Miller Backs Mortgage Plan

Calls Vets Trust Fund Short-Range Solution

State Controller James Miller said Thursday that Michigan is definitely in a serious cash crisis. He supported Gov. G. Mennen Williams' plan for mortgaging the \$50 million Veterans Trust Fund as an immediate, short-run solution to the problem.

"There isn't any alternative in my mind to the governor's program for the Veterans Trust Fund," Miller said.

"After a while, you reach the point where arguing about mortgaging the fund is academic—you have to mortgage it."

The controller said the Veterans Fund seems to be the only immediate answer to the crisis, short of taking retirement funds.

Miller added that he had no idea of touching retirement funds.

"This simply can't be done," he explained. "These funds were set up to put retired employees on a stable basis. It would be silly to upset this program."

Miller explained that mortgaging the Veterans Fund would be only a short-range, immediate solution.

"After a one-shot injection of cash by using the Veterans Fund, it becomes a tax problem of putting things on a stable basis," he said.

In a recent report on state finances, Miller wrote:

"As will be recalled, the most critical aspects of the cash shortage of the General Fund and School Aid Fund were pinpointed last year at this time (February, to be exact)."

"It may be wondered why we are once more not only in a crisis position but actually with a more critical situation. The answer is simple.

"Last year, \$30 million, in round figures, of one-shot, non-recurring cash was injected into the treasury. This was not a cure; it was a palliative for a period of time. It arrested the deterioration of the state's cash position momentarily."

Miller said that the present situation is similar to that of last year, and the Veterans Fund would offer only temporary relief.

"We are now getting along by not paying the universities some \$15 million we owe them, and because the State Treasurer is using the flexibility of the common cash fund as much as possible," Miller added.

Republicans Introduce Twin Bills In Senate, House to Up Use Tax

A proposed sales tax increase that touched off a storm of debate in the Legislature reappeared Thursday in disguised form.

Twin bills introduced in the House and Senate would boost the use tax, a complementary levy to the sales tax, from three to four percent. All taxes now covered by the three-cent sales tax would be placed under the higher use tax.

The proposal would bring in more than 100 million dollars a year in additional revenue.

Senator Drops Tavern Proposal

Sen. John Minnema (R-Grand Rapids) said Thursday he has dropped work on a bill to protect taverns from being closed upon annexation of that territory by a dry city.

Minnema said the bill, which was being rewritten to avoid unconstitutional phrasing, was killed because it had too many defects and is not needed now after Meridian township voters turned down a proposal for annexation to East Lansing in Monday's election.

The bill was designed to prevent taverns from being closed upon annexation, provided the tavern was licensed under state laws and the licensee was doing business in the territory when the annexation petition was filed.

Five Vietnamese To Tour Campus

Five Vietnamese police officials are visiting MSU's campus this week in connection with the Vietnam Project. They are here on part of a six week tour of the United States to observe our police system.

A reception was held at the Union Thursday night to give the officials an opportunity to meet fellow Vietnamese on campus.

The police administration department is sponsoring a series of meetings to acquaint the officials with various aspects of police work and our structure of government, according to Elsie Cunningham, administrative assistant on the Vietnam Project.

Tibetans, China Reds Take Arms

Rebels Blockade Main Supply Line

NEW DELHI (AP)—Fighting has broken out between Tibetan rebels and Chinese Communist forces in Tsinghai and Szechuan provinces of Tibet's frontier, press reports said Thursday.

The Times of India said rebels had cut off Chinese troops in Szechuan province on the main supply route between China proper and Lhasa, the Tibetan capital.

"Chamdo is like an island protected by the Chinese garrison," said the Times' correspondent in Gangtok, capital of the princely state of Sikkim between India and Tibet.

The correspondent said rebels also were fighting Chinese in the Amto area of Tangut province, birthplace of Tibet's self-exiled Dalai Lama.

Authoritative sources on Nationalist Chinese Forces said rebel forces of 200,000 troops were fighting the Chinese Communist forces in Szechuan province and the border area province of Szechwan.

"Reports of vast troop movements in central Tibet reach here almost daily," the Gazette reporter wrote. He added that in addition to calling up reinforcements the Chinese are trying to draft Tibetans into the battle against the rebels.

The reporter said the Chinese are using greater planes against the rebels and have sent in soldiers to guard against attempts by Nationalist Chinese planes to drop weapons and supplies to the rebels.

The Times said most of the Chinese soldiers regularly stationed in Tibet before the revolt were young, unseasoned troops. They proved no match for the tough Khampa tribesmen who led the revolt.

Meanwhile, the initiative Dalai Lama is expected to have been in the north-east. He is expected to take a train to his ultimate refuge.

The young Tibetan God-King is 17. He is in the hills of Kham, a region where the rebels provide a proper refuge.

ROTC Investigation Voted on by MHA

The Men's Hall Assn. set the ball rolling against compulsory ROTC at MSU in their weekly meeting Thursday night.

