## Big 10 Title Share Guaranteed Winner

### Conference's Top Pivot Men To Meet Before Sellout Crowd

One of the biggest cage games in Michigan State history takes place Saturday night when the Spartans clash with Indiana in Jenison Fieldhouse at 8.

To the winner goes an assured tie for the Big 10 title and, should State win, representation in the NCAA championships. Indiana must win to retain any hope of going to the NCAA tournament, since the Spartans would go in case of a tie.

Ohio State has an outside chance at a conference tie but is ineligible for any post-season tournaments due to an NCAA probation.

A sellout crowd of better than 11,500 fans is expected to watch the battle between the two teams currently tied for the top spot. All reserved seats have been sold out for a week.

Michigan State will be putting its nine-game winning streak on the line Saturday. Indiana had a seven-game string stopped Monday at Ann Arbor.

The game will pit the Big 10's two top centers against each other in John Green and Archie Dees.

Green would easily qualify for "rookie of the year" honors if such an award were given. In addition to averaging 13 points a game, he is one of the best defensive men in the loop, and also one of its top rebounders.

Dees is way ahead in Big 10 scoring with a 25.2 average. The 6'8" center tied a Yost Fieldhouse record Monday by dropping in 39 points in the Hoosiers' losing effort to Michigan.

Indiana also possesses the top shooter in the conference in forward Dick Neal. A bench-warmer in his first two years, Neal has come on to hit for a .528 mark thus far and may possibly top the Big 10 record.

Three seniors will be making their final home appearance for the Spartans, including starters Pat Wilson and Capt. George Ferguson. The third is Harry Lux.

Coach Fordy Anderson will rehash the importance of Saturday's game, but is taking the same attitude he does for all other contests.

"This is the toughest," Anderson commented. "But it's another ball game on our schedule. We've given the squad some needed rest this week and we should be in fine condition."

Doors will open at 6:30 Saturday evening, and students are advised to show up as early as possible to avoid a last-minute jam.

Michigan State closes out its most successful season in more than a decade Monday night at Ann Arbor against Michigan.

## Senate Investigating Committee Quiz Gambler in Labor Probe

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Portland, Ore., gambler, who said he once had the inside track with the Teamsters Union there, testified Thursday that a rival paid \$10,000 or more to get back in the union's good graces.

This payment, James H. Elkins, told a special Senate Investigating Committee, spoiled his plan to get a \$250,000 a year monopoly in the pinball business in Oregon.

Elkins testified that the money was paid by Stanley Terry, a Portland pinball operator, to Frank W. Brewster of Seattle, head of the 11-state western conference of the Teamsters Union.

Elkins testimony topped a busy day in which the committee:

1. Ordered contempt of Congress proceedings against Frank Malloy, a Portland Teamsters official, for refusing to answer questions about violence and racketeering in the Oregon city.
2. Heard from Stanley W. Earl, a Portland city commissioner, that the union opposed his election in 1956 because he refused to support an ordinance to license pinball machines.
3. Was told by Elkins that a pinball company he said was organized with the help of gamblers, and protected by the union would have returned "fantastic" profits if it had ever got operating.

The senators brought out during the questioning of witnesses that only pinball machines bearing the Teamsters Union sticker could operate successfully in Portland. Business played using "non-union" machines, the witnesses said, were picketed by the union and had their deliveries of beer, bread and other supplies cut off.

## WKAR-TV Hosts Hope Musicians

The Hope College Symphony will make its television debut on WKAR-TV's "Fields Ajar" program at 8:30 p.m. today.

The Holland musical group, directed by Dr. Morette Rider, will perform "Overture to a Costume Comedy," written by English composer Stanley Black in 1955, and Ralph Vaughn Williams' "English Folk Song Suite."

Pianist Anthony Kosker, who made his New York Town Hall debut in 1954, is to play the "Ballade for Piano and Orchestra" by Gabriel Faure, a pioneer impressionistic work.

The Hope College Symphony was formed in 1954 under the direction of Dr. Rider. It has played more than 50 concerts in 11 states and Canada. Its 27 members are selected from the larger Hope College Orchestra. The group has received wide recognition in midwestern newspapers and professional music journals.

Dr. Rider, a graduate of University of Michigan and Columbia University, has studied under such celebrated conductors as Pierre Monteux, Thor Johnson and Leonard Bernstein. He is director of instrumental music at Hope College.

## UMOC Contest Wins Approval

The Faculty Committee on Student Affairs has approved the revised version of the Ugiest Man on Campus contest. The contest, sponsored by Alpha Phi Omega, national honor fraternity, has already been approved by Panfil and Women's Inter-Resident Hall.

Candidates for the "Ugiest" title are nominated by women's living units. Contrary to previous contests, the winner will not be determined by the highest amount of money collected as votes. The contest was not run last year.

