The balance of Michigan's strength makes the Wolverines unquestioned favorites in today's intrastate meet, and excepting an upset, the main team fight will be for second honors.

Dorm Leaders Win; Prepare For Playoffs

Although they were beaten out for the block title, Wells C made sure of runner-up honors Tuesday night with an overwhelming 33 to 4 conquest over Wells A in the Dorm League.

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In Block 4, Wells D had a very easy time with Wells E, 27 to 6, for its first victory, as Bob Storms made 10 points.

Mason 3 kept alive its chances for the Block 3 title with a 26-11 rout of Abbot 17.

A triple tie became possible in Block 1, when Abbot 14 won 19 to 12 over Mason 3.

Abbot 10 won another in Block 3 by overcoming a 6-5 disadvantage at halftime, and coasting to an easy 20-11 victory over Abbot 11.

Mason 2 absorbed its fourth straight defeat in Block 2, losing to Abbot 16, 13 to 10.

Jack Fritz, of Abbot 18, personally assured his team of a tie for Block 1 title, as his 19 points marked a 24-16 triumph over Mason 6.

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In the individual events, however, all three schools should make strong bids for firsts.

Michigan Normal will have behind it a highly satisfactory showing at last week's Madison Square Gardens, and is expected to show special strength in the distance runs and hurdles.

Duane Zemper for the Hurons is capable of running the two mile in a time close to the fieldhouse record, and may enter the mile also.

One of the most closely contested events this afternoon should be the 440-yard dash, where State's Dale Kautitz will meet two of the country's outstanding quarter milers.

Joe Matynas of M.N.C. has run the 440 in 48 seconds, while the U. of M.'s outstanding competitor will be Bob Ufer, second in the Big Ten last season.

'First Come, First Served' Is Warning on Pre J-Hop Dinner

"It'll be first come first served" was the warning issued Wednesday afternoon by co-chairmen Larry Myers and James Orton of Detroit to Spartan party-goers planning on attending the 1942 pre-J-Hop dinner dance Feb. 20.

The tickets, not the dinners, are what Myers and Orton have a limited supply of and because only 100 of the 700 couples who are expected at the dance can be accommodated at the annual dinner, they may be gone before next week.

The J-Hop dinner will be held as in previous years, in the Union ballroom, with Bud Bell and his band, who are appearing currently on Kampus Kapers, furnishing the music for dancing. The tables will be arranged around the edge of the ballroom under candlelight. The dinner-dance will begin at 7:30 p. m. and end at 9:30.

Bell, who will be making his first appearance at the dinner, will be the third of three bands which couples will have an opportunity to dance to at this year's J-Hop. Council List Adds Three Women Plan Dorm Voting

Three additions by petition have added to the nominations for Student council seats in the Liberal Arts and Applied Science divisions, but the number of primaries necessary for next Tuesday remains unchanged, according to Fred Quigley, council elections chairman.

Veterinary Medicine and Home Economics will be the only divisions where freshmen will narrow the list of candidates in two of their four class officers. Fresh president and vice-presidential candidates will be selected in the primaries, and all final elections will be held one week later.

Jury Finds Flier Guilty As Spy

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (TP)—The famous aviatrix Laura Ingalls was found guilty late today in a district court of acting as a paid agent of the German government, without registering her activities with the State Department. The conviction carries a possible sentence of eight months to two years imprisonment, a \$1,000 fine or both.

Miss Ingalls, who holds several records for women fliers, admitted in testimony that she had accepted money from German embassy officials and offered to build up sentiment for the German cause. She contended, however, that she was motivated by the patriotic notion of discovering Nazi espionage secrets.

The government produced letters written by Miss Ingalls to German embassy chiefs in which she signed herself with a "Hitler" and expressed jubilation at Nazi victories in Europe. Faced with these exhibits, the aviatrix said she hoped to appeal to the emotion of the Germans and establish herself as a "Mati Hari," an international spy who could expose Nazi activities.

BERLIN, Feb. 13 (TP)—Nazi officials announced tonight that Rumanian Premier Antonescu had visited Adolf Hitler, this week at the German leader's wartime headquarters. The brief announcement said that the premier and Hitler discussed military matters.

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
