News in Brief

DETROIT, Feb. 8 (AP)—Elements of three British bomber columns closing in on the city beat off Japanese attacks today while supplies for a general assault on the great river port were drawn up along a front line.

PROGRESSIVE, Feb. 8 (AP)—Progressive groups are drawing the Germans from their strong defensive positions in the mountains south of the Rhine. The spring faded ambitions with the official announcement that a three-day attack by the U.S. fifth army in the West has been halted.

EAST LANSING, Feb. 8 (AP)—The city is in progress between Chinese and Japanese forces about six miles south of the constant Wolfram mine. The Chinese, toward which the Japanese headed after capturing the American air base at Nanking in Kwangtung province. The Chinese high command announced tonight.

LONDON, Feb. 8 (AP)—The British cabinet resigned today and Winston Churchill immediately named Premier Pieter van Rooy to form a new government unopposed to include leaders of the anti-Nazi resistance movement.

U.S. PACIFIC FLEET HDQ., Pearl Harbor, Feb. 9 (AP)—Army Liberators bombed two Japanese islands in the Tokai area south of Tokyo for the 62nd and 63rd consecutive times on Tuesday and Wednesday, Adm. Chester W. Nimitz announced today.

The ship is midway on the Supermarine route from Saipan to Tokyo.

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 8 (AP)—Karl Marthinussen, Norway's state security police chief appointed by Premier Vidkun Quisling, was shot from ambush as he tried to take office this morning. He was announced officially in the morning.

WITH THE 29th DIVISION IN GERMANY, Feb. 8 (AP)—The division took a Jerry position when they were so close to the German lines that shooting would have meant them under direct fire. Members of Company A, 10th Infantry, stretched an old rope between two trees and pulled grenades slingshot fashion. It worked.

Bombers Hit Berlin's State Opera House

LONDON, Feb. 8 (AP)—The German news agency DNE told the Germans tonight that Berlin's center felt the full force of Saturday's daylight raid by U. S. heavy bombers and that "the castle, a monument of Berlin and probably one of its most ancient buildings, is completely burned out."

The report said direct hits inflicted heavy damage on the Berlin State Opera house and asserted "it may give satisfaction to British and American men of culture to have inflicted such wounds on us."

Churchill Rejects Offer of Alliance Against Russians

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8 (AP)—Flat rejection by Prime Minister Churchill of any idea of a combine against Russian helped clear the air for the current big three meeting.

The point came up specifically in a proposal from the Spanish dictator, Francisco Franco, for a western European alliance against the Soviet Union.

Churchill turned him down bluntly, it was learned here, and went far beyond the immediate issue by making it entirely clear, in the view of authorities here, that British policy calls for co-operation with Russian and the United States toward a future peace. The Prime Minister nailed the point down by sending copies of the correspondence to President Roosevelt and Marshal Stalin.

The gesture by Franco, longtime friend and virtual ally of Hitler, included an offer of his services as mediator between the Allies and their enemies—in a word, Franco was willing to help negotiate a peace.

Churchill was interested. Churchill turned that proposal down not as bluntly.

The effort by Franco to salvage something of his political future from the wreckage of Nazi Europe was made last November.

The sharp reply from Churchill, who spoke "kindly words" about Spain in a speech earlier in 1944 left no doubt that the British government looks with little warmth upon the present regime at Madrid.

Baltic Hit

LONDON, Feb. 8 (AP)—Allied warplanes kept up their widespread attacks on the enemy today and tonight with a series of strikes into Denmark, Holland, Austria and Germany itself.

All Associated Press dispatches from Stockholm said Allied bombers pounded the harbor at Copenhagen, Denmark, shortly after midnight tonight in a blow presumably directed at light units of the German Baltic fleet which have been reported there.

The German radio said other Allied bombers were over Pomerania tonight in small formations, probably indicating an RAF attack on German targets lying in front of Marshal Gregory K. Zhukov's first White Russian army.

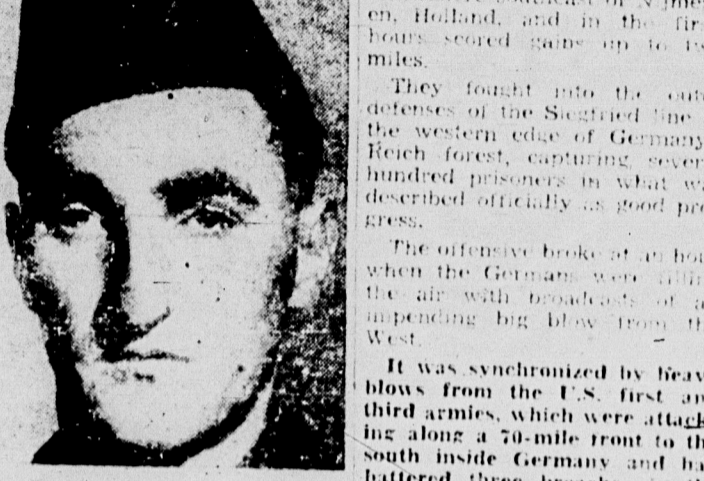
V-2 installation in Holland—the launching and supply site for German rocket weapons which are still harassing southern England—were attacked in daylight by RAF fighter-bombers. Several direct hits were made despite severe flak.

