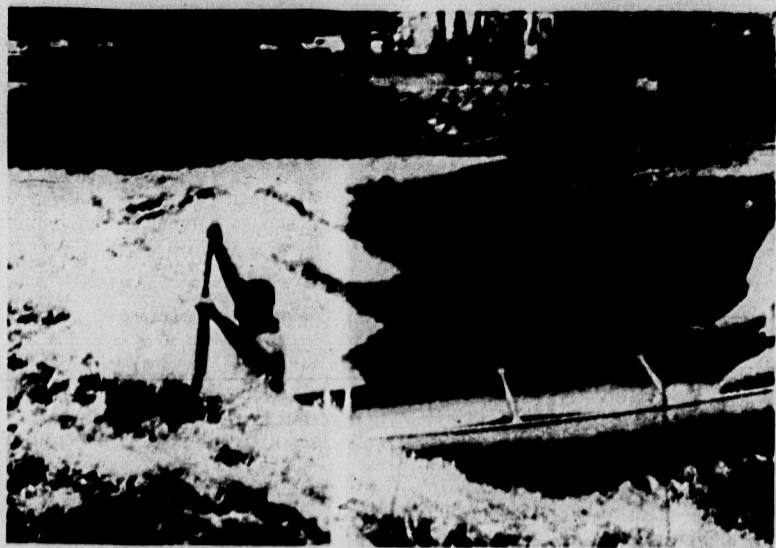

Muelder Comments On Berlin

The current Berlin crisis will not result in war, believes an MSU administrator who was a top U.S. official in Germany during World War II.

Basically, Russia is not ready to go to war, he said. "This time, America and her allies do not wish war and I do not think a war will break out," said Dean Milton Muelder, dean of the College of Science and Arts.

Nonetheless, he added, "one has to be prepared for our bluff is called and we must be ready to call the Russian bluff as necessary."

In World War II Dean Muelder received the Legion of Merit and was cited for preparing the project "CARPET" which determined the composition and size of military government units throughout the U.S. zone of Germany.

The Russians, a matter of policy, he said, have maintained a series of bridges related to Berlin and the continent and merely one more in the long series of events designed to keep the Berlin situation inflamed and confused.

Spartan Netters Lose To Georgia, Weather

7-2 Whipping Winds Up Southern Tour; Final Meet Rained Out With State Ahead

A better-than-average University of Georgia team combined with an untimely rain to hold the MSU tennis team winless in the last two matches of its southern swing.

Friday saw Georgia even the Spartan netters' record at 2-2 with a 7-2 triumph. State was then thwarted in an attempt to pick up a victory in the second of the two matches when rain curtailed the meet with

Tuesday. The Spartans were leading at the time by a score of 3-1 and were threatening to win the southern team's winning streak at three straight. Foster Hoffman was the lone winner for MSU in the singles. He defeated Charles Bryan, 6-1, while Bill Hotchkiss, Doug Smith, Ron Mescall, Bob Sasseck and Roger Plagenhoef were absorbing defeats in their sets.

The double's teams were no more fortunate. The Sasseck-Hoffman duo was the only one to manage a victory. They won over a Georgia team composed of Scott Henson and Richard Courts, 6-2, 6-1.

Although their record was not particularly impressive, coach Earl Drozic was pleased with the performance of some of the individual players on the southern swing. He promoted Doug Smith from the No. 4 singles spot to No. 2.

Horne Keeps Boxing Title

RENO, Nev. (AP)—Michigan State light-heavyweight boxer John Horne was the only repeating champion at the NCAA tournament over the weekend, picking up his second straight national title in his weight class.

Bob Epperson, Spartan middleweight, lost his semi-final bout, as MSU finished seventh in the meet with 10 points. San Jose retained its team title, nosing out Idaho State, 24-22.

Horne, unbeaten since 1955, outpunched Sacramento State's Norm Tavolero for his championship win. He won the 1958 crown as a member of Michigan State's last varsity boxing team. The sport was dropped from the varsity roster after last season.

Jumpin' John Gets Additional Honors

Drafted by Knickerbockers; Pros Also Choose Anderegg

Evidence is rapidly mounting which indicates that Green is the best basketball player ever to come out of Michigan State University.

The 6' 5" center with a knack for jumping straight up in the air higher than anyone in the country has been heaped with recognition the past few weeks. After leading Michigan State to its most successful basketball campaign in history (19-4), Green was named to the Look Magazine All-American squad and to second-team berths on both the AP and UPI All-American selections.

In addition, Green was elected the Big 10's most valuable player with double the number of votes of runner-up M. C. Burton of Michigan. He was also named most valuable player in the Midwest regional tournament in which the Spartans were eliminated by Louisville.

Green was by far the greatest rebounder in State's history and ranks third in all-time scoring behind Julius McCoy and Al Ferrara with 1,062 points in three seasons.

National audiences have been seeing more of Green the last few days. His outstanding play (20 points and 27 rebounds in one game) helped the College All-Stars win the Pan-American

tourney trials and Green to a berth on the team which will represent the States at the Pan-Am in Italy.

The popular Green was elected in the first round of the New York Knickerbocker National Basketball Association draft. Another Spartan, Bob Anderegg, has done well for himself too. The rugged Anderegg, picked in the third round by New York,

Both players, however, experience trouble earning in the rough professional. At 6' 3", Anderegg is too tall to play forward and not enough to play guard.

Some experts doubt whether Green can shoot well from outside to stick to his great ability under the net.

QUESTION:

I need lenses so strong they have to be ground in a circle inside the lenses. Even so my vision is far normal and worse in the eye than in the left. Will contact lenses help me to better?

