British Race Toward India to Prevent Jap Encirclement

Allied Planes Bomb Aerodrome

CHUNGKING, May 13 (TP)—British and Chinese troops felled the Japanese in Burma today in a drive to keep the Japs from reaping the full benefits of their invasion.

General Alexander's war-weary British cut their way out of a Japanese trap and are within a few miles of Kalewa, near the Indian frontier. If the British get to Kalewa ahead of the Japs they will be pretty well beyond danger of encirclement.

Meanwhile, the Chinese, commanded by American General Stilwell were fighting fiercely to stop a Japanese drive up the Mekong river, on the frontiers of China, Siam, and Burma. The Japs were on both sides of the river. Dispatches from the front said the Chinese forces were intact despite heavy attacks. The Japanese drive up the Burma road into China's Yunnan province has been halted momentarily. The invaders appeared to be attempting another encircling movement such as they were trying when they met their recent setback near Chefang. Chinese strategists believe the force invading Yunnan province is too small for its task.

Author Is Hurt

HAMILTON, O., May 13 (TP)—Doctors called "serious" today the condition of author Gregor Ziemer, victim of a three-car pile-up that hurt five other persons. Ziemer is the author of a current best-seller, "Education for Death," an expose on Nazi Germany. Ziemer is also a radio commentator.

'Alert' Plans Approved By Campus CDC

No Blackout, Traffic Halt, Says George

The Coordinating Defense Council officially approved the final plans for a campus "alert" which will be held on or near June 1, according to Dick George, CDC chairman, at the lengthy discussion on the project during last night's council meeting.

"The main purpose of the alert will be to give actual experience to the members of the air raid warden's classes before they return to their home communities this summer," Bert Daniels, campus police chief and director of the protective service courses, announced.

Plans which the CDC delegates approved were an alert to include the area between Bogue and Beal streets and from the Red Cedar river to Grand River avenue, no interference of traffic, and no blackout. Daniels revealed that the war department only could issue permits for blackouts and that it would not do so for such a small area.

SOLICIT SIGNATURES

CDC decided that the drive to obtain the signatures of all State students on a huge postcard approving the nation's victory war aims should continue as "vital to morale and student enthusiasm for campus defense activities," according to George.

"The fraternities and sororities have already received their petitions and most of the detailed work has been completed," commented Sally Peterson, chairman of the postcard project which is being handled for CDC by Sigma Kappa sorority.

All Greek houses are asked to return their signed sheets to the sorority residence today, she said. TO SHOW DEFENSE MOVIE—The conversational language courses recently instituted by CDC are progressing "nicely" it was revealed by Mary Evans, off-campus women's delegate.

"She added that the new campus defense bulletins are available for all who desire a copy. Interested houses should contact Miss Evans for their issue. A program of defense movies will be shown in the Spartan room of the Union on Monday evening at 7:30 p. m., Dick George announced.

CDC authorized a committee to investigate the possibilities of a Victory coke campaign. The plan entails the purchase of any nickel refreshment with which a 10 cent defense stamp will be sold, George stated.

Pope Pius Flays Persecutions By Modern Caesars

Pope Pius attacked the modern persecutors of Christianity today in a broadcast appealing for world peace.

The pontiff said that in some countries the authorities were tramping up against the Christians the same charges preferred by the Roman Caesars of the first centuries of the Christian era.

The Pope said that while there is no immediate hope of peace, the destruction caused by war is forever accumulating.

"We well know how, in the state of things today, there would be little probability of success in formulating detailed proposals for a just and honorable peace. Rather, every time we utter the word peace, we run the risk of offending one or the other side," said the Pope.

Vichy Ordered To Hold Ships Or Scuttle

LONDON—May 13 (TP)—A correspondent for the London Daily Mail reported from the French frontier today that Hitler had forbidden the Vichy government to part with French merchant ships at Martinique.

The correspondent said that the Nazis were particularly concerned about 140,000 tons of French cargo carriers lying in Martinique harbors.

Vichy Premier Laval is said to have received definite Nazi orders to scuttle the ships before permitting them to fall into the hands of the United Nations.

U. of Chicago to Train 200 Meteorologists

CHICAGO, May 13 (TP)—An additional course for training 200 future weather forecasters for army and navy aviation branches was announced today by University of Chicago.

Director Carl Rossby of the university's institute of meteorology said the 200 aviation cadets would receive a nine-month course beginning in October. Completion of the training qualifies the men for commissions in the navy and army as expert meteorologists.