The contest, to be held during spring term, will begin April 15 and end with the UMOC dance on the 27. Details of the contest and dance are being worked out and will be announced later, according to Chuck Leider, APO president.

## Sessions Start This Summer Jazz 'Cats' to Attend School

Jazz, has just passed another milestone which may well break down the medium's few remaining barriers.

The new development, The School of Jazz, starts its first session this summer at the Berkshire Music Barn in Lenox, Mass. The School of Jazz is being incorporated as a non-profit organization and is located next to Tanglemood, home of the Boston Symphony summer festival and school.

Enrollment requirements promise to be "stiff," so qualified students become the elite. Applying musicians will have to pass auditions or submit attested tapes or recordings to qualify for entrance. The three week session, beginning Aug. 12, limits enrollees to forty musicians and twenty auditors (non-playing musicians).

The rigorous instructive program includes rehearsal in both large and small ensembles, composition, arrangement and history of jazz. Each musician must take a minimum of two hours a week of individual instruction in his instrument. The number of students for each instrument will be strictly limited to obtain desirable balance.

School plans call for special demonstrations by musicians of differing schools of jazz and representative folk musicians from other parts of the world, in addition to the regular courses and jazz concerts scheduled at the Music Barn.

Also scheduled are talks by such "big names" in jazz as Tristano, Ellington, de Paris, Joachim Berendt, Norman Grantz, Langston Hughes, Willis James, George Russell and Gunther Schuller.

Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the School will be Philip Darber. Included on the Board are Down Beat editor Jac Tracy, trombonist J. J. Johnson, trumpet player John B. "Dizzy" Gillespie, drummer Max Roach, guitarist Herb Ellis, critic Barry Ulanov, pianist Oscar Peterson and bass Ray Brown.

The School of Jazz, Incorporated, is an outgrowth of the seven years of "Folk and Jazz Roundtables" held at Music Inn since 1950, at which panels of anthropologists, jazz historians, musicologists, folklorists and many of the top jazz musicians studied the origin and development of jazz.

## Diplomatic Source Discloses

### Israelis to Issue Statement to UN

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Israel will inform the General Assembly today that she will withdraw troops completely from Egypt and the Gaza Strip, a high diplomatic source reported Thursday night.

The source, who has been close to the negotiations, said Israel may include some qualifying assumptions in making the announcement. The informant did not specify what those would be.

He said Israel would announce the plans to pull out of the Gulf of Aqaba and Gaza in accordance with the General Assembly resolutions of Feb. 2.

The disclosure came after Israel informed the Assembly that it would make a statement today on the plans.

The Feb. 2 resolutions were sponsored by the United States and six other nations.

They provide that:

1. Both Israel and Egypt observe terms of the armistice and enforce recommendations of Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld for stationing UN emergency forces along the demarcation line.
2. Israel's sources Thursday would neither confirm nor deny the report.

Taking the floor when the 80-nation assembly resumed debate on the Middle East crisis after several postponements, Israeli deputy delegate, Mordecai R. Kidron made this short statement:

"In connection with the debate on the present item, the Israeli delegation will be in a position to make a statement on the Israeli plan for withdrawal at a meeting of the General Assembly tomorrow afternoon. I would be grateful if it can be arranged for Israel to make a statement at that time."

Kidron's announcement was reported by sources close to the delegation to mean Israel is preparing to pull her troops back from the Gulf of Aqaba and the Gaza Strip, seized when Israeli forces crossed the armistice demarcation line four months ago.

## Modern Mode To Highlight Union Decor

Geometric designs, mobiles and pillars in 3-D sculpture in the Union grill and concourse will set the stage for Union Board Week, "Suddenly — It's Modern," beginning Sunday.

Decorations will be in the primary colors of red, yellow, and blue. A board of directors mobile will be hung above the round table in the grill. A mural of pen and ink caricatures of UB members will also be displayed.

The first event of UB Week will be the judging of the art show at 3 p.m. Sunday. James McConnell of the art department staff will judge the paintings and handicraft submitted by MSU students.

First place winner will receive an engraved plaque, while ribbons will be awarded to second and third places. Work will be displayed all week in the Union lounge.

Winners will be announced at a coffee hour at 4:30 p.m. the day of the judging in Old College Hall. All interested persons are invited to attend. Students submitting entries are also urged to be present.

Special Events Day, Monday, will include a special, low cost dish served in the Grill by the UB board of directors and jet and automobile displays in the lounge and concourse.

Other attractions include a fashion show on Tuesday, jazz show on Wednesday, and variety show on Thursday. The night club style dance from 9-12 p.m. Friday will climax UB Week.

Tickets for the special Lecture-Concert performance of the Canadian Players, Ltd., will go on sale Monday in the Union ticket office. Cost is \$3.00 and \$2.50.