ANSWER:

The lenses you wear describe are either myopic or hyperbolic lenses. It is difficult to say for sure without examination, but as a general rule vision with contact lenses usually shows a dramatic improvement over vision with spectacles.

QUESTION:

I would be very happy to get contact lenses even though they are more expensive than regular glasses, but about the expense of changes?

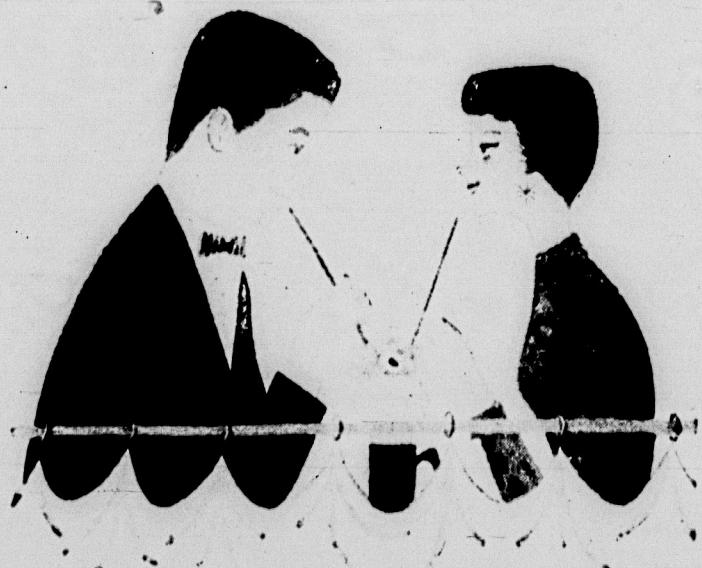
ANSWER:

Stewart Loses 2 No MSU Tankers Win In NAAU Swim Meet

Michigan State swimmers Billy Stewart, Frank Modine and freshman Dick Brackett didn't fare so well in the NAAU swim meet at New Haven, Conn., last week-end.

Stewart placed fourth in the 220-yard freestyle, but didn't qualify in the 1500-meter freestyle, which he won in the NCAA meet. He didn't compete in the 440, the race which helped make him a double champion in the NCAA.

Stewart was beaten in both races by Murray Rose, Australian Olympic champion from the University of Southern California. Rose was the highest point-totaller in the meet with 21 points in victories in the 1500-meter, 220 and 440-yard freestyles.

Modine's only race was the 220-yard breaststroke, and he failed to qualify. Brackett swam the 1500-meter, but did not place. Dan Patterson, Spartan sprinter, didn't attend the meet.

Coach Charles McCaffree commented that the swimmers were tired, having spent the week-end before in the NCAA meet. The pool at Yale is a 50-yard course, also, and the Spartans are more

used to the short course or 25-yard pool.

Though the Spartans did not compete in the NAAU, the highest total of spectators from any meet in the country to USC with 62 points. The New Haven swim club was next with 33 points.

Seven American and nine NAAU records were set in the meet.

The only multiple winners in the meet were Rose and Norbert Rumpel of Southern Illinois. Rumpel won the 100 and 220-yard breaststrokes, the latter over Modine.

'Art Not for Words But for Experience'

Art is to be experienced, not learned, two Michigan State professors emphasized Sunday on Viewpoint over WKAR-radio.

Daven Brainard, assistant professor of art, and Edward McCoy, assistant professor and head of film production at the Audio-Visual Center, criticized the verbal approach to contemporary art.

"Art is not messages," said McCoy. "Paintings are not cryptograms. Poems are not encipherments. Music is not Morse code."

"The habit of resolving a work of art into some verbal expression of its meaning is not valid and raises questions about the condition of our communications science."

"We have a perfect right to try to 'put a work of art' into words, but we should realize that this is like carrying a picture of our wives in our wallet. It is a token only."

Brainard declared that in some ways the gap between artists and the public continues to widen as there is more and

more insistence on education in art.

McCoy suggested that too much has been said about the artist's responsibility to society. "The artist's basic responsibility," he said, is to himself. The artist's only responsibility is to produce art.

"It is not so much a question of 'learning the vocabulary' of modern art," McCoy added. "As it is a question of the public's developing a richer being through intercourse with art. Bread does not tell the body how to grow—it nourishes the body. Art is a nourish, too. And if society has a soul, the artist is that soul."

Pointing out that, despite the prevailing criticisms of art, there is probably more healthy divergence of formal style and content in painting and sculpture than at any previous time in history, Brainard saw in this some evidence of the artist's acceptance of responsibility.

State Board of Agriculture Names Warner First 'University Professor'

Professor W. Lloyd Warner, widely-known anthropologist, sociologist and author, has been designated the first University Professor at MSU.

Warner, currently chairman of the Committee on Human Development at the University of Chicago, will join the faculty of the College of Business and Public Service Sept. 1 as University Professor of Behavioral Science Research in Business Administration.

The title University Professor was created by the Ag Board some time ago to cover appointment of distinguished scholars

of international reputation to the MSU faculty.

Warner, who will teach graduate courses in the College of Business and Public Service, is interested in applying the research tools of sociology and anthropology to business and industry, explained Dean Alfred Seelie, head of the College.

The new University Professor, author of more than 20 influential books, is regarded as an outstanding scholar in the study of cultural structure and symbolic behavior of the American community and industrial scene.

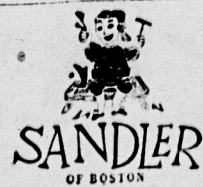
