

Tempers Flare Over Cash Troubles

Senate Okays Dorm Project Agree on Investigation Of Sanatorium Problems

MSU Thursday received legislative approval of plans for a \$3,250,000 dormitory project to be financed on a bonding basis, the AP reported Thursday.

The Senate concurred with a House-approved resolution giving the lawmakers' blessing.

The proposed project calls for housing of graduate students in a facility with 430 single rooms. Bonds to cover construction costs would be repaid from income from room rentals.

Lawmakers informally also agreed to look into an arrangement that would pave the way for abandonment of Finestra Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Powers, as a four-county TB facility.

Carl Lindquist, an institution board member, told the senate appropriations committee his 120 beds are less than half occupied, making continued operation uneconomical and burdensome for Delta, Dickinson, Iron and Menominee counties.

Lindquist said plans for its operation for another year, and suggested that thereafter it might be taken over by the state.

Instead, committee members favored exploring the possibility of taking a lease on the sanatorium, perhaps for conversion into a facility for the mentally ill.

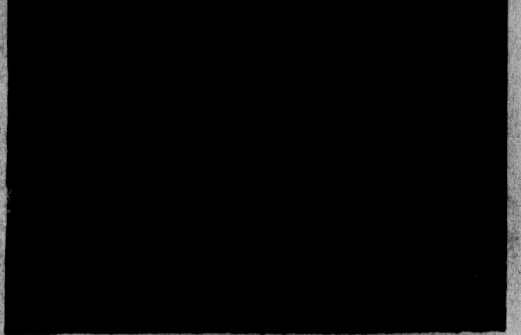
Coed Gridders Set for Powder Puff Tilt

U of M to Fire Two Rockets

ANN ARBOR (AP)—University of Michigan engineers will fire two five-stage rockets 1,000 miles high this month to measure electron density in the ionosphere.

The launches are scheduled Nov. 10 and 17 at Wallops Island, Va., a national aeronautical and space administration facility.

University engineers headed by Leslie Jones and Nelson Spencer, who have developed the rockets from military hardware, built their own electronic measuring payloads and will press the firing button. This month's firing will be the 75th rocket launching in which university engineers have participated since World War II.

The multi-stage rocket, which stands 57 feet tall and weighs more than 7,000 pounds when loaded, is expected to reach a maximum speed of about 1,200 miles an hour.

Squabbles Waste Time In Senate

Writers At Work On Tax Package

Tempers flared in Michigan's cash crisis row Thursday and legislative tax writers found themselves boxed in by an attorney general's opinion blocking another use tax increase according to AP wire release.

Chaucing a political squabble on the senate floor over the state's cash troubles, Sen. John Smeekeens' (D-Calumet) accused Gov. Williams of "concocting" a political ploy for state employees Nov. 19.

Countered Williams' "non-sense."

Earlier, Sen. Stanley Novak (D-Detroit) asserted Republicans have "crucified an individual and wrecked a state" if the individual obviously being Williams.

Smeekeens, an outspoken critic of the Democratic governor, said Williams' strategy was to ram through a state income tax by stepping up payment of some state obligations, leaving the state treasury all but bare.

Williams and Democratic legislators have tried fruitfully for a personal and corporate income tax package.

When the hassle ended, a bipartisan steering committee of the House and Senate resumed efforts to write a new tax package to replace the use (sales) tax increase tossed out by the State Supreme court.

Atty. Gen. Paul Adams narrowed the field, ruling out a GOP proposal to repeal the three-cent sales tax and replace it with a four cent use tax. Adams, a Democrat, said it would violate the three-cent ceiling the constitution sets on the sales tax.

Sen. Clyde Geering (R-Holland), chairman of the steering committee, said the 16 tax writers appeared to be approaching agreement on a package that would extend the sales tax to service firms, like drycleaners, bringing in 30 million dollars a year, and increase the beer tax by at least seven million dollars.

Geering also voiced encouragement for a plan to divert \$2 million dollars in state highway money to the state police force. He and Sen. Carlton Morris (R-Kalamazoo) Thursday jointly introduced a bill authorizing the transfer.

The committee earlier discussed a proposal by Rep. Willard Boverman (R-Lansing) to levy a \$5 tax on every moving violation in traffic. He estimated it would yield six million dollars.

One Act Play To Climax Arts Festival

Theta Alpha Phi, dramatics honorary, will present a reading theater consisting of a one-act play, "Sweet Confessions," and eight modern poems read to jazz accompaniment at 7:30 tonight in the Union Ballroom.

The play, "Sweet Confessions" is a study of the actions of human beings and their reactions to mental and physical stress. It has been produced once before, in France, by the author Georges Arnaud.

