WASHINGTON, April 24 (TP)—The first official word relative to an American bomber crew interned with their plane in Russia came in President Roosevelt's news conference today. Mr. Roosevelt said he had been officially notified, but was unable to say what ultimate disposal would be made of the plane. Secretary of State Hull later said that the Soviet Union is quite within its rights in interned the plane, since Russia and Japan are signers of a non-aggression pact.

OTTAWA, April 24 (TP)—Canadian Prime Minister Mackenzie King tonight made a final plea to Canadians to release his government from its pledge not to conscript the country's manpower for overseas duty. The Canadian prime minister pleaded in a nationwide radio address that his countrymen vote next Monday to permit Canada's conscripts to be sent anywhere they are needed to aid in winning the war.

The prime minister warned that Germany and Japan plan to unite their land forces and gain sea supremacy this year in an effort to isolate the Western hemisphere.

WASHINGTON, April 24 (TP)—Men between the ages of 45 and 64 are to move into the selective service spotlight for the next few days. Registration in a number of cities to be held today and tomorrow. Draft headquarters emphasized that for this registration, there will be no lottery. The purpose is to aid in getting a clearer picture of the nation's manpower situation.

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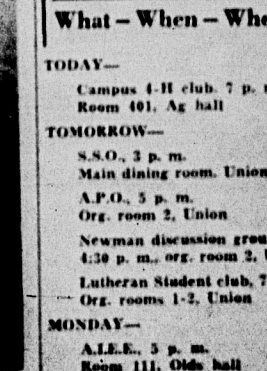

Even though the Spartan baseball team is very busy this week-end, having met Wisconsin yesterday and due to play the Badgers again this afternoon, the Kobsmen have an eye on next Tuesday and their first contest with Michigan.

Every meeting of the Spartans and Wolverines in any sport has been a hard-fought battle. The players that represent the two schools would rather come out on top in these games than any others.

War Plays Havoc

Due to national conditions, Coach Ray Fisher was unable to hold his regular spring trip, but did manage to get his charges to preseason tilts. Of these, the Wolves won three, losing only the Annapolis naval academy, and then returned home to beat Western Michigan and Wayne.

Harms Back Again

Handling these hurlers from behind the plate will be Capt. George Blome, who has been the No. 1 catcher for the last three years and is the team's leading hitter.

KNOW YOUR SPARTANS

Joe Nelson plays first base and is a senior in Liberal Arts, majoring in business administration. He is 25 years of age, stands six feet tall and weighs 150 lbs.

Other hitters who will give the Spartans pitchers plenty of worries are Francis Chamberlain, third sacker who blasted out a triple with the bases loaded to beat Western Michigan; Don Robinson, sophomore shortstop, current batting leader of the club, and Paul White, freshman pitcher from the Michigan grad school.

MAJOR LEAGUE BASEBALL

In the American League, the New York Yankees marched along with an 8 to 5 victory over the Boston Red Sox, thanks to a seven-run rally in the ninth inning, including a two-run homer by Flash Gordon.

The Detroit Tigers moved out the Chicago White Sox 2 to 1, with Bob Patrick's home run breaking a deadlock in the ninth inning. The Philadelphia Athletics outslugged the Washington Senators, 7 to 2, and the Cleveland Indians blanked the St. Louis Browns 2 to 0.

Team members making the trip differ from yesterday's lineup by only one man as Bill Hill replaced McGaw in the sixth spot. Coach Hill, in experimenting to find a winning third doubles team, is taking Hill along in place of McGaw.

Last year the netters lost to the Buckeyes 5-4. This season the story may be different as Ohio State has lost its first three men by way of graduation and the army.

Schlademan Crew Faces Nation's Best In Relays Today

Mac Mitchell Beaten PHILADELPHIA, April 24 (TP)—Indiana university's Campbell Kane whipped New York's Leslie Mac Mitchell in the final mile today as the Hoosier team won the distance medley relay at the Penn Track carnival.

Although Mac Mitchell's team lost the race, the New York mile star turned in a better mark for his anchor mile than Kane. Mac Mitchell received the baton from a teammate 15 yards behind Kane. Mac Mitchell made the mile in 4:11 while his Indiana rival was clocked in 4:13.6.

Al Blozis of Georgetown took the shotput event with a heave of 54 feet 11 inches, six inches shy of the Penn record. Xavier college of New Orleans won two of the first day's events. They were the college quartet relay and the individual 100 meter hurdles.

Des Moines, April 24 (TP)—Oklahoma university created a new American collegiate record of 3 minutes 23 seconds today in the university sprint medley relay at the Drake games. Michigan finished second and Texas third.

The old standard, 3 minutes 23.2 seconds, was set by Texas last year at the same athletic carnival. Prairie View State college broke the Drake mark in the sprint medley for colleges by taking the event in 3 minutes 26.7 seconds. The previous record of 3 minutes 27.5 seconds was established last year by Kansas State Teachers. The tracksters finished second today.

When Coach Karl Schlademan's track team takes the field in the Drake relays this week-end, it will be pitted against the toughest competition the nation can offer.

The Spartans in their outdoor meets this spring have shown a great deal of talent and greater willingness to fight and they seek to be matched with the best in the profession, giving them a good change to show their stuff. Bill Milne, Wisconsin and Iowa, and Big Ten schools, will be represented heavily on the competition. From the Big Six conference will come the well-trained Oklahomas, Kansas and Nebraska marksmen.

MILNE SHOULD WIN State's skeleton team of 14 men, while not remotely hoping to show very brightly in the final toxics does expect to pick up points. The only event that Schlademan has any hope of winning is in the high jump, in which Al Milne is entered.

Not since 1923 has State won any event. In that year De Gay Ernst took the 440-yard hurdle event and set a record that took 16 years to smother.

STARTED IN 1917 Individual and field events which are drawing six of the 14 Spartans to Drake this year were first added in 1917. The relays still hold the spotlight, however.

Most of the major teams in the country send representatives to the relays, which began in 1911 with only eight universities. Since then the figure has climbed to 86 colleges and universities. A high school journey is also run off during the relays.

Louis' Trainer Dies After Long Illness CHICAGO (TP)—The boxing world mourned today the death of a trainer of fistic champions—Jack Blackburn.

While Blackburn's main claim to boxing fame was as trainer for world champion Joe Louis, the veteran club conditioner also handled three other titleholders. They were Bud Taylor, Sammy Mandell and John Henry Lewis.