Ernie Riddle, president of Bailey Hall, introduced a motion that the MHA investigate the procedure to set about abolishing compulsory ROTC. The motion was passed by the members.

A petition was also included to ask other campus organizations to join with them in this investigation and accompany the MHA to see Dr. Hannah to get a statement on the procedures necessary.

At a previous Men's Hall Assn. meeting the proposed change in milk distribution in the men's residence halls was approved, at least by the representatives from Brody group.

David Thorburn, manager of residence halls, and Miss Jones, assistant manager of residence halls in charge of food service, attended the meeting to present a plan for the change.

Instead of two glasses of milk for breakfast, the men will receive two at evening meals. No food reduction will be needed to make up for the added cost.

This plan will start in Brody group on April 13, and will continue throughout spring term on a trial basis. If resulting food costs increase too much, the change will be dropped next fall term.

East and West Shaw will decide if they are to be included in this new plan after General Council meetings and discussion with their advisors. At present a student opinion poll is being taken in these dorms.

Iraq Attacks Syria

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—The Middle East News reported Thursday that Iraqi police attacked a Syrian village Wednesday. One village policeman was killed in the battle and another wounded. The agency said the Iraqis withdrew across the frontier after the night.

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Colorful Frank Lloyd Wright, 89, master architect who fashioned a world reputation for brilliant design, died in a Phoenix hospital Thursday.

TOKYO (AP)—Michiko Shoda, daughter of a wealthy Japanese flour miller, Thursday married the heir to the ancient throne of Japan. Now "Her Imperial Highness, Crown Princess Michiko," the bride some day will ascend the throne as the first commoner empress in Japan's 2,600-year history.

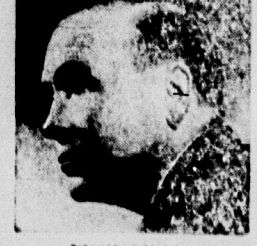
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Nicol Smith To Narrate Color Film

He also includes the small



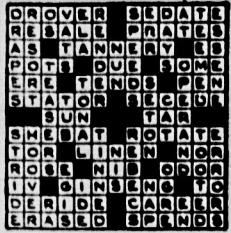

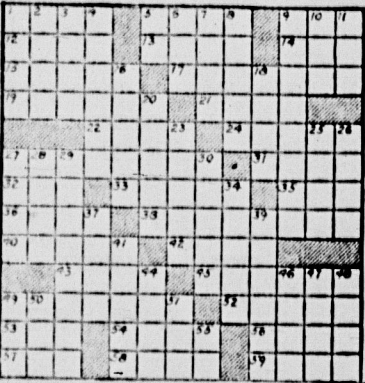

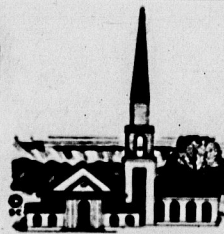

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Two Visiting Professors Plan Lectures on Campus

An English theologian and an American geographer will be distinguished visiting professors at MSU during spring term.

Rev. Dr. John White, one of the leading theologians in the English-speaking world, has been appointed to the department of humanities in the Basic College.

Dr. Charles Colby, a native of Rome, who has become one of the outstanding geographers in the United States, will join the department of geography in the College of Science and Arts.

The theologian will offer a lecture course on "Christian Faith in the Modern World" for tutors for faculty members and graduate and selected under-

graduate students. He will deliver a seminar series of informal lectures to address the April 28 annual meeting of the Friends of the Library on the topic "The Dead Sea Scrolls." At least two public lectures will be scheduled.

Colby, a specialist in economic and regional geography, urban and rural land use, will offer a seminar, entitled "Theory and Practice of Area Analysis in the Midwest" on the graduate level. The course will be based upon a wealth of experience gained as consultant to the TVA director of the Kansas Basin Project and director of the Mississippi River Valley Investigations.

MSU Accepts Financial Aid

Gifts and grants of \$1,073,100 were accepted March 19 for MSU by its governing body, the State Board of Agriculture.

Included were \$359,681 from the U. S. International Cooperation Administration for MSU's Brazil project and \$349,700 from the National Science Foundation for a traveling science teacher program.

The Brazilian project, one of seven international programs being carried out by MSU, is in its fifth year.

With the help of MSU specialists, the first school of business administration in all of Latin America was started in Sao Paulo in 1953.

The traveling science teacher program at MSU, under direc-

tion of Dr. Frederic Dutton, head of the Science and Mathematics Teaching Center, is one of four such programs in the nation being supported by the National Science Foundation.

Besides the funds for the traveling science teacher program, also accepted by the Board were three other grants from the National Science Foundation.

One of \$52,000 will be used under the direction of Dr. Robert Bandurki and Dr. Lloyd Wilson in botany and plant pathology. In their research they are interested in the pathways by which organic sulfur compounds are synthesized in the plant from inorganic sulfur compounds.