The story tells of a burglar in custody who will not confess to the police. The police allow him to marry his sweetheart and then tell him that if he will confess, they will allow him one hour with her in private.

The eight poems read will include "The Love Song of J. Alfred Prufrock," "Little Gidding" from Four Quartets, "Room 24," "Lament," "In My Craft or Sullen Art," "Untitled Poem," "Patterns" and "Fire and Ice" by Robert Frost.

Series Slates Travel Film On Persia

WASHINGTON (AP)—The National Broadcasting Co. revealed Thursday it has uncovered a money "kickback" system on one of its quiz shows and is turning the evidence over to the New York district attorney. The disclosure came with the suggestion that Congress make TV quiz shows rigging a federal crime.

Wins Peace Prize

OSLO, Norway (AP)—Philip Noel-Baker, British Quaker statesman and author, won the 1959 Nobel Peace Prize Thursday. He announced in London he will spend the \$42,650 prize money to promote the cause of international disarmament.

Printers Strike

BOSTON (AP)—Printers struck six Boston daily newspapers Thursday night in a contract dispute, forcing the plants to close down. It is the second such shutdown in 27 months.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore) announced Thursday he plans to ask Congress to vote the President strong new powers to halt strikes threatening national emergencies. "We can no longer afford the luxury of prolonged disputes such as that now confronting the steel industry."

Tension Easing

PANAMA (AP)—Regular Canal Zone police were ordered Thursday to resume control of the border separating the Panama Canal Zone from Panamanian territory. The move was interpreted as a sign that anti-American tension was easing. U.S. troops took over the border control duty after an outbreak of violence Tuesday.

New Research Center to Open Soon

Investigations in cancer biology and heredity will be emphasized when the new Biology Research Center opens for operations on South Campus in the near future.

Included in the new equipment available to the researchers in the facility will be a large model electron microscope capable of magnifying cell structures 100,000 times or more.

The scientists in the new building come from the ecology, botany and entomology departments of the College of Science and Arts. Their research is being supported in most instances by grants from federal agencies, such as the United States Public Health Service, which is also contributing to the erection of the building.

Among the projects being carried on at the Research Center are a study of the inheritance of tooth decay in rats, directed by Dr. Harrison Hunt, experiments on the transmission of tumours in frogs, headed by J. R. Shaver, and investigation on gibberellins, guided by G. B. Wilson.

Educator Visiting Campus

Secretary School Offers 2 Grants

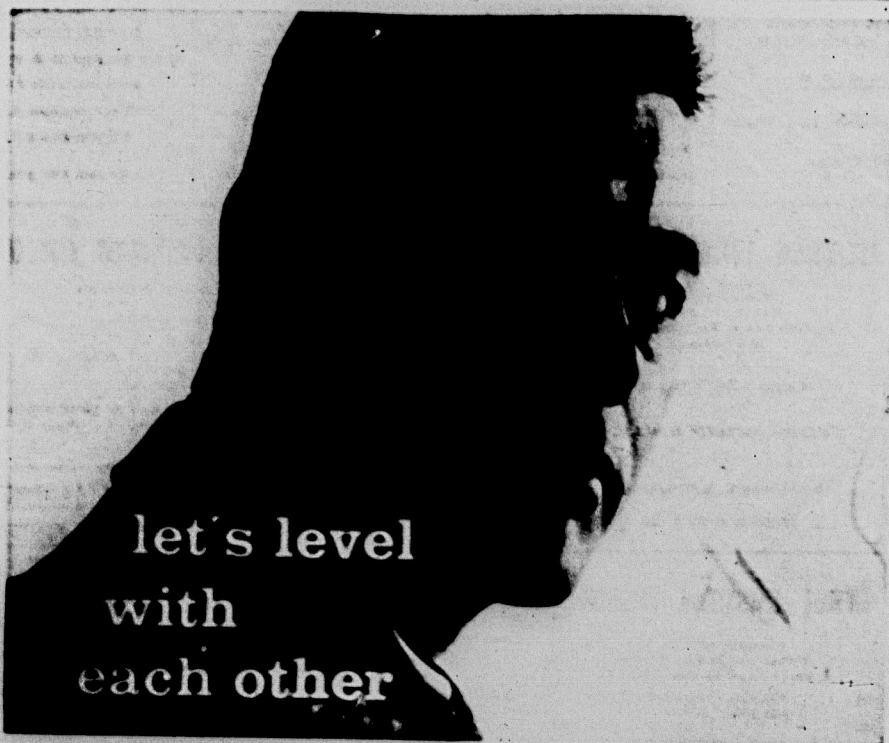

Wanted: New Warts

Working with him are two Detroit dermatologists who periodically remove warts from patients in his MSU laboratory.

them with a tiny, dull, spoon-like instrument.

