Colorful Spanish costumes, a Latin American serenade and a talk by Dr. Jose Ricardo Chiriboga V., Ecuadorian ambassador to the United States, will highlight the Pan-American Festival Saturday at 8 in Kellogg Center Auditorium.

Dancing will include two numbers by Miss Lape Ortiz, of Mexico, who will perform the "Jarabe Michoacano" and the "Jarabe Tapatio," the national dance of Mexico, some-times called the "Mexican Hat Dance." A musical ensemble composed of Santiago Cebal and Milton Martinez of Colombia and Luis Aguero of Venezuela will present Latin American songs. Mrs. Edward Devereaux from Puerto Rico will dance the mambo and the cha cha cha in a colorful native costume. Augusto Zambrano, Panama junior, and Barbara Moritz, Philadelphia junior, will present the "Tamborita," a Panamanian dance. Other numbers will include solos in Spanish and Portuguese by Miss Lola Laverty of the MSU music department and a dance by Mrs. Consuelo Teichert and her daughter. Master of ceremonies for the evening will be Augusto Zambrano.

Speeches on TV Series Programmed

Great American speeches will be read and explained in terms of their present day value in a new WKAR-TV series, "The Angry Men." The first show will be broadcast at 8 tonight. The six programs scheduled will each stress a particular problem or topic. The speeches to be read were chosen for their content and significance today rather than the speaker, according to Don Ercord, assistant professor of speech, who has charge of the series. "These words were spoken out of deep concern for the ideals of our nation and most of them under great stress," said Ercord. The speeches on the program tonight will be Patrick Henry's "Give me liberty or give me death," Abraham Lincoln's "Gettysburg Address" and Daniel Webster's "Definition of Democracy." Students will read excerpts from the speeches. Ercord will present a short history of the circumstances leading up to the speech and explain its significance, both at the time the speech was given and now.

Saturday Mail Discontinued

House to Delay Action On Request for Money

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House adjourned Thursday until Monday, in the face of a Saturday deadline set by Postmaster General Summerfield for cutting back mail service unless he gets more money.

This made certain, on the basis of Summerfield's statement to senators, that there will be no regular mail deliveries this Saturday, and that no post offices will be open Saturday and Sunday.

These were the first two cut-back steps ordered by Summerfield. To be effective today at midnight, unless his department was given another 47 million dollars to operate on during the remainder of the fiscal year ending June 30.

Another cutback step was attacked in court Thursday by the filing of a suit by users of third class mail against a Summerfield order to suspend virtually all third class mail service, effective April 29.

Summerfield appeared before the Senate Appropriations Committee Thursday afternoon to plead for the money he already had asked from the House.

He said his order to begin the cutbacks was already out, and added:

"Nothing can stop it except the availability of the money by Friday midnight and apparently that's not in the cards."

By availability of the money, Summerfield told reporters he meant the dispatch of the appropriation bill to the White House and its signing by the President.

Indiana Editor Dies in Fall From Bicycle

James H. Sprunger, 28, editor-in-chief of the Indiana Daily Student, died last Tuesday in a fall while on his way to class. According to the Monroe County coroner, Sprunger died from suffocation as a result of a cerebral concussion—after apparently suffering a blackout and falling from his bicycle. Named editor-in-chief of The Student March 29, Sprunger had worked as a reporter, sports editor, managing editor and chief editorial writer.

Sprunger will be buried in his hometown, Berne, Ind., today.

Spanish Play Viewed By Amused Audience

The Spanish honorary, Sigma Delta Xi, amused its audience Thursday night in Fairchild Theatre with the two act comedy, "Zaragueta."

Written by the Spanish playwrights, Vital Aza and Miguel Ramos Carrion, the play opened in the colorful living room of Don Indalaco.

The hero, a student named Carlos, played by Francis Durkin, feigns illness attempting to get money from his aunt and uncle to cover his debts in Madrid. The plight of the student against the moneylender is cleverly presented as Carlos takes Maruja, the heroine played by Tona Madsen, into his confidence.

The first act was highlighted by the performances of Maruja, Carlos, Dona Blasa, a scheming widow portrayed by Lillian Nalbandian, and Don Saturnio, the village doctor, played by Jan Nelson Slagh.

The title role, Zaragueta, the deaf moneylender, is introduced in the second act. Unknowingly he allows Maruja to pass him off as Carlos' doctor from Madrid. He is received much more warmly than usual for one in his profession much to his perplexity and the audience's amusement. The role is well filled by Don Devereaux.

