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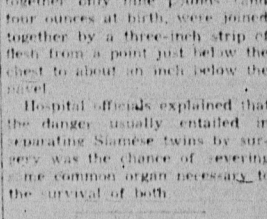

## Swimmers Will be Underdogs In Wolverine Meet Monday

One of the oldest swimming rivalries in the Midwest, the University of Michigan vs. Michigan State, will be renewed Monday in the Jensen pool at 8 p. m. This is the 20th consecutive meet in this rivalry which started in 1922.

Michigan, before last Saturday night when it was swamped by Yale, was the ruler of the collegiate swimming world. The Wolverine swimmers appeared once before in East Lansing this year when they captured most of the honors in the Michigan National AAU event early in January.

Even though Michigan State would be at its best Monday evening, it will be the underdogs, with little chance of balancing the score. The meet may be close.

## Milne Shatters All Marks In High Jump Event

Spartan trackmen took firsts in 11 out of 14 events in Jensen fieldhouse last night, as 17 records were broken and one was tied in the 22nd annual running of the intrastate indoor track carnival.

Bulk of the records fell in three relays; the 440, 880, and medley, as fieldhouse, carnival, and varsity marks were bettered. Jumping 6 feet, 6 1/2 inches, Al Milne set varsity and fieldhouse records in the high jump for the second consecutive week, and easily broke the five-year-old carnival mark.

**MACK ENDS CAREER**

Concentration on the medley relays gave State a victory and three records, and gave Wall Mack his last chance to run that race before entering the army in the near future. The former fieldhouse record of Michigan Normal was bettered by more than 6 seconds as the Spartan quartet finished in 7:36.5. Hugue Davis, competing in his fifth event, ran the opening 220 yards, Dale Kautitz 440 was next, Mack ran in third position, while Bill Scott finished with another fast mile.

A varsity mark was given to John Dodge in the 150-yard high hurdles, who beat Mel Buschman by a hair at 9.6 seconds. Running in it that Buschman won the low hurdles, while Dodge took a close third. Dodge was top man in the medley jump, with 22 feet, 1/4 inch; he tied the carnival record in the 60-yard dash at 7.7, and he ran in State's three record-breaking relays.

The 300-yard dash fieldhouse and carnival records which Clem Smith set last year were broken last night, as Smith himself cut one-tenth of a second from his old mark to win in 2:27. Only non-State records of the evening were carnival marks set by Western Michigan's fast mile relay team at 2:23 and by Ed Rosenweig of Michigan Normal, who tossed the shot 46 feet, 2 1/4 inches.

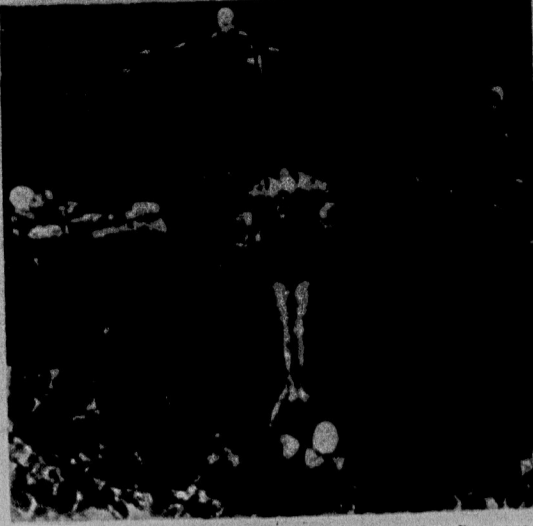

## Two Tankers Sunk by Sub In Atlantic

Only One Survives  
Anderson Attack;  
33 Lose Lives

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—The Navy department announced tonight that two Atlantic Refining Company tankers, W. D. Anderson and another, were torpedoed and sunk in the Atlantic coast.

One survivor was reported from Stuart, Fla. He reported that other crew members had been in the sinking. The sinking of the vessel sank about 100 miles after being torpedoed.

The navy announcement followed an earlier statement of the vessel's fate. The vessel was sunk by a German U-boat off the coast of North Carolina, N. J. was the Atlantic Refining Company.

A number of survivors were reported ashore. One of them, John F. Dal, said the attacking submarine had maneuvered within 100 yards of the tanker before being destroyed by a torpedo.

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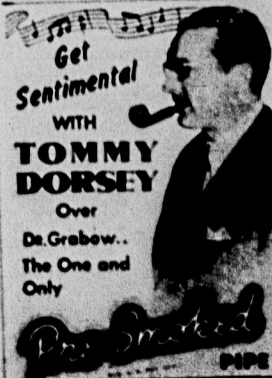
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
