MSC Promised New Buildings Immediately

State to Add Four More Men's, Women's Dorms, Plus Union Addition

Five new dormitories, additions to the Union building and a food storage warehouse are included in the plans for MSC improvement which will begin as soon as labor and materials are available. Pres. John A. Hannah announced recently.

Using the sale of self-liquidating bonds for funds on the construction, Pres. Hannah said that the land now occupied by the U. S. weather bureau station between Williams and Mayo will be used for one of the three dorms to be built for women, if the bill of sale presented by Senator Homer Ferguson to congress is accepted.

New Station Proposed

The bill, submitted last week, acted to authorize the secretary of commerce to sell to college this land, and also provide for another piece of property and a new building for the weather station.

Comprehensives Show Success of Basic

Basic college is here to stay. This has been proven by the successful grades made on the comprehensives. Approximately 83 percent of the students received marks of C or better and less than 2 percent failed on these tests. Physical science recorded the most F's, 3.4 percent while written and spoken English had the least, 1.1 percent. On an average the seven basic courses showed 7 percent A's, 25 percent B's, 50 percent C's and 15 percent D's.

158 students took the comprehensives without taking the three terms of work. Their averages came out higher than the ones completing the three terms. Any person who takes the exam without finishing the year's work

Counsel Group Plan Two-Day Conference

Using as their main theme "Improving Guidance, Counseling and Personnel Services," the guidance committee of the education department will sponsor a two-day conference for guidance, personnel and counseling workers in Michigan, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Emphasizing chiefly the work to be done with veterans, the program will open at 10 a.m. in Fairchild theater under the direction of C. V. Millard, head of the education department and chairman of the conference that day.

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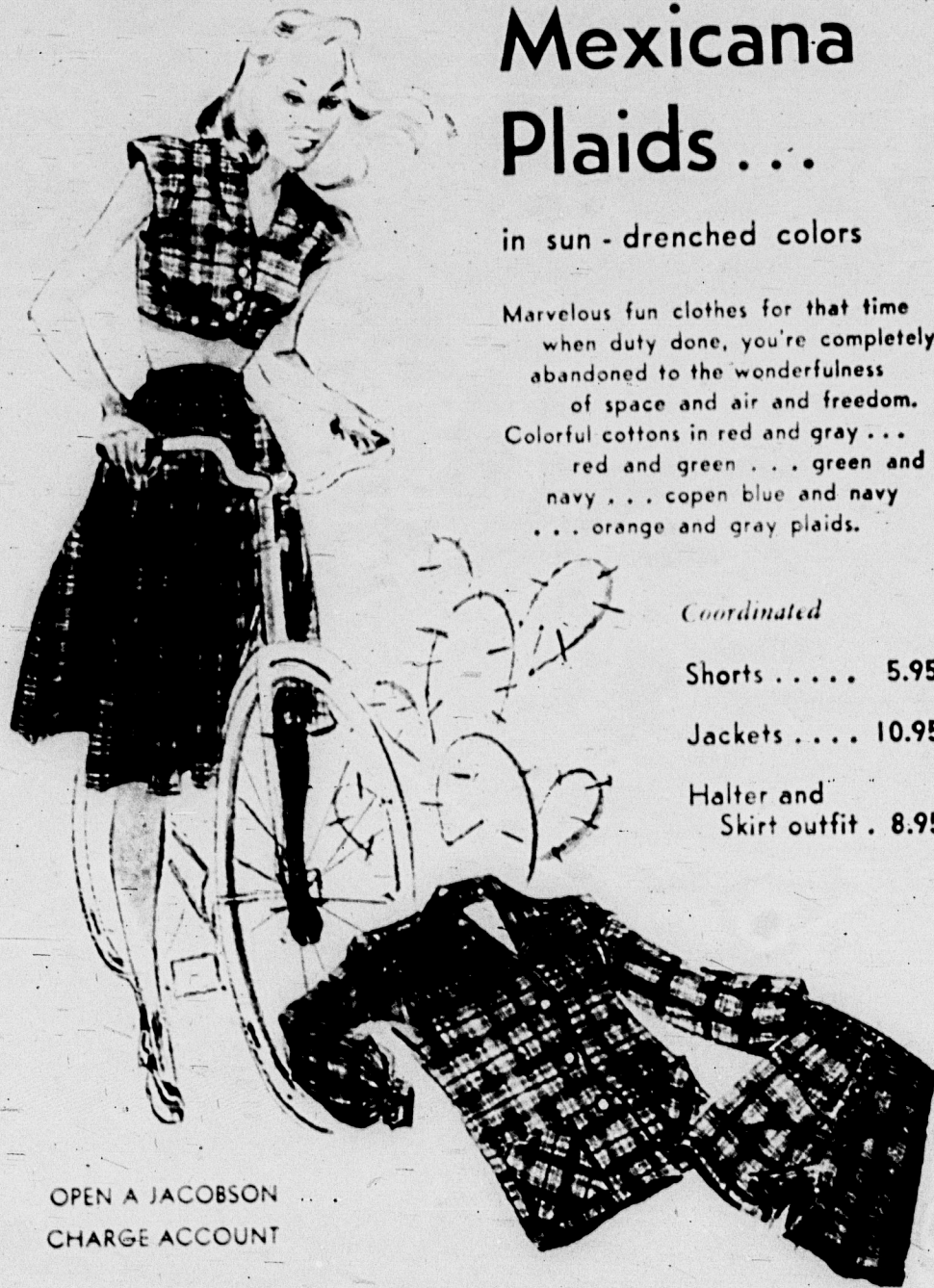
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
