









# Indonesia Faces Finance Crisis

## Red Unions Take Over Big Banks

### Banking Officials Warn of Collapse

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP)—Indonesia faced business collapse Sunday as it plunged into efforts to win the jungles of Dutch West New Guinea.

Directors of three big Dutch banks, taken over Saturday by communist-backed trade unions, demanded the government they would close unless there is an armistice in the campaign against the Netherlands and Dutch economic ties here.

The bank—the nation's largest—handles most of Indonesia's foreign exchange business. Indonesian banking officials have warned that without seizures of major banks could affect the circulation of currency and spark economic collapse.

Since last Monday, essential bank services have been taken over by Indonesian workers—most of them members of the communist-run Sobat trade union. Paralyzed by these seizures are inter-island shipping and the principal export-import agency.

Reports reaching Jakarta indicate that workers also are taking over concerns handling major exports—copra, rubber, tin, coffee, tea and palm oil. There also were reports the Dutch running these concerns were attempting a scorched earth policy rather than hand them over to the Indonesians.

The capital was quiet Sunday as most of the city's business and industries shut down as usual.

The government radio reported communist East Germany has agreed to send airplane pilots to help to replace Dutch pilots who might resign from Garuda Indonesian Airways. At the same time, Air India announced it has applied for permission to make Jakarta one of its stopovers on its London-Jakarta route. The Indonesians are anxious from further operations.

The campaign to run the Dutch out of Indonesia is viewed by many here as a disastrous one for Indonesians. They say the Dutch can survive the campaign but they doubt whether Indonesia will—as a free nation—be able to survive.

Indonesia must export to live, but now the Dutch have commandeered the export facilities. After the Dutch have gone, Indonesia must quickly find the equipment and technicians to carry on otherwise economic collapse is certain.

Nevertheless, the government is going ahead with its plan to take all but a sprinkling of Dutch technicians in three weeks. There was some question whether the sprinkling will remain after the bulk of the 30,000 Dutch has left. Indonesia's anti-Dutch campaign began last Monday. The government called on all Indonesians to strike out for 24 hours against Dutch concerns. But the threat lapsed out of control, with Sisi taking control of vital concerns.

The government warned it would tolerate seizures without official approval. But there was evidence in Jakarta at one time that the government had sent something else to stop the seizures.

JERUSALEM (AP)—The young Khan, leader of the world's 15 million Muslims, said Sunday he plans a vast Moslem educational program to enable his followers to catch up to Christian levels of learning.

## Desire Economic Plan for Asia

### Germany to Propose Agency

BERLIN, Germany (AP)—West German leaders, alarmed about communist inroads in Asia and Africa, plan to carry to the NATO Summit meeting next week a proposal for a new Atlantic economic agency.

Informants said Sunday that under the proposal, the 15 member nations of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization would contribute to a "clearing house" agency which then would provide technical and financial help to the world's underdeveloped countries.

It would be a kind of multi-national Point Four Program—without any political strings. Ludwig Erhard, who wears the two hats of deputy chancellor and economic minister, long has argued for a concerted Western program to counter Russian moves in Asia and Africa.

The report now is that Erhard's planning has crystallized into a definite program, which either Erhard or Chancellor Konrad Adenauer will outline to NATO leaders at Paris next week. Some prominent Americans, who cannot be named, were known to support the program.

German sources stressed that the aid must be furnished no matter what the political complexion of the requesting country. One high source was asked whether this rule would hold

in the case of a nation such as Indonesia, now in the throes of upheaval.

"I think some guarantees would have to be made," he replied. "Not political, but some kind of guarantees." He would not elaborate.

An American official observed that a Soviet economic leader recently made this offer to underdeveloped countries:

"If you ask us to build a plant, we'll do it for you. You can pay us back in whatever you produce. We'll pay you higher than the world market prices and we won't be in any hurry to be paid."

To such an offer, he said, there are no political strings. And, he added, "The Russians would be in on the ground floor with their own technicians who could get Communist cells organized whenever they wanted."

Only a bold new Western program can counter such an offer, he said. "The Russians have made some spectacular scientific successes, but really the economic threat is a greater danger to the West," he added.

The Germans are of a like mind and have been busy sending trade missions and industrialists all over the world. But

## Cold War Policy Hit By Pravda

MOSCOW, (AP)—Pravda said Sunday the United States' cold war policy went up in smoke when its Vanguard earth satellite rocket exploded Friday.

