator for McCrea, was also named.

Judge Ferguson traveled to Lansing yesterday to ask removal of McCrea and was expected to request the appointment of Chester P. O'Hara, special grand jury investigator, as special assistant attorney general to handle future grand jury cases. More and bigger things are to come in the investigation, O'Hara promises.

FLU BENCHES MAX FOR TOPPER FRAY

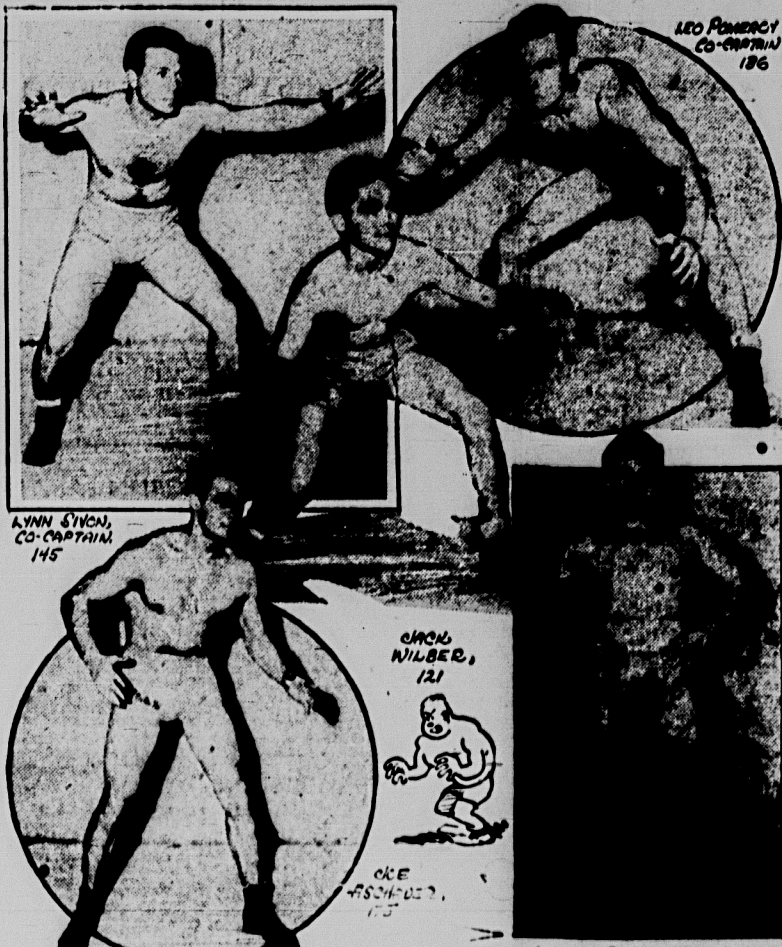
