WASHINGTON, Feb. 2 (TP)—The biggest appropriation bill in legislative history—a 10 1/2 billion dollar measure for the Navy—has been passed by the Senate today without even a recorded vote, after an objection by Navy Secretary Knox that "every ounce of pressure" be put into getting more ships, guns, planes and ammunition as fast as possible.

CHONGKING, Feb. 2 (TP)—Information reaching the Chinese capital disclosed today that Japanese reinforcements were arriving on the Changsha and Canton fronts in China. Although the Japanese declared they intend to launch fresh offensive operations on the Hainan sources in Changsha believe the troops arriving in the Hunan may be merely replacements. The Japanese suffered heavy casualties in recent clashes with the Chinese at Changsha.

MOSCOW, Feb. 2 (TP)—Official Soviet accounts said tonight that a train from the Donets basin to Moscow has been reloaded in the advance of Marshal Timoshenko's forces. First trainloads of coal from the Donets basin already have reached factories in the Moscow area.

### Artillery Duel Rages Over Johore Strait

#### Yankee Fliers Hit Malayan Bases

SINGAPORE, Feb. 3 (TP)—For the first time in weeks, Singapore passed the night without an air raid alarm. However, three alerts were sounded early this morning.

The great siege of Singapore entered its third day early Tuesday morning, with the artillery of both sides engaged in a duel at fairly close range across Johore Strait.

At the same time, the United States Army air force went to work on the main Jap air bases in Malaya, the bases from which the enemy has launched his heavy aerial offensive against the island fortress.

#### War Lecturer To Show Films Of Far East

Thursday's war lecture, Arthur Menken, Paramount News and March of Time photographer, will bring 30,000 feet of film for his talk at 8 p. m. in the college auditorium including shots of the British base at Singapore, the Dutch base at Soerabaya in Java, and the U. S. naval base at Pearl Harbor.

#### JAPS TO TRY CROSSING

In London tonight, authoritative British quarters said the Japs probably would lose little time in attempting a crossing of the Johore Strait to Singapore island. But first it is expected the enemy will try to reduce the strong shore-line defenses with heavy aerial attacks. So far, no efforts have been made to cross the mile-wide stretch of mine-strewn water.

Two Japanese divisions, hurled simultaneously at the right and left flanks of General Douglas MacArthur's Bataan line, have been thrown back in confusion to night in 24 hours of the most savage action yet seen in the Philippine campaign.

#### USED PICKED GROUPS

With frontal assaults in progress, the Japs sent picked groups known as *Talaoi* to execute simultaneous attacks at several points along the west coast in an attempt to outflank the American and Filipino positions.

The whole operation of the past 24 hours indicated the execution of Japanese grand strategy for cracking the heroic defenses created by General MacArthur in the Bataan hills. The War department said captured aerial maps showed the Japanese plan and emphasized the urgency of the mission of the *Talaoi*.

### Students Ask Quick Action To Revise Defense Setup

Michigan State college students are going to do something about lagging interest in defense and defense courses.

That was the conviction carried out of last night's defense meeting as more than half a hundred students aired their views on the defense situation here.

#### Salvage Units Collect Paper For Defense

A total of 11 groups in East Lansing are now collecting salvage for national defense, nine of them combined with the East Lansing Council of Defense Salvage committee and two working on campus.

In East Lansing, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts, high school and grade school youths are actively engaged in the salvage program. Adult organizations sponsoring collections are Parent-Teachers associations, High School Mothers and Dads' club, and the American Legion.

On campus, faculty members and employees have been asked to save paper, to boxes and wrapping material such as boxes, and to cut down on pages of mimeographed material. Eighteen precincts of Mason-Abbott hall are collecting and selling waste paper, with net proceeds to go to the Red Cross.

#### Plan Exchange Of Diplomats

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2 (TP)—The State department moved swiftly today to complete arrangements for the exchange of diplomatic representatives with the enemy powers.

A department spokesman said the arrangements have proceeded to a point where an agreement in principle has been reached with the German, Japanese, and Italian governments. At the same time, the spokesman said that all official American representatives have left Hungary, Bulgaria, and Roumania and are now in Lisbon.

Smashing blows by United States Pacific fleet units and continued indomitable resistance by General MacArthur's Philippine forces were bright spots tonight in the war picture as the struggle against Axis aggression continued on all fronts.

