Convocation Will Explain New Plans

The convocation will serve to clarify all questions concerning the status of enlisted men granted by Michigan State college and the procedure required for enlistment.

President Hannah pointed out that it is imperative that interested students show up today, especially those that will not be in summer school.

Approximately 200 men who are not in advanced R. O. T. C. will be eligible for enlistment, but primary qualifications, upon which enlistment is contingent, will be explained by Colonel McLeod.

All forms for enlistment will be distributed at the convocation today. Among the forms to be filled out are a release by parents for students under 21 years old, and a release from the students.

Enlistments will be made as fast as possible under the Selective Service act.

Entries will be accepted at the Union desk until 4 p. m. tomorrow, and badges for contestants in the water events will be available at a table opposite the Union desk beginning tomorrow morning.

## Canada Spurs Oversea Draft

OTAWA, June 10 (AP)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King told the House of Commons today that the Canadian government did not believe that conscription of men by overseas service was necessary at the present time.

However, the prime minister stressed the necessity of the government's having authority to draft men for service anywhere in the world. He said the government proposed to send conscripted men to other parts of the western hemisphere.

The opposition leader in the House, conservative Richard Hood, demanded immediate overseas conscription.

He said the government's announced policy of conscripting men for overseas service was "a complete failure" and that the Canadian government was "a laughing stock" to the people of the United States.

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## Rommel Rallies for Attack On British Libyan Flank

CAIRO, June 10 (AP)—Nazi Field Marshal Rommel was reported tonight to be regrouping his forces for a new attack on the British flank at Bir Hacheim in the Libyan desert.

The days Rommel has been beating the Italians for their failure to capture Bir Hacheim and roll up the British flank. Finally the German commander transferred large tank forces to the south and joined the Italian in an all-out assault.

Rommel intended to show the Italians how they should be won, but he only succeeded himself that the capture of the desert outpost was a bigger job than he had expected.

Observers said Rommel's situation was now getting difficult with the long Nazi communication lines constantly under attack. The struggle along the western front has become a battle of attrition, with the Nazis on the losing end.

Knox and tanks have been left in British-controlled Libya. The British have salvaged damaged British tanks and trucks back into action against the former winners.

The result is that the Nazis are in a position where they cannot even retreat without being subjected to harrying air and tank

Some teams played no players on either team or on the honorary mention list, show—

ing their dependence on a well-rounded club with evenly distributed talents, instead of outstanding individual play.

## SURVEY AIDS CHOOSING

The players were not picked by the State News sports staff alone. Selection was aided by a poll taken of each team manager, each coach and umpire, and some of the members of the varsity team also witnessed the process. Consultation was held with some of the Michigan State coaching staff and a list of other members of the varsity team. The players were picked on the basis of ability as well as field playing ability.

## MERRILL CHOSEN BEST

Leland Merrill was a unanimous choice for pitcher from the survey as well as an obvious choice from his record. Merrill won six straight games for the champion, Alpha Gamma, Row club, allowing but one run in his first start to the ring-around Sigma Alpha Epsilon team. He dominated over half of the bottom six facts by strikeouts, and went the entire season with giving up no stolen bases.

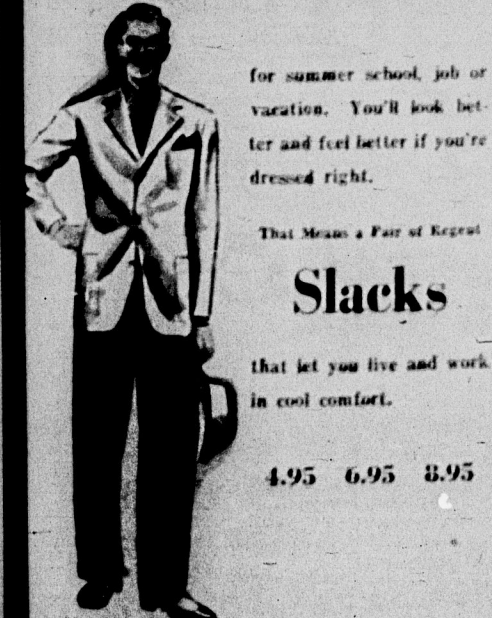
