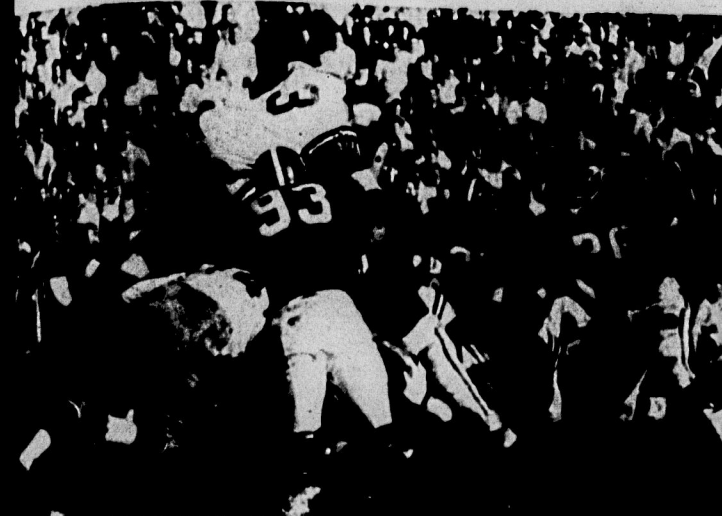

## Return to Form? Spartans Win Over Irish, 19-0

THE MICHIGAN STATE GRIDDEERS bounced back from their being by Iowa last week to down Notre Dame Saturday.

The Spartans and Irish sparred back and forth through most of the first quarter that was marked periodically by punts. The first State score was sparked by a 41-yard gain on a roll pass out back by Dean Look to the Notre Dame 36. Seven plays later six seconds left in the quarter Larry Hudis started left for the touchdown.

Brundstatter added the point after touchdown and made the 7-0 lead.

### St. Louis Win Ends Undeclared Streak

Spartan Booters Lose, 4-2; 1st Time in Varsity History  
An era of perfection ended Saturday when St. Louis University's soccer team outplayed and outscored the Spartans, 4-2, at the Soccer Field.

The Billikens ended an undefeated MSU varsity record, dating back to 1956 and covering 25 contests. It also snapped a 17-game winning streak for the nation's No. 2 ranked squad.

The game was the Billikens' first since the Spartans' first quarter went scoreless, the winners kept State goalie Noel Drago in constant trouble, forcing most of the play to his end of the field.

Heron broke the scoreless tie at four minutes of the second period, denting the net from the left hand side after taking an out of bounds kick from half-back George Sepetys.

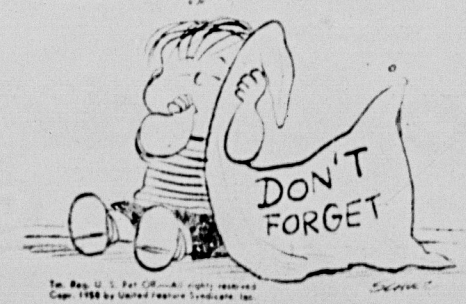
The penalty allowed Stredler to take one shot from 10 yards out, with only goalie Gene Block defending.

Endler's pair of tallies a half-minute apart led the game before halftime. His final score with less than a minute to go in the game was frosting on the cake.

The Spartans played one of their best games, observers felt, but the inadequacies which Coach Gene Kenney feared would plague the Spartans at the beginning of the year were most conspicuous against the NCAA title-hungry Billikens.

Driving blocks continually squelched MSU's scoring attempts. Spartan ballhandlers were unable to control games and the inexperience of State defensemen was evident.  
By virtue of the win, St. Louis is considered a favorite to represent the Midwest in the NCAA playoffs. However, if State should win the Midwest Soccer Conference Eastern division title and St. Louis lead in the Western loop, they would meet in a conference playoff game.  
A reversal of Saturday's decision could turn the tables again, but time is an important element. The conference and NCAA playoffs may be so close together as to prevent participation of a team in both.

The hours for the blood drive are: today and Tuesday, 11 a.m.-5:30 p.m.; Wednesday and Thursday 2-8 p.m.; Friday, 11 a.m.-3 p.m.

### Physical Fitness Necessary for Survival

The Executive Director of the President's Youth Fitness Committee addressed the MSU Youth Fitness committee Friday morning, at the All-University Physical Fitness Convocation, to air his opinions on youth fitness and its problems.  
Dr. Shane MacCarthy, appointed director of the President's Youth Fitness Council at its outset in 1956 explained the reason for President Eisenhower's establishment of the committee.  
"Fitness is a program that should be valued by all. In past years, youth fitness has deteriorated. The caliber of our young people's fitness is shocking, they no longer have the drive that was once known to Americans. Realizing this could mean disaster to the American people, President Eisenhower asked me, and a group of other men, to establish a committee that would evaluate conditions of the physical fitness of our younger people in America."  
He explained that fitness is completely different from physical fitness which uses only muscles. Total fitness embraces all factors in the human being — senses, intellect, will, and physique.  
Fitness is a condition that promotes and stimulates the interest and activities of people. It will lead to a better mode of life," Dr. MacCarthy said.  
When asked the cause of this lack in fitness of our adults and youth, Dr. MacCarthy blamed many things.  
"Machines above men; individuals may well be lost in a mass accumulation of mechanical might."  
He said we are in a situation that has to be altered or the future of America could be imperiled.

