### Soviet Army Unchecked By Nazis

### Two Million Germans Trapped by Reds in East Prussia

EAST LANSING, Saturday, Jan. 27 (AP)—The Soviet high command announced last night that the Red army had captured more than two million Germans in its two-week offensive, which was aimed at unchecked industrial cities in Silesia, reach the Free State from East Prussia with the Baltic coast.

The Nazi divisions, which had trapped two million Germans, now are being driven toward the Polish border. The Russians also have advanced 10 miles toward the city and spearhead units are only 10 miles from the city of Minska. This was the first approach to the Reich since the attack by the Soviets in 1944.

From the Russians only 20 miles from the frontier and 140 miles from the city of Minska, other units are moving toward the city. The Soviet forces were only 143 miles from the city.

The Russian offensive has caused the staggering losses of the Germans in the East. The offensive began at the Vistula river near Warsaw and

### General Reports Jap Shelling of Clark Field

MAC ARTHUR'S 10th Army, Saturday, Jan. 27 (AP)—Clark field, in American hands, being shelled by Japanese artillery, Gen. Douglas MacArthur reported today. "The enemy has brought up 100 mm. and is shelling the Clark field," MacArthur said in his country's communique. Clark field was captured early Thursday by the 40th U. S. division. It is the most highly developed aviation center in the Philippines.

### Wallace Receives Negative Vote From Senate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 (AP)—The senate commerce committee coldly rebuffed Henry A. Wallace today, voting 14 to 5 against his nomination as secretary of commerce and federal loan administrator.

The adverse report went to the Senate, where the nomination may be acted on early next week.

Critics of Wallace, contending the former vice president is without the experience necessary to handle the big lending agencies, are claiming 48 to 50 votes in the Senate enough to beat him.

The committee's decision after hearing the deposed Jesse Jones and Wallace himself amounts to this: it sends President Roosevelt's nomination to the Senate with a black mark against it. Similar actions in the past, however, have had varied receptions by the full body which sometimes back up its committees and sometimes overrules them.

At the same time, the commerce group decided, 15 to 4, to report out the bill of Senator George stripping the commerce department of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and all its subsidiary financing agencies.

Reverend Crickshank, born in Bogota, Columbia, South America, graduated from Wheaton his Bachelor of Divinity degree from the Presbyterian Theological seminary in Chicago. Recently he was the Religious Emphasis week leader at the University of Cincinnati and at Western college, Oxford, Ohio.

### American, British Armies Roll Toward Gateway of Industrial Ruhr Valley

PARIS, Jan. 26 (AP)—All German resistance collapsed today west of the Roer river system at the gateway to the prize Ruhr industrial valley as the U.S. ninth and British second armies—with 35 miles of the westwall behind them—seized assault positions only 25 miles from Dusseldorf.

The ninth broke a six-week lull and pushed to the Roer on a five-mile front as the U.S. seventh army far to the south threw a new German drive into reverse, erased all its northern Aisatian gains and lifted the threat to Strasbourg by driving the enemy back across the Moselle river.

By nightfall the fighting had dwindled to sporadic machine-gun and rifle fire along the entire 20-mile front. The U.S. first and third armies crushed virtually the last of the Aachen

### Symphony to Bring Brilliant Greek Conductor to Campus

Under the brilliant direction of Dimitri Mitropoulos, the Minneapolis Symphony orchestra, which will appear on campus Monday evening at 8 has placed itself among the 10 major symphony orchestras in the country.

When the orchestra's manager rode out to the east in 1937 and brought back Mitropoulos as permanent conductor, it was to the consternation of the eastern concert managers who were attempting to get Mitropoulos under contract to conduct the orchestra of the East in Minneapolis. The Greek conductor consented immediately.

Founded in 1901, the orchestra's annual tours were inaugurated seven years later. Since then it has given 2,644 concerts in 293 cities of the United States, Canada, and Cuba. This record amount of traveling has had an important influence in the creation of widespread interest in symphonic music.

When not on tour, the orchestra is housed at the Northrup Memorial auditorium in Minneapolis. It has a seating capacity of 1,341 people.

A preview and discussion of the music to be presented will be given by associate professor Gomer Jones, of the music faculty tomorrow afternoon at 4 in the Music auditorium. His talk, which is designed to create more enjoyment of the concert is open to the public.

The program for Monday's concert, which is the fourth number in the current lecture-concert series, will be as follows, according to Dean Crowe: Overture—Roman Carnival, op. 9 by Berlioz; Symphony in E Minor, in three movements. See—SYMPHONY—Page 4

### Superforts Bombard Japanese Indo-China

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 (AP)—Superfortresses of the 20th air force attacked military installations in Japanese-occupied Indo-China today, General of the Army H. H. Arnold, commanding general of the 20th air force announced in Washington.

Operating from India bases of Bhamo, Gen. Roger M. Ramey's 20th bomber command five B-29 force struck at Japanese targets in the enemy-occupied territory.

### American Planes Bomb Singapore, Peiping Airfields

NEW YORK, Jan. 26 (AP)—A Tokyo broadcast, picked up by the Blue network, quoted Premier Kuniaki Kono as advising the Japanese diet that many weapons and industries already had gone underground to escape Allied bombardment.

Force lightning raged in China's southwestern provinces where the Japanese are attempting to seize the last Chinese-held section of the Canton-Hankow railway. American planes blasted newly discovered Peiping airfields. In addition, four north China base airfields, including two in central China, they probably wrecked six others and damaged two. Three American planes were reported missing.

Radio Tokyo said several American Superfortresses attacked Singapore, but claimed there was no damage. In Burma, the Japanese line of retreat was being smashed by Allied forces. They wrecked at least nine bridges and bombed supply dumps especially around Mandalay. British ground forces, moving for Mandalay, apparently marked time while the airmen went to work on communications in the Japanese rear.

# Japs Show Signs Of Luzon Fight

GENERAL MAC ARTHUR'S HIDE-OUT IN LUZON Saturday, Jan. 10. (AP) Lt. Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita's Japanese forces on Luzon showed their first signs of a fight in the central plains section south of the Bamban River Friday and Japanese artillery also opened up on American-occupied Clark Field air center.

Today's communiqué reported no appreciable gains anywhere on Luzon as the enemy maintained his bitter resistance against the U. S. First Army corps on the hot track. This resistance has been almost constant since the Jan. 8 invasion.

But the 11th Air Corps, whose headquarters yesterday were reported to be at Angeles, a little more than 40 miles to the south of Manila, got its first real taste of organized opposition after easily passing two natural enemy defense lines along the Agno and the Bamban.
