### No Third War, Goering Says; Hitler Dead

AUGSBURG, GERMANY, May 11 (AP)—Shifty-eyed and perspiring, Hermann Goering, who faces the prospect of answering war crimes charges, declared today that for the Germans "there will be no third war in this century—everyone wants peace."

His puffy cheeks reddening under a hot sun, Goering unceremoniously faced a battery of war correspondents and gave his version, at least, of what had occurred in the Nazi hierarchy during the war years.

The Japanese attack on the American fleet at Pearl Harbor came as a complete surprise to the German high command, the captured Reichsmarshal said.

Declaring that he was satisfied that Adolf Hitler was dead, Goering claimed that Martin Bormann, deputy Nazi party leader named Grand Admiral Karl Doenitz as Hitler's successor and added, "Hitler did not leave a thing in writing saying that Doenitz was to take his place."

Goering answered with a powerful affirmative when asked if Hitler personally was responsible for the conduct of the SS and the Gestapo and the manner in which German concentration camps were run.

### Comprehensives Cause Study Nightmares

### American Planes Sow Mines in Jap Harbors

B-29s Hammer Interior Of Island in Continuous Devastating Attacks

MANILA, May 12 (AP)—Strong elements of the U.S. 40th division have made a landing on the north coast of Mindanao island in a new move to entrap the principal Japanese force remaining in the southern Philippines.

This was the third landing on Mindanao to be made by American forces. In announcing the operation, Gen. Douglas MacArthur said today it had landed in the rear of an enemy force and caught it out of position.

GUAM, May 12 (AP)—A American superforts are sowing Japan's harbors and inland sea with mines in a gigantic operation to disorganize Nippon's shipping while fleets of B-29s hammer the enemy's homeland factories and airfields.

**Based on Marianas**

The big bombers spanned the sea from their Marianas islands bases yesterday in three attacks on the empire islands, hitting a vital seaplane factory in the Kobe area on Honshu island and airfields on Kyushu.

May, Gen. Curtis E. LeMay, commander of the 21st bomber command, said the Superforts started on March 27th the first attempt in military history to lock a maritime nation in a complete aerial mine blockade.

**Planted Mines in Tokyo**

The B-29s, each carrying around 10 tons of mines, in nearly a dozen missions have planted the explosives in the inland sea and the harbors of Tokyo, Nagoya and other major Japanese cities.

Operations to plant the mines and maintain a close reconnaissance, to replace explosives swept up by the Japanese, are directed by Brig. Gen. John H. Davies of Piedmont, Calif., with the cooperation of the navy which supplies the mines.

### Concert Will Feature 'Victory Rhapsody'

As part of tomorrow's carillon concert, Dennis Murphy, Jackson, Ill., sophomore, will play "Victory Rhapsody," written by Percy Price, professor of composition and university carillonneur at the University of Michigan.

First played this week by carillons throughout the world to celebrate the cessation of hostilities and the liberation of carillons in Europe, the composition has been arranged in two versions, one for small carillons and one for large.

The "Victory Rhapsody" for small carillons will conclude Murphy's program of hymns for praise and for peace tomorrow at 3:30 p.m.

## U.S. Army Captures Jap, Nazi Personnel

WITH THE U. S. SEVENTH ARMY, May 11 (AP)—Japanese ambassador to Germany Hiroshi Oshima and 130 Japanese diplomatic personnel have been arrested by seventh army troops.

With the Japanese at the time they were captured were nearly 200 German ministerial personnel, including top-ranking Nazis.

In the latter group were Dr. Walther Funk, president of the Reichsbank and minister of economics, Dr. Hans Heinrich Lammers, chief of the Reichschancellery, and Dr. Wilhelm Ohnesorge, postmaster general.

The brief announcement did not say where the roundup took place.

## 'Ike' Says Two Campaigns Enough

PARIS, May 11 (AP)—American combat soldiers who have fought in both Europe and North Africa will not be sent to the Pacific war zone on orders from General Eisenhower, it was revealed tonight.

In a letter to generals of his command today, General Eisenhower said: "We must be sure that no soldier is sent to the

Pacific who has fought in North Africa and Europe. It may be that some soldiers in this category will not have sufficient points to be eligible for discharge.

"However, these men should be retained in the European theater for occupation duties should not be required to start another campaign," General Eisenhower said.

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# Seven Colleges Enter Track Meet

## Top Men Compete in Broad Jump; Price Will Run Distance Events In First Meet Since 1943

Trackmen from seven Michigan colleges will gather today on State's outdoor track for the running of the first State Intercollegiate track and field meet since 1943. The field events of the meet will start at 1:45 p.m. and the track events at 2 p.m.

The closest competition in the meet is expected to be in the broad jump, where three of the top men in the state entered: Lorenzo Wright of Wayne university, Wayne Finkbeiner of MSC, and Ralph Wellman of Western Michigan.

All of these men are capable of leaping over 22 feet. Wright, Wayne's triple threat, placed first in the broad jump at the Drake relays three weeks ago.

In the 120 yard high hurdles, Wright will again appear, along with Bill Porter from Western Michigan. These are two of the foremost hurdlers in the area.

The most important of all the track events will be the mile relay with Michigan State, Wayne university, and Western Michigan all rated equal in strength. Spartans will pin their hopes on

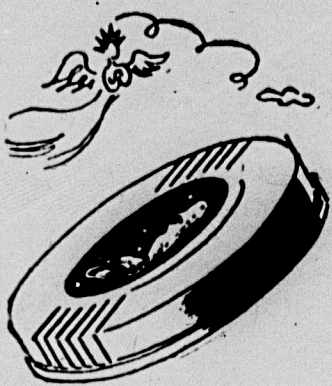

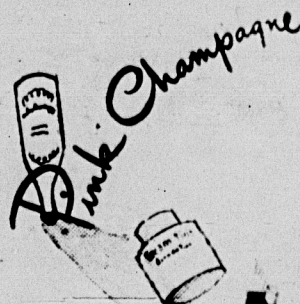

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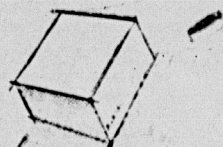
