Eighteen new members and one honorary member were initiated into the Michigan State college chapter of Blue Key, national honor fraternity, at a banquet in the Union Thursday evening.

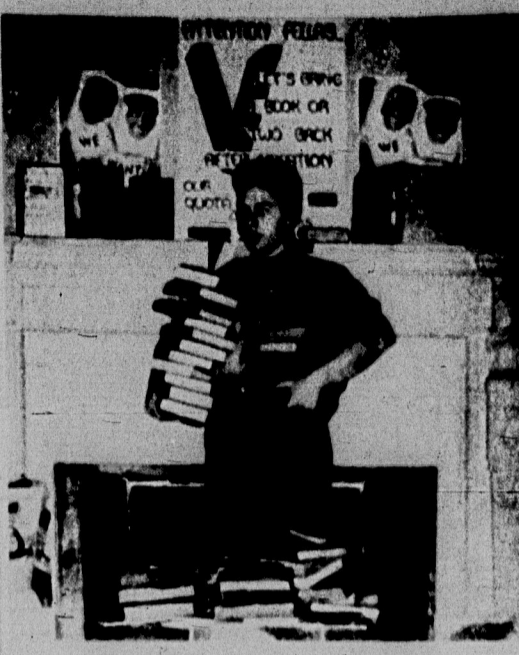

The only bridge the flood hasn't endangered is the bridge tournament in the Union. Great stuff, these card games.

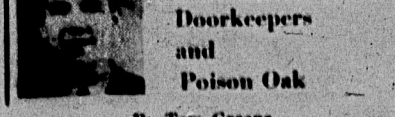

Beet Greenhouse To Meet New War Demand for Sugar

Two greenhouses for the production of sugar-beet seed will be completed and ready for use on the M. S. C. campus within 30 days, Dean of Agriculture E. L. Anthony said yesterday. The greenhouses are to be begun as soon as \$33,390 approved by the state administrative board Tuesday is available, he said.

The new project will be located south of the Red Cedar near the student colony and the forestry nursery, and will fill greatly-increased demands for Michigan sugar beets. Because of curtailment of sugar imports during the war, a shortage of seed has been created in Michigan and the new facilities, Anthony said, will enable Michigan growers to avoid the expected shortage.

Michigan is destined to play an increasingly important part in production of the nation's wartime sugar crop, and the new greenhouses will form the first step toward speeding research and seed production, Anthony said.

Washington Merry-Go-Round

Henderson Still Seeks Ceiling Over Wages

WASHINGTON.—Plain-talking Price Administrator Leon Henderson has long wanted to clamp down a ceiling on farm prices as the surest way to forestall a disastrous runaway inflation. He tried to get authority to do this in his price-control bill, but a log rolling coalition of farm lobbyists and unionites balked that.

But while he was licked among the political muddled "statesmen" on Capitol Hill, Henderson is still determinedly pressing his plan. Several weeks ago he sent the President a confidential memorandum bluntly opposing the increased wage demand of CIO's Steel Workers' Organizing Committee in the so-called "Little Steel plant."

DOUBLE PROGRAM

conference with the President, Henderson returned to this attack with a double-barrelled proposal. He urged that the President:

- Direct the War Labor Board NOT to grant an increase in steel wages.
- Authorize the Office of Price Administration headed by Henderson, to announce that hereafter wage increases will not be considered a basis for seeking raises in prices from OPA.

WOULD USE DEVIL

Therefore, when it was proposed that he and Ed Farley, of the World War Shipping board, take over the Savannah shipyards, Maritime Commission, Woodward, Carmody and MacCauley objected. To settle the question, Chairman Land finally went direct to the President. This was his reply:

"If the devil himself can build ships, I'll hire him."

NOTE: Significant fact is that the friends and brother-in-law of Tom Corcoran, ex-Brian Trustee, had the original Savannah contract, and unlike most shipbuilders, had not borrowed one cent of government money. However, so much unfavorable publicity resulted from Corcoran's connection with the deal that the Maritime commission transferred the yards to Reber—and now may get even more publicity.

Report More RAF Raids On France, Nazis

LONDON—British bomber and fighter planes were believed engaged in a series of heavy raids over Germany and Occupied France tonight following up day light forays in which they destroyed eight Nazi fighter planes and bombed the rail yards at Hazebrouch.

The Vichy radio announced late tonight that the Paris area had a two-hour raid during the night, but it was not indicated whether any bombs had been dropped.

Earlier, the main German home radio transmitter went off the air, along with the French radio of Calais.

Observers at a southeast coast English town reported hearing the sound of violent explosions from the French side of the channel for about an hour tonight. Anti-aircraft shells were seen bursting in the sky between Ostend and Boulogne.

War Wage Control To Under Study

WASHINGTON—March 13 (AP)—President Roosevelt said today that the subject of wage control as a war measure is under study by the administration.

