Gridders Face Tough 'Irish'

THE MICHIGAN STATE gridders will meet a powerful opponent in the form of Notre Dame Saturday afternoon.

Michigan State will be looking for its fourth straight victory over Notre Dame, but the Irish have the edge in the games with a 16-8 record.

Spartan supporters can vent their enthusiasm at the pep band and bonfire, by the Bandsell at 7:30 tonight.

THE TWO TEAMS will be competing for the coveted "Telephone Trophy" which is awarded to the winner of the game.

The award was originated in 1949 by the MSU and Notre Dame alumni clubs of Detroit. The Irish took initial possession of the trophy in 1949; but the Spartans have won it six times out of seven since then.

The game will be the nationally televised game of the week and a capacity crowd of 76,000 is expected.

Notre Dame's star quarterback George Izo and Bill Mack, the best runner on the squad, are sufficiently recovered from injuries to play in Saturday's contest. It is questionable whether they will start the game.

NOTRE DAME will carry a 2-1 record into the game. They will have a 1-2 record.

The Irish have posted victories over North Carolina and Florida. They lost to Purdue. The magic number for Notre Dame seems to be 28.

It is the number of points they have won each game and lost by to Purdue.

Ray Ballman who usually plays at right half will be moved because of a finger injury which he suffered in a game against Indiana next week.

Ballman should be expected to play against Indiana next week.

The main concern in the Spartan camp is the play of sophomore Don Stewart who is suffering from a hip pointer injury.

It was thought the defensive halfback would be able to play completely. But team doctor James Duffey says he might be able to go at full tilt.

DUFFEY DAUGHERTY doesn't believe Snel will be able to see action.

Another sharp sophomore was running at Snel's defensive post at Thursday's practice.

Duffey says he seems to have snatched the defensive post to replace Don Stewart who was elevated to defensive right half slot. Stewart replaces Gary Ballman who is recovering from a finger operation.

The squad, led by guard Capt. Don Wright and Dean at the quarterback helm, worked against the dummy both offensively and defensively in the final major practice for Saturday's game.

The court will be composed of students and representatives of the various organizations.

'Ban Military Use Of Antarctic'—USSR

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Soviet Union Thursday joined free world countries in calling for a ban on military use of the Antarctic and a guarantee for unhampered scientific inquiries there.

Delegates opened their work at the conference, which will last a few weeks, by declaring that the military use of the vast, unsettled continent would be a serious obstacle to the scientific work of the 12 nations which have been cooperating under the International Geophysical Year program.

It was the first appearance of a Soviet delegation at an international conference since the 1955 Geneva talks, and Western delegates were hoping the talks would continue rather than end in a stalemate, as at the coming up on disarmament and Berlin.

The Russian, headed by Deputy Foreign Minister Valeri Kuznetsov, raised no objection when the head of the U.S. delegation, International Law expert Herman Phleger, was by all accounts the post of permanent chairman of the conference.

Steel Strikers Prodded Back To Negotiating

WASHINGTON (AP)—Government and industry officials urged steel strikers to get back to the negotiating table Thursday, saying both sides in the case should agree to sit down together here today.

President Eisenhower's deputy board wound up four days of hearings on issues behind the 10-day strike by saying the national industry wants a settlement.

George Taylor, the panel's chairman, said the crippling walkout, idling some 715,000 workers, is reaching the point where resuming steel production is more important than how it is done.

Taylor suggested that the industry and striking Steelworkers Union consider submitting their dispute to arbitration—line decision of an outside neutral—if they couldn't settle it on their own.

Both sides said they don't want arbitration, and prefer negotiations.

As the hearings ended, with the industry's presentation, Steelworkers' president David McDonald went into a huddle with his union's executive board. The industry's coordinating committee also met.

Late yesterday, it was announced that R. Conrad Cooper, the steel industry's top negotiator, had raised McDonald and arranged the meeting for this morning.

There was no apparent solid basis for expecting a settlement before Monday, when Taylor's panel must submit a report to Eisenhower. With this report in hand, Eisenhower would be free to seek a Federal Court injunction halting the strike for 90 days.

