## Mao's Police Dictate Hints Unrest in China

HONG KONG (AP) — Red China's leader, Mao Tse Tung, ordered regulations for the nation's police published throughout the country today. The order hinted at possible trouble in the wake of a torrent of internal complaints touched off by Mao's recent "rectification" campaign.

Rectification of Mao's Party as a major movement of "Democratic Centralism" and "self-criticism" was outlined in the order. To deal with counter-revolutionaries, prevent sabotage by "other criminals," preserve public order and security, protect public property and the interests of citizens, "enforcing the People's Democratic System" and insure the smooth development of "Socialist construction."

Mao's order, the People's Daily said, was issued on May 27.

The order came as delegates for the National People's Congress, Red China's legislature, gathered for a session in an atmosphere of national ferment and wide open discussion of the nation's woes.

The Communist leadership issued their regulations after a discussion in the standing committee of the National People's Congress. The Chinese, still normally a rubber stamp legislature, are in an active mood for debate at this session.

The Communist Party, which Mao is leading, is reported to be in a state of "rectification" between the people and the party. A rectification of "other criminals" is also reported to be in progress.

## Delegates to Visit Mexico

Michigan State University museum representatives are beginning a six weeks expedition to southwestern United States and Mexico to obtain new materials for display and research purposes.

Probably the most unusual specimens to be obtained by the party is the skull of a mosasaur, a giant sea lizard which they expect to dig from a chalk cliff in western Kansas.

The mosasaur, a marine animal related to the dinosaurs, sometimes grew to length of 50 feet. The remains were deposited during the cretaceous period or late in the age of reptiles.

The skull, which should measure between three and four feet in length, will be used in the study of evolution being conducted in the museum's research quarters, according to Dr. Rollin H. Baker, museum director and leader of the expedition.

With Dr. Baker in the party are graduate students Leslie C. Davis, John Kester, Green and James J. Short, all of the museum staff, and graduate student James J. Drake, Detroit.

The expedition is to organize in Lawrence, Kansas, where Dr. Baker is attending a meeting this week of the American Society of Mammalogists. He is a director of the society.

Plans for the expedition will be made by Baker and his wife, and will include a stop at West Texas State University, Canyon, Texas. An study of birds, mammals and reptiles is to be conducted in Texas, New Mexico, and parts of northern Mexico and a record made of their kind and distribution. A detailed ecological study will be made in the mountains of New Mexico.

Dr. Baker will collect large numbers of specimens. Dr. Baker pointed out "Some of them will be used in new exhibits and many others will be available for research and study by the staff and MSU students. The expedition should contribute to the museum's wealth of materials on the subject."

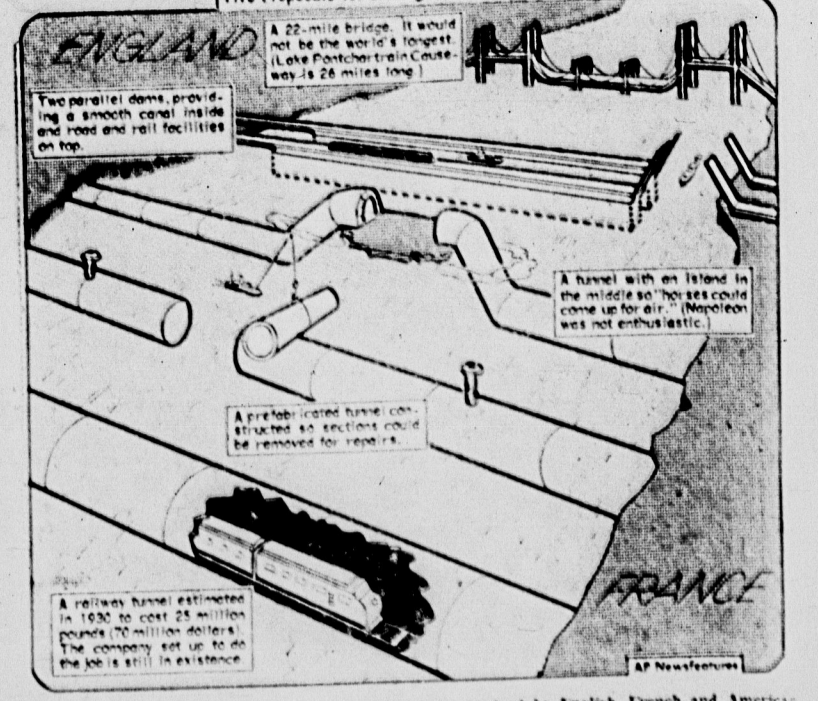

## Expert on Orient Translates Dr. DeForest Presents Poetry

Professor Edgar L. DeForest of the Department of Communication Skills will present lectures and readings concerning Chinese and Japanese poetry this week at Michigan State University.