Montgomery Sends Men Into Reich Forest As Outer Siegfried Defenses Crumble Under Crushing Surprise Blow

PARIS, Feb. 9 (AP)—British and Canadian divisions of the Canadian first army launched a grand-scale offensive yesterday with tremendous artillery and aerial support on the northern end of the Western front in what may be the final round of the battle for Germany.

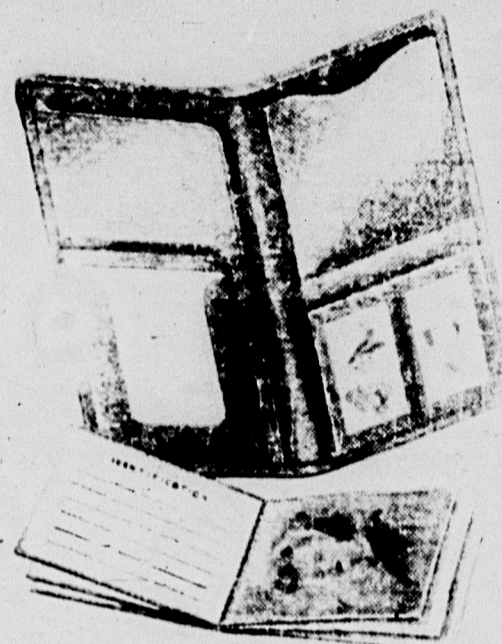

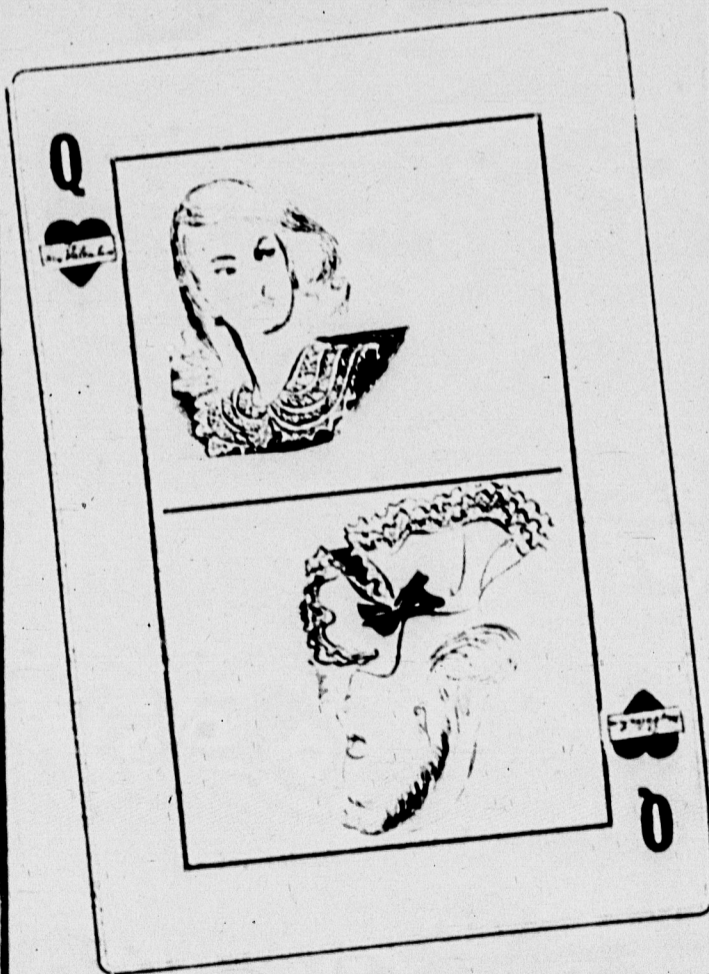

Nips Push Back Into Foothills Around Luzon

Yanks Use Pontoon Float to Cross Pasig River at Malacanan Palace

MANILA, Feb. 9 (AP)—Yanks of the 37th infantry division have crossed the bridgeless Pasig river to subvert Manila and are the 11th airborne division up the remaining Japanese defenders of the Philippines.

Douglas MacArthur said in a communique today the advance made in the vicinity of Malacanan palace, the Pasig's bridge, by the desperate enemy, must have crossed pontoon bridges.

The 10th airborne troop landed in the southern suburbs of Manila a trap on Malacanan defenders.

Three More Towns Taken
The southern part of the metropolitan Manila, MacArthur's forces captured the towns of Alibon, Rizal and Lungsod, pushing the Japanese into the foothills.

The general reported that the Japanese had been driven from both personnel and equipment in this stubbornly defended area.