In a dispatch written by its correspondents in New York, the Soviet Communist party newspaper said U. S. politicians "wanted to use the launching of an earth satellite for the politically bankrupt policy of establishing military blocs. It was aimed at furthering the cold war against the Soviet Union."

The failure, the paper said, did not lie with U. S. scientists because they were not ready to go ahead. "They were under pressure from cold war proponents and propagandists to launch any kind of Sputnik as quickly as possible in order to re-establish American prestige abroad."

The paper mocked the U. S. satellite as one no bigger than a baby's ball and hit what it called the publicity campaign preceding the firing. There was launching of the Soviet Sputniks.

Bonn leaders concede this country alone does not have the resources to combat the Soviet economic threat.

"We must work together with the United States and our European partners in NATO," one official said.

to join at this time as charter members, and all together a total of 188 coeds and four honorary members became affiliated.

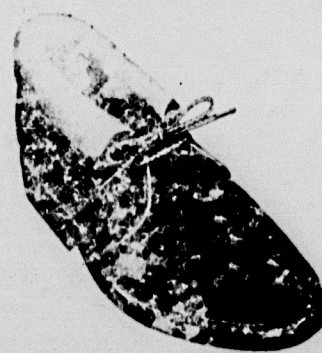

## UN President Says Assembly Must Consider Missile Control

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., (AP)—The president of the UN General Assembly said Sunday the Assembly will have to consider control of Sputniks and missiles next year, probably before the start of its regular session Sept. 16.

Sir Leslie Munro of New Zealand, in charge of the current three-month regular session scheduled to end Saturday, said on a CBS-TV program, "UN In Action":

"The United Nations should show itself worthy of its responsibilities and control these new outer space developments. I think we can do it. If we don't, then the world will go into gravest peril."

Munro said he could see the 82-nation assembly having to consider the subject "sometime next year, probably before September." That would necessitate a special session, a resumption of the 1957 regular session or an early start on the early 1958 regular session.

## World War II Heroine Tells POW Camp Story

A strong belief in the Golden Rule plus love for one's fellowman can produce courage where terror could easily prevail.

Mrs. Maria Fe G. Atienza, studying for her doctorate in home economics education at the University of the Philippines, Manila, has received decorations for heroism as a civilian during World War II.

She possesses the U.S. Medal of Freedom, the highest award the government can give to a civilian for her wartime work.

Her husband, Dr. Romeo Atienza, was medical director of the American Red Cross at Camp O'Donnell in the Philippines, where many Filipino and American soldiers were imprisoned.

In this capacity, the two were almost constant to give aid, but only to Filipinos only.

The Atienzas smuggled food, clothing, war news, and medicine to the American war prisoners in the hood of the ambulance. The soldiers wrote letters to their parents and these were smuggled out of the camp.

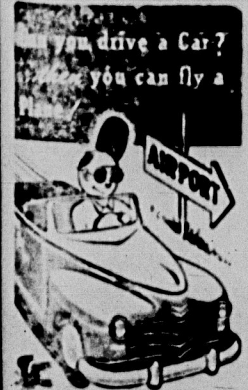
A three-pot housed these letters. It was buried in the garbage and transferred from one house to another as the Atienzas were under close surveillance of the Japanese M.F.'s.

After the liberation the pot was dug up and the letters were found. The first American prisoner being sent home to be reunited to the parents of the prisoners.

Asked why she was willing to risk everything to help people she didn't know, she replied it was her love for the Americans and for the cause of democracy. "The Americans are the best friend among foreigners in the Philippines."

Dr. Atienza is a professor in the Institute of Medicine of Far Eastern University in Manila. He and the Atienza's son, Tito, 9, are presently in Manila.

## Government Asked To Cut Agriculture

WASHINGTON, AP—The Committee for Economic Development called Sunday for programs to get many people and much land out of farming as a means of eliminating crop surpluses and improving agricultural income.

"Present government programs, the committee said, try to underwrite farm prices and income by means of price support, subsidies and the like."

It found that the government "operates an overall price structure that encourages overproduction of farm products and keeps too many people in farming."

This situation in turn results, the committee said, in ever-growing surpluses of foods and fibers in government storehouses, "surpluses that weigh down the very price structure public policy tries to underpin."

The CED offered its criticisms of present programs and its suggestions for remedying the situation in a report prepared by a committee headed by Francis P. Wolfe, president of the Commercial General Life Insurance Co.

The committee suggested special programs to assist the farmer who cannot make a reasonable living from non-subsidized farming to find a better livelihood elsewhere.