The pace heightens as despite complications Carlos and Maruja carry off the hour successfully. Carlos then tells his relatives of his love for Maruja and all ends well.

Study Break Before Finals Also Wins Recommendation

Of the 2,635 students voting in the special election, 1,822 voted yes with 813 voting no.

Also approved was a proposal to have a day between the last day of classes and the first day of finals for studying. Students favored the vote, 1,610 to 1,019, with 2,630 voting on this issue.

Newsmen Restriction Protested

State Department Policy 'Futile'

WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Department's refusal to allow American newsmen to enter Red China was protested before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee by newspaper and other spokesmen.

J. R. Wiggins, secretary of the American Society of Newspaper Editors (ASNE), told the committee that the State Department policy "is hurting the United States more than it is hurting Red China."

Describing it as a "singularly futile" punishment of the Chinese Reds, Wiggins said: "Instead of punishing the Chinese Communist regime, it confers upon it a quasi-monopoly of news sources in China, permitting it to emit to the world reports of conditions in that country that cannot be contradicted by American sources."

Further, he said it tends to discredit the long-time efforts of the press of the United States and of this government itself, to gain free access to information everywhere in the world.

1. Be president of a major governing organization during his junior year.
2. Be a member of the executive branch of Student Government continuously for one year previous to petitioning.
3. Serve on Student Congress continuously for a year prior to petitioning.

5. Have the approval of the outgoing Congress.

In addition the candidate for president must be an undergraduate student carrying at least 12 credits and must have a 2.2 all-university grade point average. To remain in office, he must maintain at least a 2.0 all-university average and carry 12 credits.

The new amendment also provides for recall or impeachment of the AUSG president.

A two-thirds majority of the voting membership of Congress may recall the President. Also, 25% of the students can sign a petition asking Congress to hold a recall election among the members of the student body.

In addition to his teaching career Kohler is author of "General Psychology," published in 1929 and numerous other research papers, theoretical papers and books.

Prof. Robert M. Herbst, vice-chairman of the division of medicinal chemistry, is to preside at the meeting of medicinal chemists.

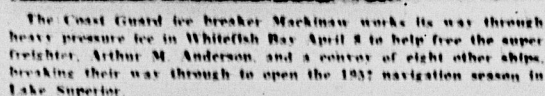

It is considered a foundation stone of any good book collection because it illustrates so many points in the history of early printing.

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Hussein Fights For West

Jordan Premier Forced to Resign

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—Jordan troops and military vehicles were reported blocking all roads leading into Amman, apparently to prevent any mob action in support of ousted Premier Suleiman Nabulsi.

Nabulsi's pro-Western government resigned Wednesday at the demand of young King Hussein, who had been waging a determined fight to keep the nation free from Western influence. Diplomats in Washington believed the stand by Jordan's army would decide whether Hussein's move is challenged and it seemed obvious that the king would not have acted against Nabulsi without advance assurance of the army's support.

Groups of Jordan's three Arab neighbors were either in the state little kingdom or in position to move in, but it appeared Hussein's cousin, King Faisal of Iraq, and King Saud of Saudi Arabia would support the Jordan monarch in his fight to keep down Communist influence.

It also was believed Syria's anti-western government would not move its troops against Hussein if the Jordan army remained loyal to the king. Along with his demand for the premier's resignation, the king presented his chief military aide, Brig. Mohammed Maatya, and made him director general of public security. Maatya replaced Maj. Gen. Bahjat Taji, who was given a long leave of absence.

Top brass from both the army and air force units were in attendance along with Red Cross officials and representatives from various campus organizations.

The Plasma Pigeon, under the joint sponsorship of the two ROTC units, will be held from April 29 to May 4. A goal of 2,000 pints for the Plasma Pigeon was established with the blood being converted into plasma and used by the Defense Department in their stockpiling of the nation's blood.

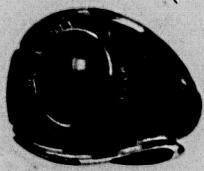

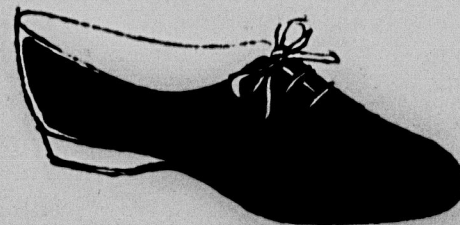