### Meeting Scheduled For Today

Eisenhower May  
Use Court Order

WASHINGTON (AP) — Urged on by a "final plea" from the Eisenhower Administration, industry and union leaders met with a presidential board Sunday in a last-ditch effort to settle the steel strike.  
The tense Sunday night battle in the Labor Department followed a 48-hour hearing before the three-member fact-finding board appointed by President Eisenhower under the Taft-Hartley Law.  
Unless a settlement is reached — one there is some prospect that one is near — the board is scheduled to report to Eisenhower at 11 a.m. (EDT) today. That only a court order can send the 50,000 steel strikers back to work.

All sides hoped to avoid the court order method, since this would only afford an 80-day "cooling off" period at the end of which the strike could be resumed if no final settlement is arranged meantime.

Parting of a permanent settlement during a temporary resumption of steel production will solve nothing, said Secretary of Labor James Mitchell, and will merely intensify the economic dislocation already caused.  
Mitchell, an interested spectator at the board of inquiry hearing, issued what he called a "final plea" statement urging the union and industry representatives to "get to work at once while there is time" to settle the strike, now in its 96th day.

"I believe that the steel companies and the steel union can settle this strike in the time remaining to them," Mitchell said, and can settle it permanently on the basis of the issues clarified by the public hearings."

## It All Started in 1956 25-Game Undeclared Streak in Review

for the team since pre-varsity days—the 1955-56 school year—and had been instrumental in keeping alive the booters' 25-game undeclared streak.

Both were in the stands as the Spartans lost their first varsity game after compiling a 23-0-3 three-and-a-half year record.

Southern and Ray Burdett, the latter who graduated after the 1957 season, strengthened the old Spartan Soccer Club to the point where MSU's athletic council, urged by Biggie-Minn, voted the team into the varsity program in 1956.

Asst. wrestling coach Gene Kenney was appointed to pilot the team on short notice, and it

was with difficulty that he lined up a six-game schedule for fall, 1956.

Five were on the road, but MSU's first varsity soccer game was home against Michigan. It was a 3-1 victory.

Let by such stars as Burdett, Southern, Vander Horst, Al Sarria, Goolie Al Sasanko, Angelos Philis, Santiago Cabal, Neil Butler and George Sepetyis, the booters went on the road and swept past Kenyon, Ohio, 3-2, Illinois, 6-1, and Wheaton, 4-0.

Sarria's five goals against Illinois remain a single-game individual scoring record for the Spartans.

The first mar on their perfect record came against Chicago Navy Pier, which dominated the Spartans, 2-2, the day after the Wheaton game and with Vander Horst and Karl Soudberg sidelined because of injuries.

The booters ripped powerful Purdue, 5-4, in the finale, a game marred by fighting and penalties.

State had come through its "trial" varsity season with flying colors. The booters were unbeaten and acclaimed Midwest-best champions. Philis was named to the All-American team and joined Sarria and

and Southern tied for scoring honors with 11 each, one ahead of Sarria who scored 31 goals in three seasons.

Sarria, Vander Horst and Neil Butler joined them on the All-Midwest squad.

With the exception of George Sepetyis, who was allowed four years of eligibility because 1956 was a "trial" varsity year, the last of the "charter members" departed.

Cecil Heron, who replaced Southern on the forward line, has scored 10 goals in the first four games of 1959, the first year State has been affiliated with the Midwestern conference.

State beat Indiana Tech, 4-3, Calvin, 9-0, and Slippery Rock, 4-0. But an inexperienced defense and weak reserves took their toll. St. Louis snapped a 25-game unbeaten streak and 17-game winning streak, 4-2, for the Spartans to end a wonderful era in MSU sports history.

1958 was the great year for MSU soccer. The team won the first Big 10 soccer crown, was voted the No. 2 team in the nation and was Midwestern champion for the third straight year.

Erich Stredler, Bruce Okine, goalie Noel Drago and Bernie Cook joined Southern, Vander Horst, Butler and Sepetyis as stars.

The booters won all eight games, five by shutout. Stredler

## 'It Had to End' Oldtimers Felt Defeat in the Air

"If we had some of our old halfbacks like Leo (All-American selection Leo Vander Horst) around, they'd never be able to touch us," Southern said when it was all over, but Vander Horst was just a visitor, too.

Defensive errors had shown in the Spartans' play throughout the early season schedule, but had never cost a victory until Saturday.

"Your reserves and defense made the difference. You deserved the win."

"And you deserved your record," Guelker returned. "I had us worried with those goals" (State had a 2-1 lead midway through the second quarter).

What remains? "We've still got a top team," Guelker asserted, "and we might be seeing St. Louis again before the season ends in the divisional playoffs of the Midwest Conference championship."