"The assistance to agriculture

we are suggesting will require substantial public outlay," the committee said. "However, we expect the cost, in the short run, to be somewhat lower than present outlays for agricultural assistance."

The principal cost at the outset would be that of renting land taken out of production.

looky even with the three-stage Vanguard rocket.

There were the developments here as experts in the manufacture of Vanguard rocket parts pushed ahead with their efforts to assess the failure of the huge vehicle last Friday, and to prepare for a second satellite launching attempt.

Perhaps in part because of the lack of developments, but also the result of a news clamp-down order from Washington, there was no additional information available on the Vanguard program.

Meanwhile, the temporary clamp-down on the Vanguard's failure was lifted considerably by the effective firing late Saturday of a Douglas Thor, the Air Force effort in the intermediate range of missile.

When we are dealing with a rapidly advancing Soviet Union, we should make the same effort in producing as in war or else we will be destroyed.

"The development of atomic submarines," Jackson added, "is one field in which the United States leads Russia."

With a few exceptions the Titans' play was almost a duplicate copy of the Spartans' opener against Butler University last Monday.

The final score of both games was almost identical, also, the cagers depended on one individual to keep them in contention. Probably the only difference was that Coach Fordy Anderson's team Friday had more scoring talent.

Along with Green the offensive mainstay for the Spartans was guard Dave Scott, who played his high school ball at Detroit Cookey. Scott kept the Spartans in the game by registering 10 points on five field goals in the first half, ending up with 18.

Field goals by Walsh and forward Ralph Gehrmann gave the Titans a 6-3 lead. However, a pair of free throws by Green and Scott's two-pointers knotted the score at 14-14.

With Walsh and Hesse proving the scoring punch Detroit bounced around 21-16, which was the biggest gap enjoyed by Callahan's five.

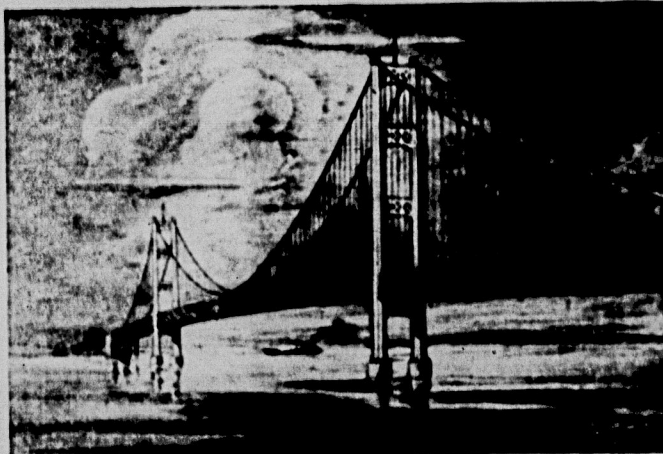

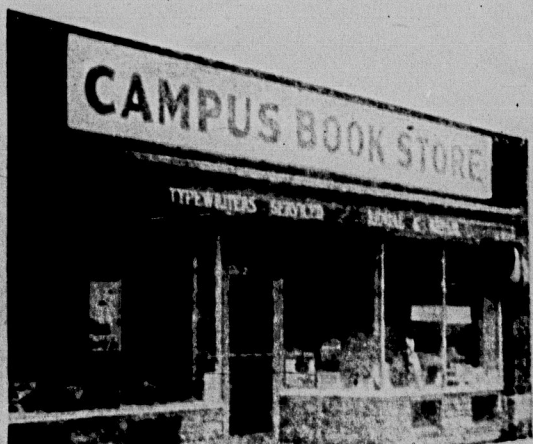

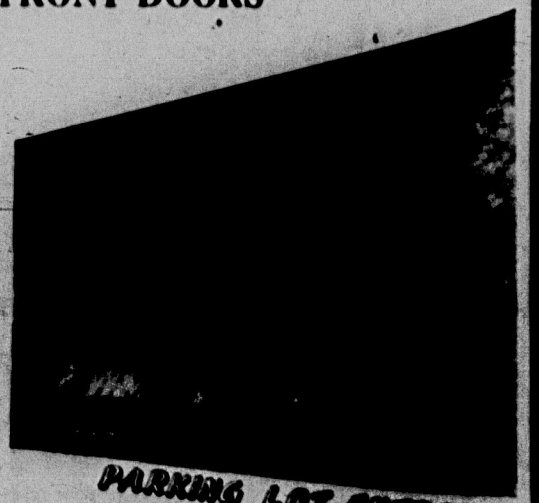
