Campus Model UN Sets First Meeting

The campus United Nations will hold an open organizational meeting Friday at 8 p.m. in the Union International Lounge.

American student petitioning for delegations will start today and run through Tuesday in the Union Concourse from 9-3.

The UN, sponsored by Junior Council, is patterned after the United Nations. Issues for debate will include resolutions forwarded from New York.

The organization is affiliated with the Collegiate Council for the United Nations (CCUN), a part of the American Association for the United Nations which brings information from the UN to campus groups.

The idea of a model UN comes from the days when model Leagues of Nations were sponsored in colleges. Today under the CCUN, model groups have been organized on campus and inter-collegiate levels.

The objective of CCUN was stated by former Secretary-General Dwight D. Eisenhower as that of spreading information of its procedures and operations through interested college men and women.

The aim of good fellowship amongst the closely working groups also helps to gain better understanding between the international and American students.

During the first meeting of the MSU-UN, a Secretary General will be elected from the General Assembly. Each delegation, composed of representatives from all the countries, will have one vote.

The Secretary-General will preside over all arrangements and serve as a unifying link for the entire organization. He acts as the chairman of the conference and is responsible for smooth functioning of the UN.

Agendas of future meetings will include questions of major importance which have been discussed at the last or recent sessions of the UN General Assembly or Security Council.

Encouraging the whole get-acquainted idea is the AUSG International Cooperation committee, whose office is located in the lounge. Members of this committee are especially pushing the gathering spot, which is the first place of its kind on the campus.

The convenient location and open welcome extended is intended to lead both visiting and American students to meet together and to promote better understanding, mutual friendships, and cooperation among all students at MSU.

Singer Dies at 38

Heart Attack Kills Mario Lanza

ROME (AP)—Mario Lanza, a golden voiced baritone from Philadelphia's "Little Italy" who entertained untold millions of axes at the peak of his climb from rags to riches, died Wednesday. He was 38.

Death was due to a heart attack at a time in life when he would have been at the top of his career. He long had been plagued by chronic overweight.

On the way up from the right of piano mover-truck driver, he made more than a million dollars in a year. Toscanini called his the greatest voice of the 20th century.

The tenor, whose movies and records made him an idol of both boys-and-girls and girls-and-boys, liked being called the incarnation of the Italian opera star Enrico Caruso. His picture, "The Great Caruso," grossed among the highest prices.

Dock Strike Fact-Finders Report Today

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower's fact-finders gave a fast start Wednesday to emergency machinery which may send 30,000 seafarer strikers back to work this weekend.

It took just one hour and 45 minutes for the three-man panel to take sharply conflicting testimony from the International Longshoremen's Assn. and New York waterfront employers on the dispute that has paralyzed east and Gulf coast ports.

Then Chairman Guy Farmer appointed the hearing—with an appeal to the parties to make every effort to achieve an early peaceful settlement.

In New York, President William Bradley of the Longshoremen's Union said that in the face of Eisenhower's invoking the emergency provisions of the Taft-Hartley Law "I see no reason why we should resume negotiations."

In the face of Taft-Hartley, it would be useless," Bradley said.

Farmer said that barring something we cannot foresee, the fact-finding board will file its report with Eisenhower today.

As soon as the President receives it, he can instruct Atty. Gen. William Rogers to seek a court injunction, probably on Friday. This would force the strikers back to the docks for 80 days while efforts are made to settle the dispute.

The testimony at the fact-finding hearing was brief but acid.

The ILA Counsel, Louis Waldman of New York, accused the employers of seeking wholesale elimination of longshore jobs, of refusing to bargain, and trying to "set the labor clock back 25 years."

Lacey Tells of Foreign Duty Career Offered in Service

More than 100 MSU students expressed an interest in careers in the United States Foreign Service as they turned out to listen Wednesday to talks by John Lacey, director of the Office of Research and Analysis for AAS.

Discussing qualifications for a Foreign Service Officer, Lacey listed a sense of humor as a prime requisite. Some background in economics is also helpful he said, as is a thorough knowledge of English. Lacey, who was a student at MSU in 1935, emphasized the importance of a Foreign Service officer's being able to read well and express himself in writing.

Educationally, Lacey stressed that a good liberal arts background is excellent training for foreign service applicants.

Entry into the Foreign Service is based upon competitive examination. Applications to take the written exam, to be held Dec. 5 in Detroit, may be secured at the Placement Bureau.

Execs Say Situation Hopeless

May Resort to T-H Injunction

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Steel negotiators despaired Wednesday of a strike peace pact on the eve of President Eisenhower's apparent deadline for government intervention under the Taft-Hartley Law.

President David McDonald of the United Steelworkers Union, saying a negotiated settlement seemed hopeless, sent the union's 170-man wage-policy committee home. The group would have to approve any new contract.

