Senate Committee Votes Out Its Own Bill; Little **Opposition** Expected

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP) The senate military committee unanimously voted out a bill to draft youths of 18 and 19 today while the house arranged to consider and pass a similar measure Saturday. Foreseeing little or no opposi-

tion, congressional leaders set about placing the bill in Mr. Roosevelt's hands at the earliest possible moment. While the house stood ready

to act at once, an obstacle to im-mediate passage arose today in the senate. Senator McNary (Ore.), the Republican floor leader, pointed out that many