Two productions will be staged. On Monday, March 11, "Hamlet" will be presented while Ibsen's "Peer Gynt" is set for March 12.

The Canadian players will bring an unusual theatrical technique to the campus called "the bare bones of play acting." Stripped to its essentials, all efforts go into the acting.

There are no stage settings and only a handful of props vital to the action. The players wear modern clothes.

# Indonesians Store Weapons: Hussein

## Dissidents May Plan Rebellion

### Red Infiltration Could Set Spark

SINGAPORE (AP) — Millions of dollars worth of arms have been stored for a rebellion against President Sukarno if Communists are brought into the Indonesian government, an Indonesian Moslem leader claims.

Col. A. Hussein warned that Indonesian dissidents who engineered coups in Sumatra recently would attempt the same thing in Java unless Sukarno drops his plan for including Communists in government.

Hussein was interviewed here before he and his six-man party returned to Sumatra. They had been in Malaya for several weeks.

Hussein said anti-Communist agents from Indonesia purchased the arms, including automatic weapons, through Malaya some time ago and stored them in a safe place.

He said Moslem parties in Java would give notice to Sukarno that they are against the Communists. If the notice is ignored, he said, the armed rebellion should take place sometime in March.

"Thousands of Indonesians are prepared for what is coming," Hussein declared. "If we survive the insurrection it would mean the mass arrests of Sukarno and his supporters. If we fail we will have died in the creation of an Islamic country."

With Indonesia tottering on the brink of economic collapse, Sukarno, the island republic's most popular leader, has proposed what he calls a new conception of government to handle the crisis. This would place the reins of government in an all-party — including Communists — national advisory council, with veto power over the government and parliament. Sukarno would head the council.

Opposing this idea, Hussein said:

"This pattern is the same one that has been in force in Russia and the people of Indonesia, who are 90 per cent Moslem, will oppose it."

International students will be entertained at a family dinner this evening by the young adult class of the East Lansing Trinity Church.

The young adult class, composed of MSU married students, is hosting the dinner to introduce international students to the Rev. Oliver Hsu, of China, now traveling throughout the United States.

Following the dinner, which will begin at 6:30 at the John Olmstead campus residence, there will be group singing. International students and Hsu will hold an informal discussion following a talk by the former Chinese minister.

## Position Open On Traffic Court

## Construction Begins Friday

### Spartacade Regulations Announced

At an organization meeting Thursday of Spartacade living unit chairman, the following rules and regulations were discussed and verified, according to Chuck Walther, staging and planning chairman.

Distribution of equipment for construction on living unit projects will begin Friday, March 8, at 1 p.m. Reserve equipment must be picked up by 2 p.m. Saturday, March 9, after which it will be given out on a first come, first serve basis.

All living units who have not turned in their equipment requisition slips necessary for table

tops and platform horses are asked to contact Chuck Walther at ED 2-5440.

Two persons from each living unit will be authorized to get equipment. They must register their name and student number on the Spartacade petition and show their ID cards when picking up equipment.

Approximate floor area will be 16 feet, a depth of 22 feet and a maximum height of 20 feet from the floor. For events using stages, an additional five feet in depth may be allowed at the discretion of the staging committee.

Each event will be allowed a temporary driving permit from the campus police to park in

the Field House area during construction. This period will start at 6 p.m. Friday night and close at 5 p.m. Sunday afternoon. An advance list of those who need permits is necessary, and the permits must be picked up prior to Spartacade.

The cost of each event shall not exceed \$70.00. Equipment must be returned by 1 p.m. on Sunday, March 10th. Loss or damage to equipment will be subtracted from the \$70.00 deposit.

All booths must be taken down and the area completely cleaned by 3 p.m. Sunday, March 10, or forfeit deposit and be subject to disqualification.

All events must comply with the rules and regulations of the Spartacade Executive Committee, who will be available to assist and advise in the construction and staging of the events.

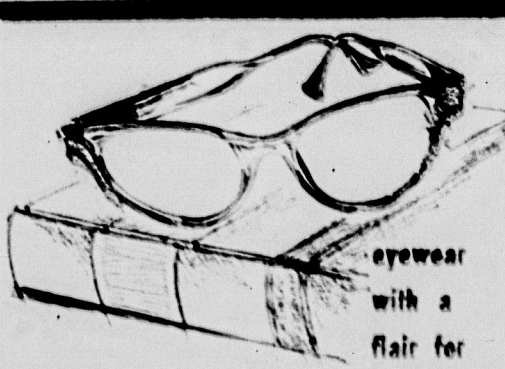

Student Requirements Met In Newest Campus Addition

For the past few months while wandering around the Natural Science Building or the Horticulture Gardens, one has been able to hear the sound of sawing, nailing and pounding.

Although all of us know basically what the building is and where it is, there seems to be many misconceptions about it.

It was felt that one of our campus' beautiful landmarks, the Horticulture Gardens, would be spoiled.

