Reds Reach Silesian Border, South Prussia In Pincer Hold

Reports Have Russians Fighting in Germany

LONDON, Saturday, Jan. 20, (AP)—The Red army, opening two more massive offensives, reached the German Silesian frontier 225 miles from Berlin yesterday in its seasonal surge through Poland, captured the bases of Lodz and Krakow, and trapped huge pincers of East Prussia in a great wedge through into that province.

The army's first contact with the border of the main German territory, from which the Wehrmacht's legions invaded Poland to start the second world war Sept. 1, 1939, was announced officially in the mid-afternoon communiqué.

Reports said the Red army had plunged across the frontier and were fighting the Nazis' beleaguered Poland.

Some of the greatest gains of the Russians captured the cities and villages as they moved through collapsing German lines on a twisting 800-mile front from the Baltic to the Black Sea.

German divisions were being cut and killed on the main front and in the mountains of central and southern Poland in the north. Budapest, capital of Hungarian capital, also was on the verge of complete liberation.

Spurred by the Soviet advance, the Germans were fleeing back into Germany and trying to escape disaster; fighting raged along the south-eastern Silesian frontier.

Tartars Favored Over Statemen In Game Tonight

Spartan cage forces rested last night after their trip to Ypsilanti. They will also face the Albion team without more practice, but will be heavy favorites. VanAlstyne will probably start the second team against them, placing Dick Young and Jack Burdick at forwards, Paul Bauman and Bob O'Leary at guards and Bill Rappchak at center.

Rappchak and Krall will probably alternate at center in today's contest, O'Leary, being the speediest man on the squad will probably see plenty of action as will Joe Krakora who has shown plenty of ability at guard.

B-29s Hit Kobe-Osaka in Raid on Industries; Wreck Plane Plants

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 (AP)—Huge fires were set in one of Japan's most modern airplane plants today by Saipan-based B-29s in their first strike at the Kobe-Osaka industrial area.

The big Kawasaki plant in Akashi was the primary target for upward of 100 Superforts which unloaded their bombs in a daylight raid, 250 miles south of Tokyo with good visibility. Returning B-29 crewmen reported heavy explosions and big fires in the targets.

All the B-29s returned to their bases, Japanese fighter opposition was described in a communiqué issued here as "slight" and anti-aircraft fire as "moderate and inaccurate."

Tokyo broadcasts acknowledged "some damage" and said the raiders were over the Osaka-Kobe area for an hour.

The mission was the 16th major one against Japanese empire industrial and military targets this year and the 41st since the B-29s got in their first heavy blows last June.

Prime Minister Wins Vote of Confidence

LONDON, Jan. 19 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill won a 340 to 7 vote of confidence in Britain's interventionist policy today after Foreign Secretary Eden announced that President Roosevelt and Premier Stalin would be asked to join in creating immediate international machinery for dealing with problems arising in liberated lands.

Eden disclosed that the appeal for creation of machinery with teeth in it to deal quickly with international political problems would be laid before the forthcoming "big three" meeting.

Yanks Cut Off German Forces In Strasbourg, Drive to Zorn River

Allies Use Combined Tactics in Breakdown Around Western Front Battlements As Germans Rush Reinforcements

PARIS, Jan. 19 (AP)—The U.S. seventh army struck back today at German forces north of imperiled Strasbourg, where the enemy earlier in the day massed 10,000 troops, broke from the Rhine bridgehead and joined up with other forces farther north on a solid 75-mile front.

Fighter bombers ripped into enemy armor and doughboys drove the Germans back across the Zorn river some nine miles north of the Alsatian capital.

Other American blows drove east, over on the front in a combined effort to keep the Germans from out-flanking all American positions in northeastern France.

Fiercy Western Front

Virtually all the 300-mile western front was afire. Allied and German armies raced to see which could get their stalled offensives rolling first in these critical winter months when Germany is faced with crushing blows from east and west.

The British second army in a two-mile sweep all but cut off the German panhandle north of Aachen, overran seven or more towns and was storming the western ramparts of the Reich and closing on the Roer river line some 33 miles west of industrial Dusseldorf on the Rhine.

St. Vith Near Yank Troops
The U. S. first army, slashing through the wind-driven snow as much as two miles along a 40-mile front, had closed to within four miles of St. Vith—the way out of the now-shattered Ardennes Salient—from the west as well as north.