Mr. Roosevelt refused to discuss the question of placing a ceiling on wages as a war-time inflation measure, he told his news conference that the entire problem is under consideration and that positive action on wage control is under study.

The President's assertion came some time before he conferred with the joint AFL-CIO War Labor Board. Both AFL President William Green and CIO President Philip Murray indicated that the subject of a wage ceiling had not been discussed with them by the chief executive.

Soviet Army Makes Gains In 2 Sectors

Report Progress Of Smolensk, Ukraine Drives

MOSCOW, March 14 (TP)—(Saturday)—Crack Red army forces are continuing to roll forward all along the vast eastern front, crushing Nazi resistance everywhere and regaining more ground from Hitler's hordes.

This was announced early Saturday in a communique issued by the Soviet high command in Moscow. The war bulletin gave only scant details, but these were enough to indicate that important gains had been made in the drive on Smolensk.

Eleven more inhabited localities have been taken in this sector, and as villages often are widely spaced along this route, some observers believed the Russians now may be within 90 miles of the city of Smolensk.

The Germans were said to have launched some heavy counter-attacks, but all were repulsed with serious losses in men and material for the Nazis.

Twenty-four German planes were destroyed during the past 24 hours, to a loss of seven Russian planes.

Earlier, it had been announced that Marshal Timoshenko's great offensive in the Ukraine had gained important ground for the Russians. One main German defense line was said to have been cracked and three vitally important inhabited localities were retaken.

Two Ships Sunk In Caribbean

LEWES, Del., March 13 (TP)—Fourteen survivors from a small Norwegian freighter torpedoed off the Delaware coast have arrived in Lewes. They said their vessel had been sent to the bottom last Tuesday and that they drifted for nearly 13 hours before landing at Fenwick Island beach off the coast.

The body of the captain of the vessel, Arne Dahl, was recovered at sea by a fishing boat near the scene of the sinking. Two torpedo boats were fired at the vessel, one sinking near the stern. The Norwegian ship went down in about a minute and a half.

The navy department in Washington also announced the sinking in the Caribbean of an American vessel which it described as small merchantman.

Nazi Spies Get Long Terms

NEW YORK, March 13 (TP)—Maximum sentences of 20 years each were meted out today to the three key members of a German spy ring.

Federal Judge Henry Goldard, in pronouncing sentence, said the punishment would be a warning to others that acts of espionage would not be tolerated in the United States. The three who received 20-year sentences, Kurt Ludwig, Paul Borchard, and Rene Froelich, had been convicted last week.

Other convicted members of the spy ring also received heavy sentences. Miss Helen Pauline Mayer, Kurt Mueller, and Hans Pagenel were sentenced to 15 years in prison each. Nineteen-year-old Frederick Schlosser received a 12-year term.

The deserters from Fort Oglethorpe, Ga. were identified by authorities as Charles Lovell, 21, and James E. Testerman, 22. After a brief gun battle, the fugitives surrendered in an abandoned house on the outskirts of the Virginia city late this afternoon and were immediately charged with murder by F. B. I. agents. They had been sought since Thursday.

Woman Photographer Chats Of Her Adventures in Russia

"When I saw Stalin I realized that his face was the strongest I had ever seen," Margaret Bourke-White, noted American photographer, told a lecture course audience of 3,500 Thursday night.

Miss Bourke-White, recently returned from Russia where she filmed "all-out" war on the Smolensk front, was able to photograph the Russian leader's "Chizled stone" face only after intervention on her behalf by Harry Hopkins, who was in Moscow to discuss lend-lease aid.

Her toughest job was "taking" pictures of a Moscow air raid the night the Germans tried to burn the city completely. On that night she stationed four cameras on the roof of the British embassy where she was aided by General Mason MacFarlane. She also saw Sir Stafford Cripps rushing about the embassy watching the bombs fall.

Originally in Russia on a routine assignment, with her husband, Eskine Caldwell, Miss Bourke-White saw the war break in Russia. She stated that the general feeling was one of great relief that the Germans had shown their hand.

"The Reds will never conclude a separate peace because Germany is the traditional enemy of the Russians," she emphasized. She stated that Russian soldiers collected Nazi Iron Crosses with the hope that they would return wooden crosses to the Germans.

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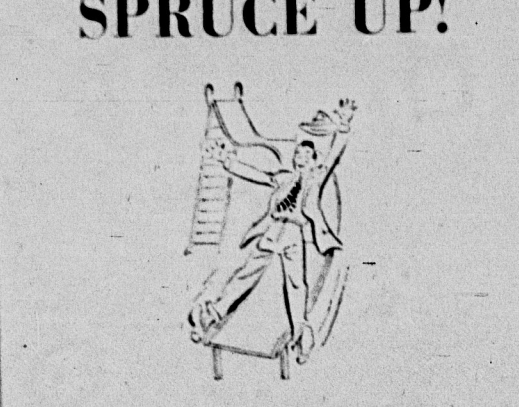