The on-and-off negotiations were again suspended with no further meetings in prospect to end the crippling 80-day strike, worst in steel history.

Neither the industry nor Union would budge from their stands after a "summit meeting" between McDonald and top industry executives got nowhere last night.

Eisenhower said a week ago he wanted a settlement by the time he returns to Washington tomorrow from a rest trip in Palm Springs, Calif.

McDonald said that if Eisenhower invoked the Taft-Hartley Law and seeks to stop the strike for 90 days under a court injunction the USW will fight the injunction attempt in the courts.

But if an injunction is issued the United Steelworkers of America will obey the law of the land, the union chief said.

McDonald said the union still wants Eisenhower to steer clear of Taft-Hartley and instead, name a public fact-finding board to recommend settlement terms. He said it would end the historic dispute more quickly and fairly.

Eisenhower, however, has expressed distaste for McDonald's plan unless the industry joins the union in supporting it. Under the T-H law an inquiry board would merely report strike facts without suggesting a solution.

The strike has cost 500,000 directly in the basic steel industry and some 200,000 indirectly in other industries, and the steel shortage was growing rapidly.

Nixon Nixes Subversive Aggression

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Richard Nixon Wednesday told Russia it must renounce subversion as well as force if Premier Nikita Khrushchev's policy of peaceful competition is to remain peaceful.

"The greater danger to freedom in many parts of the world, Nixon said, lies not in invasion armies, but in aggression which is effecting growth through subversion." He added, "We in the United States welcome peaceful competition, but we also realize that if competition is to remain peaceful, there must be rules of the game which all will follow."

It is not enough to say that we rule out the use of force across the border and that competition thereby becomes peaceful.

Nixon spoke off-the-cuff at the ceremonial opening of a three-day session of the Central Treaty Organization's council of ministers. This Mid-East defense alliance, formerly known as the Baghdad Pact, has as members Iran, Pakistan, Turkey and Britain. The United States works closely with the alliance.

Nixon, delivering the welcoming address for the United States, did not mention Khrushchev or the Soviet Union by name. But he spoke against a background of Khrushchev's recent visits to the United States and to Red China and of Washington concern over Red activities in Laos and other newly developed countries.

(Continued from Page 1) student should schedule three Basic College courses at any one time. The Committee recommends the following pattern: Natural Science and Communication Skills during the freshman year, Social Science during the sophomore year, Humanities during the junior year, and the "senior seminar" during the final year. The Committee believes that there is a need for renewed and continued attention to provisions for a liberal education. "Specialization and compartmentalization have so segmented knowledge that many departmental majors, even in Science and Arts, demand a concentration of studies not appropriate to some capable students," the Committee's report reads. "To provide the greater flexibility in program planning which appears desirable, renewed attention should be given to the divisional majors, to designing both intercollegiate and intracollegiate curricula to achieve definite and considered purposes which are not currently met by departmental majors, and to encouraging liberal interpretation of departmental requirements in the College of Science and Arts and in other colleges within the University." Along the lines of general education, the Committee believes that the name, Basic College, is perhaps no longer appropriate. Among possible names suggested are University College, College of General Studies and General College. According to the Committee, the Basic College courses should continue to have high priority in providing the best possible instruction.

He was a two-time winner for the Dodgers in 1957 when they captured their World Series.

Nellie Fox has been the most consistent batter for the Sox with eight hits and a .400 average. Shortstop Lou Kautski and first baseman Ted Kautski have seven hits each. The White Sox need the victory with much more confidence now that they can see the more comfortable outfield distances.

Instead of 251 feet to a center fielder, the mileage at Comiskey is 352 feet. It also is 312 feet in right and 415 feet to the bullpen in center. However, for the seven home runs hit so far were slugged at Comiskey.

Heron accounted for two of his tallies by cashing in rebounds off the goal's top crossbar. In the first period he converted Bernie Cook's near miss with goalie Casey Ter Haar still chasing the original shot.

Then in the third quarter he took Dave Christie's nearly-identical rebound and lobbed a looping head shot just out of Ter Haar's reach.

He also scored the next two goals—Nos. 6 and 7 of the afternoon for State—once by evading

The U.S. team was selected entirely on the basis of points earned in tournaments between Aug. 1, 1957, and Sept. 7, 1959. Both Open Champ Bill Casper and Littler became pros in 1954 and haven't been full-fledged PGA members long enough to earn many points.

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Texans OK Stadium Bond

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Dallas and Tarrant County voters approved by a margin of almost 2 to 1 today a \$9,500,000 revenue bond issue to build a Major League baseball stadium in the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

The election was on the proposition of whether revenue bonds shall be issued to build a 45,000-seat stadium, which sponsors says is needed to obtain a Major League franchise.

Under announced plans the stadium would not be constructed until a franchise is in hand and could be financed entirely from stadium revenue.
