Monty Grinds To Southeast Toward Ruhr

Bombs, Bullets, Rockets
Prepare Way for
Canadian Army

PARIS, Feb. 16 (AP) — A roaming battle raged today on a 10-mile front south and east of Kleve, where Field Morshal Mc teomery's offensive crunched southeastward yard by yard into a strongly-reinforced German line standing between his forces and the rich Ruhr and Rhineland.

Over a battlefield where hunareds of big guns blazed, swarms of Allied warplanes attacked with bombs, bullets and rockets, trying to knock the Germans from rising ground before the three strategic road networks of Goch, Uedem and Cal-

The Canadian first army—now disclosed to be made up of 75 per cent British forces—was about two miles from Calcar, five miles from Ueden and two and a half miles from Goch. More Allied tanks were joining the bruising struggles as the ground firmed underneath.

German civilians, men, women and children, streamed from the battle zone, seeking safety behind the Allied lines.

Scottish infantry driving east and gaining nearly a mile were attacking bitterly defended heights south of Moyland, possibly within two miles of Calcar and 17 from Wesel at the gateway to the industrial Ruhr valley.
