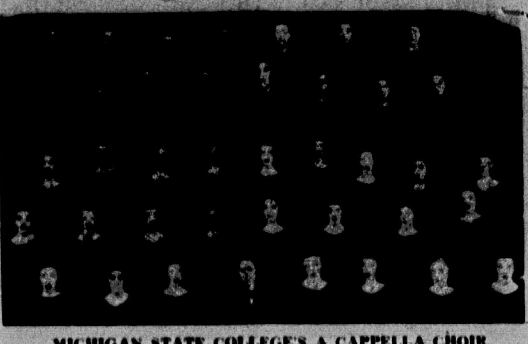

Michigan State's injury-riddled spring football squad showed some scoring punch for the first time Saturday afternoon when the "Blue" team won the final intersquad game with a 13-6 victory over the "Whites."

Dick Kieppe was the outstanding back on the field as he passed, ran, and punted with his 1941 brilliance. He set up the first blue touchdown in the second quarter when his pass to Bob McNeil placed the ball on the Whites' 20 yard stripe. Kieppe advanced the ball to the six and Fullback Ray Zarza skirted his left end for the marker.
