WILL THEY GRADUATE? The problem of what will happen to students who miss, completing college courses before leaving for service in the armed forces is growing more serious. Following the experiences following the last war it appears that many students will never return to

THIS BECOMES MORE serious with the realization that post-war adjustment will be harder than ever before, A college education will be but little preparation for times that will be difficult.

ONE PLAN IS BEING pushed by the Office of Civilian Defense which at some schools could help a lot. It involves raising a fund to give help to students who do return after the war. The University of Iowa began it. By weekly contributions of a dime per student it is expected to raise \$10,000.

THIS WILL HELP A LOT. However, it is not certain that such a plan would be practical at Michigan State, Students here admittedly have less money than at many other schools. It would be harder for them to sacrifice for such a fund on top of all the other drives which are going on and will go on. Perhaps it could be done here.

STILL THERE IS the fact that such a plan is not needed here as much as at other schools. More students here are getting draft exemptions because of advanced military or Engineering courses.

THEN, TOO, expenses here are less and it is easier for students to work their way through. This means that it would be less of a problem for men to return here after army service.

ANOTHER ANGLE IS that the government is very likely to take over the job as part of the post-war adjustment planning. From here it looks as if it would be too hie for State students to bandle. But it is a problem that is worth a lot of thought



Training At Custer, McCoy, Sheridan Off for Duration

In place of the summer camps, all R.O.T.C. graduates will be required to attend a special service school before being commissioned.

When asked if the communique

when asked if the communique meant that Michigan State's junior ROTC students would take no summer training. Colonel Me-Leod replied, "That's the way it looks to me." But he cautioned students to wait until more definite word has been received before they make summer plans.

LEARNED FROM LETTER

McLeod explained that his warning was based on a letter, which he received from the war department several months ago, stating that juniors might be sent

department several months ago, stating that juniors might be sent to army "replacement centers" for their summer training rather than to summer camps. The fact that a special service school would be required after graduation, however, indicates that there will be no summer training at the end of the junior year, McLeod added.

"All graduates of senior units who, in 1942, will have completed all requirements, including a summer camp, will be commissioned upon graduation," the communique said. "However, those who have not completed a summer camp, but who have otherwise met all requirements, must complete satisfactorily the basic course at the appropriate special requirement of a college degree.