Dr. DeForest's lecture and readings are one of a series of special events of the Second Annual Institute on Asia sponsored by Dr. Walter R. Lee and his committee in cooperation with the College of Science and Arts and the Summer Session.

Chinese poetry is the most difficult form of literature to translate but through the labors of many talented scholars it has been possible for the West to appreciate something of the spirit of Chinese poetic genius. Only a small fraction of Chinese poetry has been translated.

Dr. DeForest will present representative selections of Chinese poetry starting with the Ancient Period (1000 to 500 B.C.) through the Sung Dynasty (960-1280).

Japanese literature has about as long a history as English literature but is not well known in this country. Dr. DeForest will present poetry from the Ancient Period (to 794 A.D.) through the Tokugawa Period (1600-1868).

Professor DeForest had special training in the art of oral reading in Boston and was a reader of note. For several years he served as Chairman of the Division of the Pacific Society of the University of Chicago.

Recently Dr. DeForest has been heard at a number of symposiums by the Michigan Community College Association.

Dr. DeForest's principal field of interest is the geography of Asia, particularly China. He has visited and done research in that area in various parts of Asia since 1955. He spent in Iraq, gave him an immense fund of information to draw on concerning the vital geography of the world.

His research and travels include extensive experience in China and Central Asia, which Dr. DeForest has written on in the geography of his country. His work has appeared in various languages.

He is the author of "Asia's Lands and Peoples, How Stalin is Russia," and "Land of the Four Hundred Million—A Geography of China," as well as numerous periodical articles.

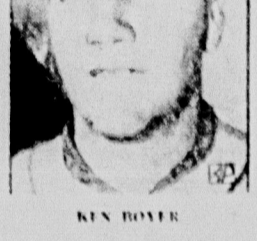

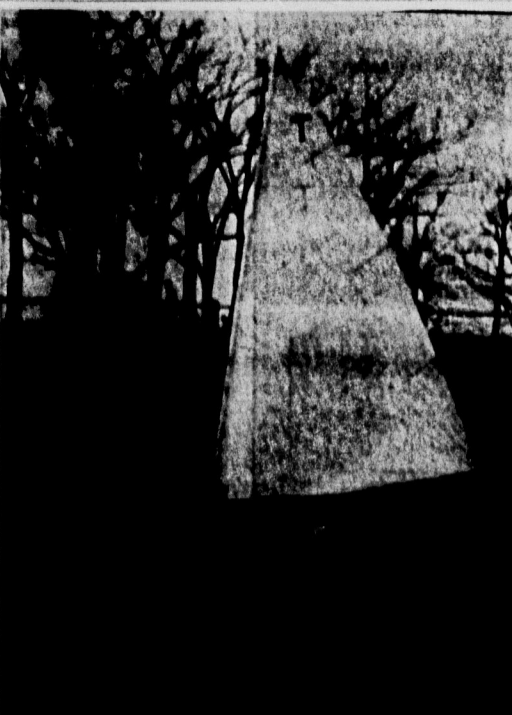

## I Think That I Shall Never See Courts to Replace Evergreen Groves

Site clearing is due to start within a week for the men's new intramural building at Michigan State. The building, to be one of the largest on campus, will be located between Demonstration Hall and Macklin Stadium.

To make way for the new building, about half of the three and a half-acre pine planting in the area and also the tennis courts east of Demonstration Hall will be removed, reports Milton Baron, assistant campus landscape architect.

The evergreen grove, south of Demonstration Hall, was planted in 1914 as an experiment which successfully showed that blowing sand could be controlled by proper spacing and trimming of the trees. Several papers, including "Sand Ridge Produces Valuable Timber," were written about the plantation.

These trees are now too large to transplant and have outlived the purpose for which they were planted, explained Harold W. Lutzner, landscape architect and head of the department of landscape architecture and urban planning.

A second planting was made in the 1930's and a number of the young trees were later transplanted in landscaping other campus areas. Use of large amounts of evergreen material is contemplated in the new development, in keeping with the character of this part of the campus. In total there are some 13,000 trees.