The practice run is expected to put the squad in better form, anticipating Friday's five-mile run with Penn State.

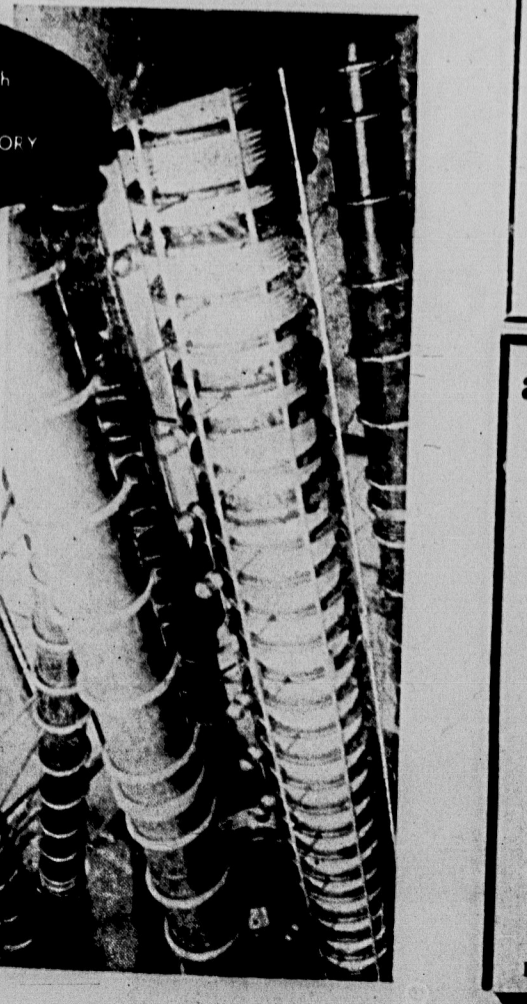
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# Duffy Calls Goal-Line Stand Key Play in Notre Dame Win

If they were to go unused by the students, it would be a mark against the physical education department and student interest. The increase of bicycles on campus was a gladdening sight to him. He expressed a desire to see center paths constructed on campus so bicycle riders would have a road to use without the worry of automobiles coming at them from all directions. The beauty of this campus should be seen by all students, and this sight can be appreciated on a bicycle. Dr. McCarthy referred to both north and south campus, with special emphasis on south campus. He doubted that the majority of students here at MSU had ever seen anything but the north side of campus. Biggie Munn, who served on a similar youth fitness program for three years, wholeheartedly agreed with the Fitness Committee plans. This program is terrifically important to all of us," Munn said. And here at State we have all the facilities needed for this program. Biggie explained that a youth program for all does exist at MSU. "No one has to be a varsity member to participate in an organized sports program. That's what the intramural program is for. Dr. McCarthy felt that local communities were at fault for not creating a fitness program for both adults and youth. Communities have grown so fast, they have ignored fitness facilities. Each community, he said, had the facilities for people, organizations, and religious groups to organize a fitness program. "It is not a rush program to answer the needs of the future, but a program that must continue if we are to survive," he said. Hanifi expressed the idea that today man is facing the greatest crisis of his time; the crisis of mistrust and lack of understanding. He said he feels the need for man to try and understand each other's cultures, customs and political thinking is great if we are to strive for peace. The MSU United Nations is patterned after the world organization in New York. This mock UN was organized by the Junior Council in cooperation with the International Club. The purpose is to provide an opportunity for students to discuss current international conflicts and misunderstandings, stressing particularly the role of the college student. It is entirely a student organization. According to Dave Bieber, Junior class president, the model UN has been three years in the making. With a united effort he hopes that the students, representing various countries of the world, will be able to develop a better mutual understanding.

Mohammed Toussi, chairman pro-tem, said he hoped the UN council would give all students a reappraisal of their "mental pictures" and "stereotyped conceptions" of other countries and nationalities. Permanent officers will not be elected until the third meeting of the UN. It was felt that this would allow time for the delegates to familiarize themselves with the other members and for suggestions to be given proper consideration. The second meeting of the UN is scheduled for Nov. 6 in the Union.

# Committee Urges Dean For International Area

(Continued from Page 1) The Dean of International Programs should be a staff officer to the Provost, in those matters relating to academic affairs. International programs and all educational activities dealing with foreign affairs, be they technical assistance, research or teaching oriented, should be completely under the control of the regular academic units and not attached to a central office. Recruitment of personnel for all international programs should also be handled in the same manner. Only in the case of default in recruiting by a unit should recruitment be done by an international program coordinator and then only for purposes of temporary overseas assignment. Two general principles need to be followed in developing and strengthening international programs at MSU: First, the international programs should be administered and selected to strengthen the regular academic departments, rather than to go around them. Second, it would be manifestly unwise for the university to go into the entire international dimension of higher education. We must be highly selective in the international sphere as well as in any other sphere. To do otherwise would dissipate our forces.

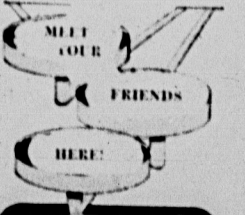