Movie Star To Head ND Battle

Movie star John Gavin will head the MSU-Notre Dame battle in the nationally televised game Saturday afternoon.

Gavin, who will lead the crowd of 76,000 in various lines and poses, all of which will be recorded on three-channel sound equipment.

The final scene of the film, in which Spartacus' slave army encounters the mighty Roman legions, will carry the tracks recorded at the eidron battle immediately prior to the start of the nationally televised game.

MSU's athletic department and AUSA cooperated in setting the project. AUSA will provide the game at East Lansing for the experiment. Gavin will be the only actor to appear in the Spartacus role.

There will be a pep rally at the stadium at 7:30 p.m. and all living units are encouraged to come together and form a block.

Athletic Director Biggie Munn will be there along with Capt. Don Wright, other members of the team and the cheerleaders. Spartan spirit director Chuck Cluff will emcee the pep rally and reports that there will be a bonfire at the band shell.

Cluff also said that plans are being made for the Spartan Review, which will be Nov. 6, the eve of the Purdue game. The Review will be in Jensen and there will be an admission charge of approximately 50 cents. Agents are now working to bring top entertainment to the event.

According to Cluff, Spartan Spirit is trying something unique in college campuses this year. They are trying to build up their own fund to last in the future. The fund will be self-supporting. If the fund is successful, it can be brought to the school.

Cluff said he is also trying to build up spirit in the school. He feels the emphasis is placed on building up spirit for the athletic gamblers, not for the spirit and pride in MSU itself.

On Game Day Car Traffic Rerouted

Due to the large volume of car traffic before and after Spartan games, the MSU Public Safety director, Richard Barrett, has announced that it has been necessary to institute one-way traffic movements, beginning at 12 noon until game time.

Particularly involved in the plan are residents of Spartan and University villages. Under the one-way street plan there is no exiting from University village to Kalamazoo street. The only exit will be the one entering Marquette, where all traffic will be turned south.

During the same interval all residents of Spartan village will use the M. Hope exit, all Harrison road exits will be closed.

For approximately 45 minutes in one hour after the end of the football game the one-way system is reversed. Traffic may go only west on Kalamazoo and at the Harrison road intersection it may either continue west or turn north.

Harrison traffic will flow only south from Shaw Lane to M. Hope.

Barrett reminded residents that Harrison road is to be used only by those people driving to the football game. Others exiting from University village will be directed south on Marquette to Harrison, south on Harrison to M. Hope.

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Ends Long Discussion On Algeria

President Offers Algerian Freedom

PARIS (AP)—The French National Assembly early Thursday voted President Charles De Gaulle a free hand in his effort to bring peace to Algeria through self-determination.

The unofficial tally of votes showed 441 approving the government's Algerian policy to 21 opposed, with 90 abstaining or not voting.

The constitution of the Fifth Republic does not require Parliament to pass on the President's actions. The massive endorsement of his policy gave him added strength to end the two-year Nationalist rebellion.

Those who voted against the government included a few who had bolted the Gaullist majority party, Union for the New Republic (UNR), a dozen or so conservatives, the ten communists and a few free-wheeling non-party deputies. Most of the Algerian deputies boycotted the session. The opposition Socialists voted with the majority.

Although extreme right opponents and most of the sitting in the National Assembly, there was little doubt that following the vote and an apparent majority of public opinion—the deputies were ready to fall into line behind the President.

Some would do so with heavy hearts. They are those who fear Algerians will seize offered independence. Even local autonomy, they feel, will be but a stepping-stone to full independence in a matter of months. They favor the third course offered by De Gaulle—complete integration of Algeria with France.

Nine members of the government majority party, the Gaullist Union for the New Republic (UNR) have quit since the debate began Tuesday because their leader, Prime Minister Michel Debre, refuses to come out squarely for integration. All are extremists.

Debatant opponents of the De Gaulle plan provided an emotional charged scene during the afternoon debate.

Jean-Baptiste Biaggi, one of the few who resigned from the majority party, ended an anti-government speech by saying he would vote so that those who had shed their blood in Algeria would not have died in vain.

