New Oil Pipe Line May Bypass Suez





The regulation game ended in a 1-1 deadlock after the Phi Taus came from behind twice in the overtime period.


Bailey scored the opening goal of the first period on Jan. 20, 1957, with Phi Tau's goal scored in the penalty box.
