## U.S. Will Buy Scrap Rubber

WASHINGTON, May 27 (TP)—Commerce Secretary Jesse Jones told the house interstate commerce committee today that there between 800,000 and 1,000,000 tons of scrap rubber in the country. He said the government has built up a 600,000 ton crude rubber stockpile.

Jones told the committee a plan worked out by the WPB, OPA and RFC will be announced soon. Under this plan the government will start buying scrap rubber. He said 85 per cent of the scrap can be reclaimed and put into use.

The commerce secretary said contracts have been let for about 25 synthetic rubber plants, with an eventual capacity of 800,000 tons. He said two or three of the plants already are in production, at Akron, Ohio, and one in Delaware.
