## Khrushchev Inherits Stalin's Autocracy

Why anybody, including the State Department and other expert bodies should have assumed that the death of Stalin also meant the death of autocracy in Russia, is not under-

For a thousand years, the Russian form of government been autocratic. It is a normal response of the Russians to the need of a governmental system. The great heroes of Stalin were Ivan the Terrible and Peter the Great—absolute

Lenin succeeded where others failed because he pursued the course of traditional autocracy, setting up a substitute for the dictatorship of the proletariat in the Politburo and retaining in all its sinister characteristics



the Czarist secret police, the Okhrana, by changing the name, first to Cheka and then to a number of other names, including the infamous one of G.P.U.

Stalin continued the autocracy, but made it tighter than Lenin could do with his Western European training. Stalin murdered hvishly. He tolerated no dissent, no person-

STALIN . al ambitions, no crificism, no debate. Khrushchev is Stalin's successor and has, from his emer gence, followed Stalin's course, but like a grandson in a grey business suit instead of in a revolutionists uniform. The so-called de Stalinization campaign which Khrushchev launched could only fool Western governments.

If Khrushchev de-Stalinized anyone, it was only to become Stalin's successor and heir to seize power and to

To throw Malenkov, Molotov and Kaganovitch out of his government was not difficult. If they resisted, he could order them to be killed. Had he not possessed the power to kill them, he would not have risked disposing them. He now knows the extent of his power.

These three are symbols of another regime and that is neir essential crime. Mojotov and Kaganovitch are old Bolsheviks, going back to the 1917 revolution. They were revolutionists and Bolsheviks before Khrushchev was out of his diapers.

Molotov served under Lenin and Stalin; Kaganovitch was Stalin's brother in law. Furthermore, Kaganovitch is a Jew-and Khrushchev hates Jews. He comes from the border area between the Ukraine and Kusaas where pogroms on Jews

were always fiercest. Khrushchev was Stalin's hatchet man in the Ukraine, a ommon murderer in his younger years, and Malenkov was the man who transmitted Stalin's orders to him. Malenkov was Stalin's private secretary. Khrushchev, who now poses as more liberal, needs no witnesses in the Presidium to his former infamy. He may not need such witnesses anywhere; then they will die, of course.


For the United States, this is not good news. Khrushchev gets drunk readily and when drunk he is a nasty guy. That gay, thoughtful, fat shopkeeper type that we saw on the television show a few months back was Khrushchev sober; drunk he is a cursing, snarling beast.

Such a man could be a menace when he rules unchecked in a world that is always on the brink of war, particularly in an era of A-bombs and H-bombs.

There is another side to this picture. It is the absolute evidence from the course of events that disturbances not only in Soviet Russia but in the entire Communist world are intense and desperate. We can only hope that they get worse, much worse