Nip Units Wiped Out
MacArthur said more than 200 Japanese of the second Japanese division were wiped out in the vicinity of its striking force and been wiped out. The remaining elements are being driven out of the area.

General MacArthur said the total Japanese personnel in Manila at 48,000 for Luzon campaign.

Operator bombs point to a heavy load on the Pasig river at the Manila Bay where the Japanese may be seeking to establish defense positions. The area is being shelled with large fires.

Individual winners for the 30 yard crawl were Juana Hibbs, Chi Omega, timed in 1:16 seconds, and Doris Pick, Alpha Chi Omega, in 1:18 seconds.

Taking the honors for breast stroke races were Jo Johnson, Kappa Kappa Gamma, and Marilyn Seabury, Chi Omega. Jean Proctor, swimming for Chi Omega, placed first in the 30 yard back crawl timed in 2:18 seconds, defeating Marjorie Wood, Kappa Kappa Gamma, in 2:42. Seabury won the 50 yard back crawl in 4:18. Independent and Joyce Seay, of East Mayo.

In the 30 yard front stroke, Miss Johnson beat the swimming time in 26.2 seconds, followed by Miss Seabury in 27 seconds.

Phi Phi Ruth, Delta, placed first in the 100 yard crawl, followed by Miss Proctor, Miss Pick in 2:09 seconds, defeated Alpha Chi Omega in the 100 yard race style.

Swimming the 30 yard race, Proctor placed up

points for Chi Omega timed in 22.4 seconds followed by Kappa Carolyn French, in 23.2 seconds. Back crawl form winners were Miss Johnson and Miss Proctor. Diving honors were awarded to Ginny Collins, Alpha Phi, and Sally Gering, Kappa Kappa Gamma.

Chalking up the winning points for Chi Omega in the meet were swimmers Hibbs, Seabury and Proctor.

Oder River Crossed by Reds As Tanks Move Nearer Panic Stricken German Capital

Nazis Claim Russian Encirclement of Kuestrin

LONDON, Feb. 8 (AP)—Russian troops drove a new spearhead within 38 miles of Berlin's Baltic port of Stettin today as the Germans reported that Soviet shock units had expanded six bridgeheads across the Oder river 30 to 443 miles from the imperiled Reich capital.

The Soviet communique was silent on the great battle roaring at Berlin's outer gates, but the Moscow radio declared, "the Oder line has been pierced and Berlin in panic is witnessing the crumbling of the last obstacle in its forefield."

Kuestrin Encircled

German broadcasts said the Oder stronghold of Kuestrin had been encircled temporarily, told of Red army crossings on both sides of Kuestrin, Frankfurt and Fuerstenberg on a 40-mile front, and said there was "house-to-house fighting" at Pyritz and Arnswalde, 22 and 38 miles southeast of Stettin at the mouth of the Oder.

One Finish broadcast recorded by the BBC said, "Russian tanks have probed to the outskirts of Berlin," and a German-language broadcast from Moscow said Soviet units were "now only some dozen kilometers from burning Berlin according to front line reports."

Twelve kilometers is seven and one-half miles.

Reich Capital Endangered

Berlin's danger further was emphasized in a German front report that the Russians had shoved a great many of their powerful T-34 tanks across the Oder.

Striking toward Stettin on an 18-mile front southeast of the big communications center at Stargard the Russians were declared officially to have captured Reetz, 21 miles east-southeast of Stettin, and Bernstein, 39 miles southeast of Stettin.

100 Locations Taken

Between Reetz and Bernstein the Russians swept up more than 100 other Pomeranian localities in their effort to reach Stettin and seal off 13,500 square miles of German Pomerania, the Polish corridor and Danzig.

More than 1,800 prisoners were taken Wednesday Moscow announced (in a broad movement aimed at sealing off scores of thousands of Germans in north-eastern Germany and lessening the danger of a Nazi flanking attack against Zhukov's columns battling toward Berlin.)

In Silesia the first Ukraine army under Marshal Ivan S. Konev gained up to four miles in the westward expansion of its bridgehead between Breslau and Oppeln, lower and upper Silesian capitals.

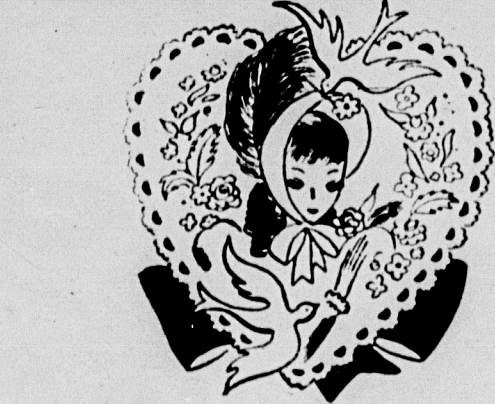
Donaghho attended the University of Hawaii. The most outstanding feature of classes is the American-born representation of a great number of nationalities, he said.
