Men's Convocation Shows Opportunity For Officer Talent

Any young man who can pass the requirements will soon have an opportunity to qualify for officers' training in some branch of the service and remain in school until graduation...

Hannah said that "within a week all branches of the army would announce details of an enlistment plan similar to the air force's program, which was explained at the convocation by Lieut. Col. Joseph H. Carr, technical inspector at Mitchell field, N. Y."

INCLUDES ALL CLASSES The air force's plan, presumably serving as a basis for the general army program, will allow men of all college classes to enroll in the army air force, continue college through graduation, and then take officers' training at one of the army's air training centers...

Carr explained that men could enlist for immediate training if they wished, but he said he hoped "few men" would ask for immediate induction, because they would be more valuable after completing their college courses.

Any man who expects to appear before the special examining board on May 21, Carr said, should bring three letters of recommendation, a birth certificate, his parents' or guardian's permission if he is under 21, and a registrar's certificate that he is a regularly enrolled student at State, Col. Stuart McLeod, P.M.S.&T., will handle all details of the plan and answer any questions, Carr said.

ROTC SENIORS GET GRANT McLeod reported that many senior ROTC students who had applied for extensions before going on active army duty in order to complete graduation credits had been granted the permission. Although all requests have not yet been acted upon, no rejections have been received yet, McLeod said that 10 seniors had received extensions until Sept. 10, three until Dec. 30, and one until June, 1943.

Colonel Carr explained the details of the plan.

Army Awards Top Honors To 100 Heroes of Luzon

WASHINGTON, May 1 (TP)—The war department tonight released the names of 100 army heroes awarded the Distinguished Service Cross in the Philippine campaign. Many were previously announced from Philippine headquarters.

One naval hero was also honored with the D.S.C. He is Lieut. John Bulkeley of San Antonio, Texas, leader of the mosquito fleet.

The list also includes Lieut. Arthur Wermouth whose 200 enemy soldiers killed has won him the popular title of "the one man army." Another hero is Lieut. Boyd Wagner, American ace.

Nearly half of the 44 enlisted men receiving the crosses are Filipinos with 10 of the awards granted to officers of the Philippine army. Headed by General Wright, General Moore, General Akin, and General Jones, 44 American officers were awarded crosses.

The Distinguished Service Cross is awarded only for extraordinary heroism on the field of battle. It was established by congress early in the last war and awarded to a few more than 6,000 soldiers. It has been given to marines and navy men serving with the army before, but the award to Navy Lieutenant Bulkeley is one of very few number of instances where the award was made outside of the army.

The list of awards contains the names of two army chaplains and 23 officers and men who were decorated posthumously. One of these was Capt. Colin Kelly.

Spartans to Form Air Squadron For Naval Training

The course, already being taken by 12 persons, is sponsored by the Radis club under the guidance of Carlton Osburn and Robert Lattner, Eng. '43, and Ray Vincent, Eng. '45.

Outer's Benefactor To Prove Nimrods Needn't Hate Them

By BILL JOHNSTON The only man in the world to be freed others in captivity, Earl Omer of Minnetonka, Minn., will present a moving picture and lecture about his unique pet.

As the fifth regularly scheduled feature of the World Adventure series tonight at 8 in the Auditorium, Prof. S. E. Crowe, director of the series announced yesterday.

For the last three or four years, Omer has given lectures and shown films of his pet from the end of the United States to the other end of the world.

Lars has been trying to impress upon his audience that the otter does not live on fish.

The story of Lars' work with these amphibians is told in an article by Josef Irgas, II, which appeared in the February 14 issue of the Saturday Evening Post.

In the article, Lars pointed out that he often eats crawfish and frogs but fish, and that it makes a fine house pet.

Once numbering over 500,000, the otter has since become practically extinct with only about 1,000 of its kind left in North America. Lars became interested in the otter, as he terms them, about 14 years ago, after finding one little one huddled near the body of the mother otter, drowned in a cage.

The 31-year old Minnetonka has since started an otter farm, and his hobby has become his main occupation, according to the Post article.

Besides his film and lecture, Lars will bring one or two of his pets for exhibition purposes, Professor Crowe stated.

McKEESPORT, Pa., May 1 (TP)—At least eight persons were dead and 10 others seriously burned after an explosion and fire at the Versailles plant of the Central Railway Signal company. Most of the dead and injured were girl employees.

Officials said scores had been injured but most of the injuries were not serious. Fire broke out immediately following the explosion but was quickly extinguished.

The cause of the blast was still undetermined.