A war department communication said that General MacArthur had repulsed new Jap attacks, with heavy losses for the enemy. The American and Filipino forces, badly outnumbered, still are fighting a heroic defensive battle.

A number of prisoners were taken in the latest actions, and General MacArthur, told the war department that the Japs have lost two crack divisions so far in attempts to break through the American lines on Bataan peninsula.

A later war department communication disclosed that flying fortress bombers of the United States Army air force smashed at the Jap-held airbases at Kuala Lumpur and Kuantan in Malaya. The American fortresses also struck at the Japs in Borneo and nine enemy planes were shot down.

The Russians, announced tonight that they had evacuated Feodosia, on the south coast of the Crimea, several days ago. The withdrawal was carried out to consolidate positions in that area. Elsewhere on the vast eastern front, the Russians said, their forces continued to make headway against the Germans.

### Blaze Drives 5 Students From Local Home

Five Michigan State students were among 12 occupants of a rooming house at 312 Grand River who were driven from their beds at 3 a. m. yesterday when a blaze swept through the dwelling, causing an estimated \$9,000 loss.

The fire, discovered by the landlady, Mrs. G. D. Greer, was believed to have started near the furnace and well underway before the East Lansing fire department arrived on the scene.

With the aid of a Lansing fire company, the blaze was battled for three hours and had destroyed the interior almost completely before it was checked.

Although the students expressed their thanks at escaping with their lives, they were reportedly greatly depressed over the fact that they were able to save almost no personal belongings. The East Lansing department reported that the approximately \$3,500 damage to contents was only partially covered by insurance.

#### Norway Envoy Denies Power of Quisling

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2 (TP)—Norwegian Minister Mogensstjerne pointed out today that the puppet government of Vidkun Quisling has no power or authority other than that given him by the German government.

Mogensstjerne issued his statement as a result of the appointment of Quisling to the position of Prime Minister of Norway, an appointment which was announced by the Nazi government in Oslo.

#### Conference May End Tin Strike at Gary

GARY, Ind., Feb. 2 (TP)—A CIO grievance committee met with recalcitrant reckoners tonight to discuss the wage slate, a slate that is holding up tin plate production for shell containers at the Carnegie-Illinois Steel Corporation, Gary, Ind.

Labor and management failed to break their deadlock at a long conference earlier in the day. The reckoners, 80 strong, are resorting to slowdown tactics to enforce their demands for increased pay on the strength of handling heavier plates. The demonstration has left 1,800 other employees with nothing to do but stay home.

### Buckeyes Swamp Spartans, 75-34, In Home Opener

Michigan State's track men were handed a 75-34 defeat by Ohio State Saturday night in the first indoor meet of the season. Both four Spartan firsts, should help team spirit as they go into practice pointing for the University of Illinois meet at Champaign this week end.

One point out of a possible 23 was all the Spartans were able to score in three hurdle races Saturday, as Bob Wright's power and speed gave OSU firsts in both low and high hurdles. The NCAA champion also raced in anchor position in the 240-yard shuttle hurdle relay, took second in the 75-yard dash, and third in the shot put for a point total of 15.4.

Field events accounted for two of the Spartan wins, as Bob Harris with a 13-foot jump in the pole vault beating out his teammate Ted Welch, who tied for second. Using a new technique of one-and-a-half one-pole on, Al White took first in the high jump with 4 feet, 7 1/2 inches.

The meet's only record came in the broad jump, when Walt Arrington's 1940 mark was bettered by OSU's sophomore Dallas Dupre with a leap of 24 feet, 13 inches. Hughie Davis placed second in this event but in the shot put the Spartans were unable to win a point.

The 800-meter record of 1:58.9 by Ed Holdeman of Purdue was tied by Gene Yates of OSU with State Sophomore Walt Mack crossing him at the finish. An even closer finish came in the quarter mile when Dale Kauffing carried five points for the Spartans, winning in 51.9 seconds.

The Spartan's top miler, Bill Scott, ran a better time than his 4:23.1 in Saturday's meet, but he took first place easily. Here again, as in the quarter mile and the 800, State was unable to place.

In the two-mile event taken by State runner Chubby Thompson and Maurice Hicks in 10:13.3-yard dash Hoche Davis, if that was the only Spartan able to place.

### Majors Adopt Two Cagers to Hit Road After Settling Score With Titans

Another big week end is in store for the Spartan basketballers, for two games in two nights, both away from home is the task facing Coach Ben Van Alstyne and his cagers.

