Is Sweden next? That question, phrased by some—how soon?—has been on the lips of international observers all week.

Whatever the ultimate answer will be, events in Europe during the week are not encouraging to Sweden. Since Germany first stepped into Denmark 18 days ago, the invasion has been called by many an attempt to divert Allied attention from the western front and Balkans to clear the way for a surprise German-Italian move there.