State Board Appoints New Instructors to Basic College Staff

Two new appointments on the Basic College staff were made Thursday by the State Board of Agriculture, Dean Rather announced yesterday. Hugo O. Engleman, new instructor in social science, is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin where he also took his graduate work.
He will begin teaching February 1, when the Basic courses in social science and written and spoken English will be started again for the new group of students who are just completing high school.
Roscoe Paker has been appointed instructor in history of civilization and Basic College counselor. Baker, who for the past two years has been a lieutenant in the United States navy, has taken graduate work at Ohio State, Michigan State, and the University of London, England.

Course Numbers Explained At Last

Students who were confused after spending two hours registering to discover they had 102a's or two 21B's, in different buildings on campus, probably wondered what system, if any, was used for numbering the courses of Michigan State college.
According to Kermit Smith, assistant registrar, all course numbers are governed by a few general rules.
The first numeral denotes the year the course is normally required: 1 for freshman, 2, sophomore, 3, junior, 4, senior; and 5, graduate. The last two numerals are the actual course number. Until 1927, when the year was added, only the last two numbers were used.
The course numbers for all departments are assigned by the registrar and his staff, to avoid duplication of numbers within a department, but the sequence of courses depends on the department head.
Some departments use 102a, 102b and 102c to designate a year's sequence of courses, others prefer 101, 102 and 103.

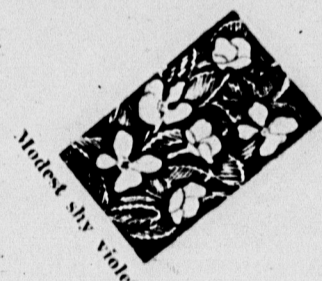

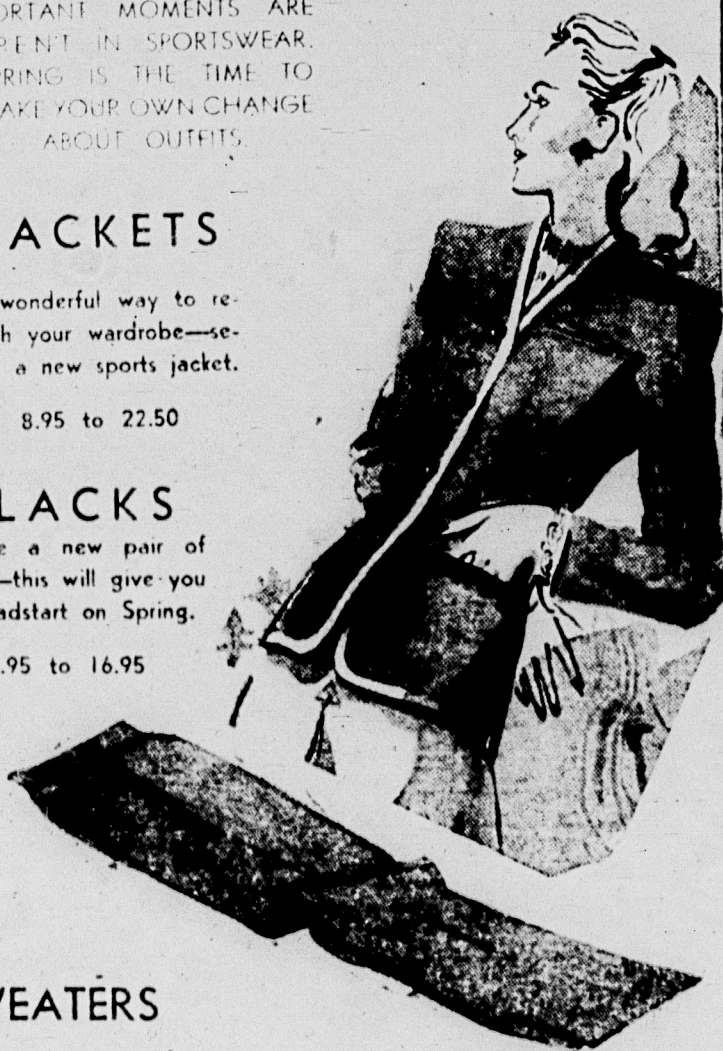

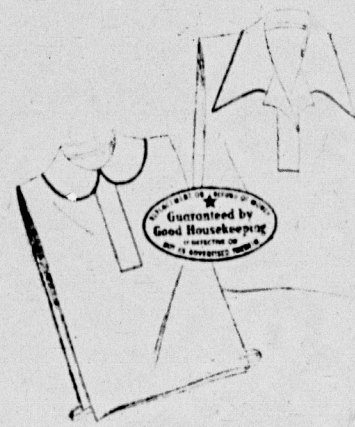