As he stepped from the rostrum, Pierre Pitois, a French deputy from Bonn, rushed forward and seized Biaggi in his arms.

Pitois leads the group of Algerian deputies, who are boycotting the debate.

As the debate neared its end, the onslaught against the government mounted. De Gaulle, although not present, came in for indirect attack.

Democratic government has been replaced by Napoleonic government, charged Conservative Henri Theodule de Villers amid mingled protest and applause. "Have those who died in Algeria since Sept. 18 (date of De Gaulle's self-determination offer) died for France of the 'question mark'?"

The words "treason" and "treacher" were mentioned several times by those who applied De Gaulle was "giving away" French territory by allowing Algeria its freedom.

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American Scientists Awarded Nobel Prize

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP)—The 1959 Nobel Prize in chemistry was awarded Thursday to two American scientists who have synthesized two basic chemicals of life in the lab on the earth.

Dr. James Watson, 34, of New York University, and Dr. Francis Crick, 35, of Stanford University, shared \$42,500 in cash.

Dr. Crick, a British-born, received the prize with a cheerful "O.K." and he planned to go to Berlin in December to accept the award.

New York Dr. Ochoa, a natural American born in Spain, smiled happily at the news of his prize. He is a member of a host of organizations, students and other scientists who chose to work in chemistry, the two created the acids DNA and RNA in tube experiments.

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New Women's Hours Not for Socializing

THIS FALL ASSOCIATED WOMEN STUDENTS and Women's Division announced several changes in regulations for undergraduate women. Since the program is new, confusion has resulted over some of the regulations. The primary reasons for the changes were for academic purposes rather than social.

The new rules require freshman women and upperclasswomen below a 2.0 all-university average to return to living units by 10 p.m., Monday-Thursday. All other undergraduate women, except senior honor women, have an 11 p.m. curfew. Honor women have 11:30 p.m. curfew. However, male callers must leave women's living units by 10 p.m. Men may re-enter living units from 10:15-10:30 to call for women having later permissions. Sunday hours are midnight for all women; Friday and Saturday hours remain 1 a.m.

AWS has emphasized that the granting of 11 p.m. hours is to allow those students who wish to study longer at the library, to attend lectures and other academic activities. If men were allowed in the living units after 10:30, it is felt the time would be used purely for "socializing."

THE EXTENDED HOURS are directed toward a need and worthwhile purpose: to give women more time to devote to academics. However, the issue at stake appears to be: Why can't men be permitted to bring their dates back into the living units after 10:30 p.m.? In the past "closing hours" meant women had to be in, and men out of living units.

Why, now, is there such a distinction? Because some women must be in at 10 p.m., while others may stay out until 11 p.m., we understand why, and agree that, we are not permitted in lounges and living rooms after 10:30 p.m. This would obviously lead to confusion and prevent others from using these rooms.

However, by 11 p.m. the women with earlier hours would surely be out of lobbies. We therefore feel men should be allowed to enter the lobbies, or at least vestibules, to say "goodnight." This seems much more sensible than having a crowd congregating on front porches and sidewalks.

British Film 'Human Drama'

ROOM AT THE TOP

Significant things seem to be happening over in Britain these days. First a group of young writers doubted the "Angry Young Men" sprang up during the early fifties.

The children of lower and middle class families, these men were born and raised during the late thirties and early forties when the promises of the Socialists were being dinned into the head of the working class Britisher. They grew up expecting that the old and stifling class system where personal advancement was based on the "right" school would be gone and individual merit alone would be grounds for personal advancement. The promise was never realized.

Instead, the "new generation" faced a rigid class society forced to perpetuate itself on privilege with the ambition to get ahead and found bitterness and frustration when they had no place to go.

Acting as spokesmen for their generation they found no place to lash back at a society they found so much more than they wanted of changing. Their angry voice painted the stark and somber scene of British literary scene.

Now the vitality of this movement seems to have transferred itself to the British cinema which has reached a little staidly for a long time. The British cinema has had the American in some respects has in the past seemed to eagerly ignore the post-Victorian realities.

"Room At The Top" playing at the University is a powerful, frank and certainly adult in the best sense of that word. It is not applied to the pseudo-psychological TV case opera drama.

