Registrations Surpass Last Year; Nearly Hit All-Time Record of 1942

Enrollment Numbers 882 Women, With 733 Men; Teachers, High School Senior Students Also Included in Groups Taking Courses

Latest registration figures show that 1,615 students have enrolled for the Michigan State summer session, representing an increase of approximately 150 students over last year's summer school total. Of the total figure as it stands, eight hundred and eighty-two are women and seven hundred and thirty-three are men.

Late registration will bring the total in the 1945 summer session near to the all-time high record established in 1942, when 2,000 enrolled for summer session.

This summer, the student body is partly composed of June high school graduates who wish to take advantage of the advanced system of getting their high school degrees, and still take college credits.

Other enrollees include teachers taking refresher courses, and regular members of the student enrollment who are completing work in the accelerated war time program begun at Michigan State three years ago.

47 Students Receive All-A Averages

According to Robert S. Linton, registrar, 43 women and four men students completed their course of studies spring term with an all A average.

Board Accepts Appointments Of New Faculty Members

13 Appointments Made at Monthly Meeting; Mannheim, Dr. Schoff Leave Staff; Roswell Carr Retired from College

Thirteen appointments were approved at the monthly meeting of the State board of agriculture June 21. Other actions at the meeting included promotions, leaves of absence, resignations, retirements, and gifts.

Harold B. Strahan has been

named as head of the department of textiles, clothing and related arts. She has been with the college since 1934 and is a graduate of the University of Chicago and the teaching department of New York University.

Other new appointments include Helen C. Smucker as associate professor of social science in the Basic College. He is now an instructor at Stephens college, Columbia, Mo.

New Faculty Members

Paul Schoff, concert pianist and composer, will be an assistant professor of literature and music. Judson T. Landis, now

at the Southern Illinois Normal university, will become an associate professor of effective living in the Basic college.

Formerly a staff member of the University of Missouri, William B. Drew will become associate professor of botany, and Louis C. Knorr will take over the work of J. H. Muncie in the same department. Knorr, who received his Ph. D. at Cornell this spring, will be extension assistant, and Muncie has been named research professor of botany.

Alan Scott, who has spent the past three years in San Francisco and New York doing radio scripts for the OWI, will become assistant professor of journalism.

More Appointments

The Board also approved the appointments of Shirley Newson as assistant professor of home management and child development, Kirkpatrick Lawson, as assistant professor and research professor in soil science, and Richard R. Myers, as assistant professor of sociology and anthropology.

Clarence D. Haase, associate professor of physics and astronomy, George F. Parsons, extension specialist in dairy, and Harold B. Pymusky, as assistant professor of the newly established institute of counseling, testing and guidance, will become other MSU staff members.

Promotions were announced for Evelyn Mansfield, from assistant professor to associate professor of textiles, clothing and related arts, C. A. Miller, from assistant professor to associate professor of civil engineering, while Orion Uley has been reinstated as associate professor and research associate in economics after a year with the state adult education program.

Leaves Granted
Richard Johnson, research assistant in forestry, and J. H. Brown, research assistant in farm management, were granted leaves of absence.

Resignations were accepted at this meeting from Dr. Charles A. Schoff, assistant physician at Olin memorial hospital, and Frank Mannheim, professor of music. Mannheim has been on leave since June, 1944, to appear in concerts, and will continue to do this work.

Roswell J. Carr, with the college extension service since 1914, will retire as of July 1 to work with the Farm Security administration.

The board also accepted a total of \$3,535 in gifts.

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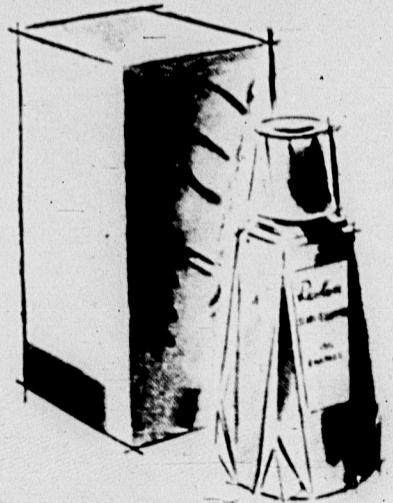
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