Friday night they'll be at the University of Cincinnati and the following evening, 200 miles away in Indianapolis with Butler university their host. Joey Gerard, who had rung up 36 points in the last two games, was watched especially closely, but managed to get two field goals and three free throws. Titan John Biringier, who guarded Gerard, was teased out of the game on personal fouls in the second half.

Chet Aubuchon, who was Gerard's running mate at forward, was fouled three times in the last five minutes, when the Spartans were stalling, and the little point made good on all of his charity chances to sew up the game.

The best offensive performance was turned in by Mel Peterson as he connected four times on jump and set three times at the foul line. Pete kept the Spartans in the game with his sharp shooting.

The rebound work and timing of Fred Stone also stood out for the victors. Fred's height was a decisive factor against the much smaller V. of D. cagersmen.

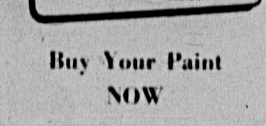
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### Colonels Cancel Tank Contract

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# Hawaiian Fleet Appears: Attacks Jap Naval Bases

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2 (TP)—Official reports revealing that the Pacific fleet has left its Hawaiian base to take the battle to the Japanese doorstep were interpreted today as an indication that the Japanese admirals will be forced to re-distribute their heavy naval units.

The American Pacific fleet cruised more than 1,800 miles to attack the Marshall and Gilbert Island bases which the Japs are using for invasion "springboards." Even though the United States Pacific fleet units found none of the larger Japanese ships, heavy damage was inflicted on auxiliaries and shore installations, the navy said.

Auxiliaries are vital to the Japanese fleet because they comprise "floating bases" of operation. Without them the Japs cannot

continue wide-spread naval operations.

In leaving these auxiliaries unprotected by warships, the Japanese are charged with a major naval blunder. Underestimating the striking power of the Pearl Harbor fleet, the Japs have employed their heavy units in areas far away from these strategic bases. As a result, the Pacific fleet has destroyed Jap tenders which will never again be used to refuel submarines, airplanes or repair damaged fighting vessels, the navy declared.

## U.S. 'Revenooers' Coming Around To Mount 'n Dew

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2 (TP)—The boom in the mountain dew business has led the treasury department to ask money for 90 additional "revenooers." It was revealed today in testimony released by the house appropriations committee.

Treasury officials said bootlegging had increased 16 percent in November and December of last year. The year 1941 saw treasury agents destroy 12,000 stills and almost 7,000,000 gallons of mash. The copper seized with the stills has been turned over to the government.

Commissioner Berkshire of the alcohol tax unit said he didn't know where the mountaineers got the copper for their stills. He thought the reasons for the current high popularity of "white mule, corn liquor and moonshine" lay in higher taxes on legal whiskey.

**Van Dusen Prints Study**

Prof. C. R. Van Dusen, of the department of speech and dramatics, is the author of "A Laboratory Study of the Metabolic Voice," which was published in the Quarterly Journal of American Speech Correction association. Dr. Van Dusen, who will become an army lieutenant next week, carried out the experiments for the article at Iowa State university.

## Professor To Study Bomb Protection

Prof. C. L. Allen, head of the civil engineering department, will represent Michigan State college at a ten day special course in War-time Protection Against Aerial Bombardments beginning Feb. 16.

Under the auspices of New York university, representatives from institutions throughout the country will attend technical lessons based on the experience of London in the past two years.

Courses to be given include study of the safety of new constructions, the remodeling and reinforcing for greater safety of old structures, and blackout problems. The latter will be given under the combined auspices of General Electric and Westinghouse Electric companies.

Upon completion of the course, Allen will return to organize forces for bombardment protection in this vicinity.

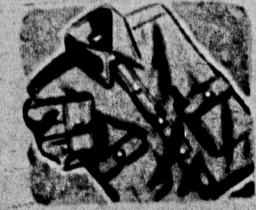

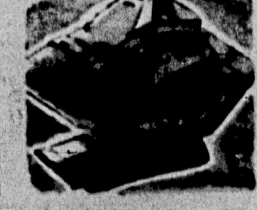

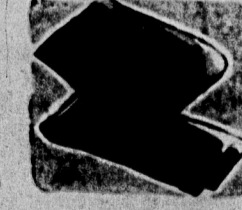