Joe Lampton, the film's protagonist, in a screen play adapted from the novel by John Braine, is certainly an angry young man. Faced with the ugly but non-apocryphal reality of spending his days in government service, he is found and determined to get off his lower class background and "reach the top."

The best and perhaps only avenue for advancement open is for him to effect an advantageous marriage. With this knowledge he systematically and somewhat cynically sets about seducing the daughter of the town's most powerful and wealthiest businessman. Along the way he quite accidentally falls in love with an older but mature and quite frankly, more sexually attractive woman. The problem comes when he has to choose between the two—the woman he loves and the young girl who offers him money and status.

This situation is developed sensitively and persuasively. The film owes much of its power to some fine acting and astute directing and certainly to a very excellent plot. Nothing is glossed over. When those four and five letter words that are used quite freely in the modern novel and in our present day stage are called for, they are used.

The sequences dealing with love's various love relationships are enacted with an uncommon reality and vividness. These are 4000 people in real situations acting as they would act, not in the Hollywood "their eyes met in a flash of red hot steel" or "Take me in your arms, Frank, I want to feel your hot lips on mine." The only real shocking thing about this picture is that the characters and their actions are so recognizably human.

All told, this is a powerful and intelligent adult drama, well and sensitively done and it cannot be too highly recommended. It is hoped that its significance will not go unnoticed and that we will receive more of the same refreshing frankness in the future from across the seas and perhaps from here at home.

Tedesco to Present Concert

Dr. Mario Castelnuovo-Tedesco, distinguished visiting professor in the music department, will play his own piano composition, "Evangelion," tonight at 8:15 in the Music Aud.

The composition, to be played for the first time in its entirety tonight, is subtitled "The Life of Jesus Narrated to the Children in 28 Short Piano Pieces."

It is programmed in four groups, "The Infancy," "The Life," "The Words" and "The Passion." Tedesco began thinking of the piece many years ago when he was in Italy. While visiting a small mountain chapel, he saw a series of 28 pictures of the life of Christ, painted simply in blue and white.

"I thought I would try to put the life of Christ in simple musical terms. I tried to become more simple and more direct. The pieces are not simple enough for children to play, but they are simple enough for children to understand," Tedesco said.

The composer was born in Florence, Italy, where he also

attended the Cherubini Conservatory. In 1939 he came to the United States and later became a citizen. He now resides in California.

Tedesco rose to fame in 1915, when as a 19-year-old boy, he wrote a war song that swept Italy. In 1925 he published his first opera, "La Mandragola," which won the National Opera Contest of Italy.

In 1939 he wrote "2nd Piano Concerto" for his debut at Carnegie Hall with the New York Philharmonic. Tedesco will play this composition Nov. 13 in Fairchild Theater for an MSU audience.

Tedesco is the author of three operas, the most famous of which is "The Merchant of Venice," taken from Shakespeare's play. It won the International LaScala Contest in 1958.

One of Tedesco's more unique compositions, "The Book of Jonah," will be presented on the November concert with his "2nd Piano Concerto."

This tells the story of Jonah in four parts—just as it is divided in the Bible. An all music cast will sing the oratorio.

Besides his more classical compositions, Tedesco has written scores for Hollywood movies, the most famous of which is "And Then There Were None" from Agatha Christie's novel.

The visiting professor is teaching a course in writing opera during his one-term stay at MSU. Along with his academic duties and professional performances, he is also giving a series of Monday night lectures on opera.

After leaving MSU in December, Tedesco plans to return to California and continue work on his next opera, "Saul." This is a tragedy taken from the works of the 18th century poet, Alfieri.

Next Sunday there will be a demonstration, explanation, and discussion of hypnotism.

Dr. Erich Fromm, one of the world's outstanding psychologists and psychoanalysts, will deliver a United Nations week public lecture at 8 p.m. Tuesday in Kellogg Center auditorium.

Dr. Fromm, professor of psychology at MSU since May 1957, has devoted a great deal of attention to international relations, and just recently returned from a European visit.

He will discuss "Individual Responsibility for World Understanding."
