









# To Discuss Atomic Pool Top Aides Called By Ike, Macmillan

## Take Step In Midst Of Talks

Plan to Counter  
Russian Offensive

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Macmillan called on their top aides Thursday to begin immediate moves to pool British-American atomic and rocket resources for "greater service to the free world."

The two Western leaders took the step at the White House at the midway point in their three-day strategy conference on how to counter Russia's new diplomatic offensive.

Clashing slightly the tight secrecy imposed since the talks started Wednesday, the White House said the two government heads and their foreign affairs chiefs, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd—were in full agreement on finding ways to harness their nations' resources to meet the Soviet challenge.

The joint announcement disclosed that two senate high-level committees were named to make recommendations before the day was over on action in these two critical fields:

1. Nuclear relationship and cooperation.

2. Problems dealing with missiles and rocketry.

Chairman Lewis L. Strauss of the Atomic Energy Commission was picked to head the atomic-hydrogen study group along with Sir Edwin Plowden, chairman of Britain's Atomic Energy Authority.

Recommendations for stepping up cooperation in the missile-rocket field were placed in the hands of Deputy Secretary of Defense Donald Quarles and Sir Richard Powell, permanent secretary of the British Defence Administration.

The work of both groups was ticketed for further discussion upon recovering of the White House takes this evening.

The announcement was given out by presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerly with Macmillan's press officer, Peter Hope, standing alongside.

Eisenhower and Macmillan jointly stressed in their formal statement that any new partnership arrangement devised would aim at insuring the security of not only their two countries but of all the free world.

## Christian Dior's Death Stuns Paris Fashion Designers

PARIS (AP)—The house of Christian Dior will continue despite the famed designer's death Thursday in Italy.

The French fashion world, stunned by the 32-year-old Dior's unexpected death from a heart attack on a vacation at Montecatini, agreed with textile king Marcel Boussac.

"His death leaves an immense void," said Boussac, who launched Dior and backed him financially. "He contributed magnificently in giving back to France her prestige in the world of fashion when it had been broken by the war and occupation."

Dior, a bachelor, has no ready-made successor, even in name. In accordance with general fashion policy, the names of his assistant designers never have been revealed.

Dior is reported to have bought a burial place in the cemetery at Montecatini. In the Riviera park country where he had set up retirement chalets, "If God lends me a long life," Dior wrote in his memoirs, "I will retire there to buckle up my existence, forget Christian Dior and become again simply Christian."

But he was stricken after dinner Wednesday night as he sat playing canasta with friends. He fell from his chair, was rushed to his room and never rallied.

Among those playing canasta with him was Raymond Zehnacker, Dior's director-at-large.

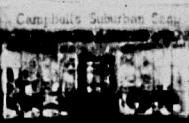

Wheeler has steadily shown improvement and, if his performance duplicates that of last Friday, the Spartans should easily sweep the first three positions.

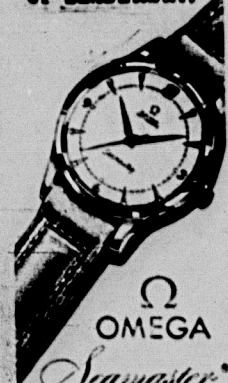