The Student Activities Center is a modernized three floor structure with a full basement. The estimated cost of the building is two and a quarter million dollars.

The third floor is devoted entirely to student groups with offices for Student Government, student organizations, Unit of Appeals, women's organizations and high school of operation.

Student publications will be moved from their present offices on the third floor of the Union to more appropriate surroundings on this floor.

The basement adequate space has been provided for KITA mechanical equipment, storage room for organizations and a smoking room.

The existing building has 16,000 square feet of space on each floor. Construction began last August and is expected to be completed early in 1958.

In the fall of 1957, the Student Government was forced to take over the Men's Lounge because of lack of space and an appropriate building. This space is scheduled to be restored to its original purpose.

The Student Activities Center will not only take much of the load of both Union and the Administration Building, but will also act as the nucleus of MSU. It is a much needed building that will be used to good use by students and the administration alike.

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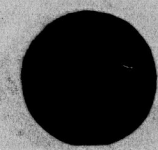

# Metesky Ordered To Trial

Psychiatrist Says 'Bomber' Insane

NEW YORK (AP)—Despite a psychiatrist report that mad bomber George Metesky was legally insane, a general sessions court judge Thursday ordered Metesky to stand trial.

Dr. John H. Casarett of Bellevue Hospital said Metesky did not know the nature and quality of his acts when he planted 27 time made bombs in New York City over a 18-month period.

He was so captivated by the sensation that he wasn't cognizant of his actions," Dr. Casarett said.

Nevertheless, Judge John A. Mullen ruled: "This report has no immediate significance whatsoever. I have formed an opinion and the indications are that he is in such a mental condition that would enable him to plead and that any further adjournment of this plea would be of disservice to the community. There will be no harm to his rights."

In ruling that Metesky did not know the nature and quality of his acts, Dr. Casarett was applying to him the legal definition of insanity.

Mullen told reporters outside the court: "It is my opinion that he does know the nature and quality of his acts."

In the courtroom, Mullen ordered defense lawyers to enter a plea of innocent for Metesky, they refused. Mullen then entered on Metesky's behalf a plea of innocent by reason of insanity.

Such a plea is intended to allow a jury to decide whether or not a defendant is insane.

All we have to determine for legal sanity," Mullen told the attorneys, "is, one, did he know the nature and quality of his acts and, two, did he know right from wrong."

Mullen also ordered a trial date set, but did not make one immediately.

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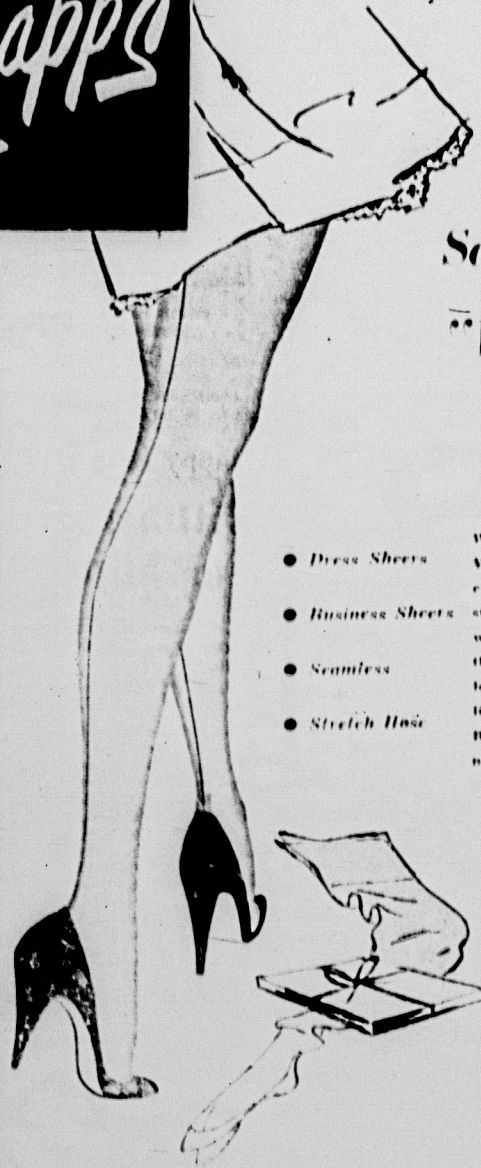
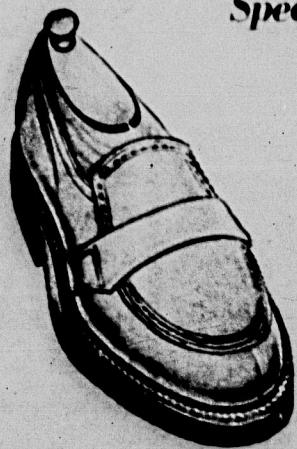
