## **Greeks Help Solve Housing Problem**

At least 60 available vacancies for men students, still without permanent rooms have been located through the cooperation of the 17 campus fraternities and the office of the Dean of Men, it was announced yesterday by Housing Director Ron Heath.

The influx of defense workers into-East Lansing and the use of Wells hall by the army has forced the college to use the NYA barracks as a temporary home for 130 men students. Heath stated.

The vacancies turned up by and every fraternity house has taken in more than its capacity to release rooms for use by other students who lack permanent quarters.

There is still a critical shortage of rooms, however, according to Heath, and anyone knowing of rooms not in use should imme-diately notify the Dean of Men's takes in the new college direc-

## Frosh 'Spirit' Lacking in Judgment

WHAT Emily Post would have said about the fresh-man brawl that occurred during the half-time intermission of the Michigan State-Michigan football game last Saturday would be rather hard to foretell. But one thing is certain---if she had considered it on a guest-host basis, Miss Post would have thought Michigan State college freshmen very impolite.

The whole affair was a disgraceful and ugly blot on the good relations that have existed between the two schools. Michigan State frosh had no more right snake-dancing on the Michigan field than has Hirohito offering President Roosevelt a note of apology. The fine performance of the Michigan State band went almost unnoticed, except when joining the business, editorial or charging freshmen bowled into several bandsmen, knocking them to the ground.


But Michigan State frosh cannot be held entirely responsible for the affair. Some State upperclassmen urged them onto the field. University of Michigan students (many of them not freshmen) brought their good manners to the fore by streaming out of the stands and attacking State frosh. Numerous fist fights occurred, many students received cuts and bruises, some of them serious, and even the playing of the Star-Spangled Banner and our own Alma Mater failed to stop the melee. The fray reached a new low in rottenness when Michigan state police had to intercede and break up the fighting.

The only way future outbursts of that sort can be eliminated, outbursts that may lead to strained relations between the two schools, is to ban any further freshman demonstrations and snake-dances on our opponent's field. This will do away with any opportunity for shameful conflicts such as that in future years.
