## Invasion of Europe Seen In AEF Landing

### Paris Raid Presages Western Drive

LONDON, March 4 (TP)—The landing of another large force of American troops in North Ireland and the hammering by the RAF of German-controlled industrial plants in the suburbs of Paris were seen today as the prelude to the reopening of a Western European front.

### Exact Russian Victory

### SECRET LANDING

The landing was made in secret and without ceremony. Major General Chaney, commander of American forces in the British Isles, was on hand to greet his new men.

### CHUNGKING, March 4 (By Official Radio)—The Chungking radio declares that another Japanese attempt to land troops at a point near Hainan in China has been repulsed. The radio announcer said the Japs had been beaten back with heavy enemy losses.

**WASHINGTON MERRY-GO-ROUND**

Committee Will Quiz Moguls On Rubber Truth

WASHINGTON.—Some pointed questions regarding rubber supplies to the big tire and rubber companies have been prepared by the Truman committee to be fired at Jesse Jones and Leon Henderson this week.

Among other things the committee will ask whether it is true (1) that Goodyear, Goodrich, Firestone and U. S. Rubber were permitted to dump 26 per cent more rubber than normally during the past year; (2) whether Montgomery Ward stacked up with \$80,000,000 worth of tires; (3) whether big banking firms have stocked up with three years supply of tires; (4) what, of course, the privilege of any individual or corporation to look up with "long receivers" prior to Pearl Harbor and the freezing of rubber, but the committee is interested in locating the big sources of supply for the war effort.

**JESSE JONES' SYNTHETIC**

Also the Truman Committee had three questions regarding the accuracy of Jesse Jones' estimate of a synthetic rubber. Real fact is that Jesse has given three different sets of figures. At first he grandiloquently announced he would have 400,000 tons of rubber "production" by June 1943. Then, appearing privately before the Truman Committee, he was much more modest and merely promised 400,000 tons by December, 1943, six months later. Then, a few days afterward, he reduced his estimate once again, telling the House Appropriations Committee he would have 500,000 tons of "productive capacity" by Jan. 1, 1944.

**QUESTION OF STORAGE**

When the Truman Committee asked Henderson whether the Big Four rubber companies had been permitted to draw a much greater supply of rubber than normal through the Rubber Reserve Corporation in 1941, he replied that the question of storage is involved. In other words, one rushed into his country's 400,000 extra tons of rubber last year after it had to be stored some place. However, Henderson did not make it clear whether the Big Four, by storing the rubber, could keep it permanently.

**IF JAPS TAKE CEYLON**

When Leon Henderson and Bill Holt of the War Production Board came before the Truman Committee, recently they have estimated that the rubber they expected to scrape together from different parts of the world until such time as Jesse Jones' slow-moving synthetic rubber program could swing into action.

**Bataan Fliers Destroy Three Jap Vessels**

WASHINGTON, March 4 (TP)—The battle of Bataan took the air today as General Douglas MacArthur's distinctive air force scored a smashing success in a raid on Japanese shipping in Subic Bay. The Americans destroyed several enemy vessels totalling over 30,000 tons, and started large fires on the Olongapo and Grande Island docks.

**Orators to Seek Win At Holland**



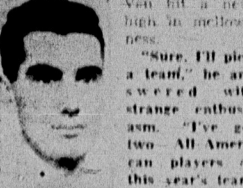

# College, State Will Check Induction Postponement Rules With Washington

State Selective Service officials check with national headquarters today on the possibility that a new ruling may have been issued which would permit all college student draft registrants to complete the school year before being drafted.

This action followed the disclosure yesterday of a newspaper clipping dated Feb. 17 which declared that students "not drafted within the next 30 days" would not be called "between the midterm date and the end of the college year."

## PHONES HEADQUARTERS

The story, credited by the Boston university to a letter received from Brig Gen. Hershey, was brought to the attention of Dean of Men F. T. Mitchell yesterday.

Professing that he knew of no such ruling, Dean Mitchell phoned state headquarters in Lansing for an opinion by their occupational deferment advisers. Their reply was, in effect, "It's news to us" and requested that a copy of the article be sent to them for study and checking with national headquarters.

## IT'S UP TO LOCAL BOARDS

"It isn't that postponement of induction is anything unusual," Dean Mitchell explained, "but this story seems to indicate that instructions may have been issued which would allow such action to be granted for the balance of the college year instead of for the rest of the term as is the case now."

"According to present regulations, local boards may interpret the provision allowing postponement of induction if such action would cause an 'undue hardship' as applying to students," he said. "The board has the power to grant postponements to students to complete the term they are enrolled in and take an examination. Whether they use this power or not is a matter of discretion."

Atlantic without the loss of a single man under the protection of American and British warships. The announcement of the new landing of American troops in North Ireland was followed by disclosure that a small group of American soldiers had arrived in London from their North Ireland headquarters.

The RAF's heavy attack on factories in suburban Paris was seen as the first blow in a spring drive to knock out Hitler's sources of war supplies. The attack was centered on the vast Renault Motor works, which has been making planes, tanks and guns for the Germans.

The British said that Hitler has turned more and more to French factories for war goods as the heavy material losses on the Russian front have overtaken the capacity of German plants.

British sources said the destruction of industrial plants in Occupied France and especially in the Paris district was an unhappy, but necessary complement to an invasion of continental Europe.

It was pointed out that Hitler is using the French factories to supply arms for his occupation armies, while the German plants are turning out replacements for material lost in the eastern fighting.

(Reports from Vichy said that 650 persons had been killed and 1,000 injured in the British raid. Marshal Petain declared a day of national mourning for the victims and declared in an angry statement that the attack would take the shape of a catastrophe.

## To Rangoon Jap's Threat Increasing

### Enemy Within 50 Miles of Burma Capital City

LONDON, March 4 (TP)—Japanese forces in Burma have forced a crossing of the lower Sittang River and penetrated to within 50 miles of the capital at Rangoon, according to dispatches reaching London tonight from the Burmese front.

The Reuters news agency correspondent with the British forces in Burma reported that the Japs in one bound had crossed the lower Sittang and pushed 18 miles toward Rangoon. The Japs now are halfway between the river and Pegu.

The British already have destroyed all installations at Rangoon which would be of aid to the Japs and have evacuated most civilians. Only a small holding garrison was understood to have been left at the capital city.

### FORCE RIVER CROSSING

The Reuter correspondent said the situation in Burma was confused, but added that the official report that British infantry and tanks had contacted the Japs northeast of Pegu indicated that the main imperial forces have been withdrawn from their positions along the Sittang river.

## Senate Committee Approves Pay Raise for Army, Navy

WASHINGTON, March 4 (TP)—

A senate military subcommittee approved a bill today to increase the pay rates for army and navy enlisted men and low-ranking commissioned officers.

The subcommittee reported favorably the bill sponsored by Senator Johnson of Colorado to boost the private's pay from \$30 to \$42 a month after the first four months. Under the new pay rates, an army private would receive \$30 per month instead of \$21 during his first four months of service.

Second lieutenants and navy ensigns would draw \$1,800 per year under the new plan instead of \$1,500. These officers also would receive increased living allowances.

The Johnson bill would increase the wage bill of the army and navy by about \$255,000,000 per year. The increase normally

would eliminate the automatic pay increase of \$10 per month after the first year of service. It also would do away with extra amounts paid to enlisted men with specialist ratings.