The research is of importance to the American cancer society because warts are similar to other tumors.

If it could be shown that a virus causes warts, it would lend support to the theory that a virus causes other tumors.

Full-Time Standing Challenged

Confused Division Causes Difficulties

By GEORGE SAVAGE

Considerable confusion has recently come to light regarding the change in credit requirements for full-time and part-time students.

According to Tom King, dean of students, a number of departments on campus have called for a clarification of exactly what constitutes a full-time student.

Previously the registrar called anyone carrying 11 or more credits a full-time student for the term. This fall, in relation to a fee schedule change, a student must carry 12 or more credits to acquire full-time status.

The main problem lies in the fact that there is no uniform understanding of the new classification among the departments affected.

The health center has recently had problems regarding the extent of treatment and service to students. Full-time students are entitled to complete treatment and service, while part-time students have been required to pay for rooms and meals.

The Faculty committee on student affairs issued a recommendation to President Hannah that steps be taken to codify the many definitions of full-time and part-time status.

President Hannah has appointed a committee of four to formulate a concise definition of full-time status requirements. Dean King, Provost Paul Miller, computer Phillip May, and Milton Maelder, dean of the School for Advanced Graduate Studies, have been asked to handle the problem.

According to Dean King, full-time status might be determined on a fee basis rather than by credits carried.

In some instances, graduate students are carrying a full load, paying full fees, according to the 12 credit system, are considered as part-time students.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Further negotiations can be expected in the Southern California-California controversy over the McKeevee "incident" of last November, but officially the case appears closed.

President Coach Fred Elliott of California announced that USC coach Mike McKeevee will be allowed to coach at halfback Steve Bates, who suffered a fractured anklebone and nose and head injuries during the game.

California's president, Clark Kerr, and USC president Norman Thwaites, previously stated questions of the action, USC officials, but not Coach Fred Elliott or McKeevee, issued an apology.

In Honolulu, Dr. Kerr said, "I consider the statement by President Thwaites a satisfactory statement and consider the incident closed except for review of the picture by the Athletic Assn. of Western Universities."

Under rules of AAWU, such a review procedure could not be held until after the season ends. The "incident" is "closed" in other words,

each school is responsible for holding its own athletes.

Tom Hamilton, the AAWU executive officer, does not have vetoing powers as did the commissioner of the now defunct Pacific Coast Conference.

However, the AAWU does set its rules for handling similar situations in the future.

In any case, McKeevee can count on being carefully watched during his future games.

In Los Angeles, Coach Clark Kerr, "I personally do not feel that I must apologize for the actions of the USC team at Berkeley."

McKeevee declared, "I would have been as malicious as any man in the world if I had not been a coach."

Despite the proximity of the game Saturday when Cal meets Oregon and USC plays West Virginia, the McKeevee-Bates case is closed.

The only bright spot for the Red Wings was Gordie Howe, who scored his team's first goal and then added an assist on Gary Albohn's second-period goal—and those two points gave Howe 1,000 points in an NHL career that goes back 14 years.

Boston's Ukrainian line of Johnny Bucyk, Bronco Horvath and Vic Stasiuk scored half the Bruins' goals, Bucyk tallying twice and adding a pair of assists in the runaway.

The Wings kept it close halfway into the second period. Then the Bruins smashed in three early goals in less than four minutes.

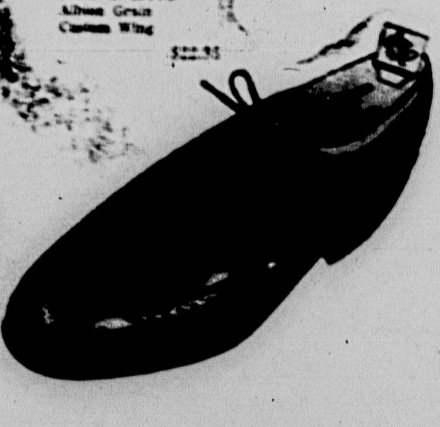

MSU Prof Still Lauded For Study

"The Collective Dream in Art," written by the late Walter Abell of the MSU Art Department, continues to receive notice in the press.

In a recent Art Trade News publication, a special review states that the Abell "psycho-analytical study" should stand on the same level with similar contributions to the cultural understanding of man as Helmut Thomas Buckle's "History of Civilization in England," E. I. Watkins' "A Philosophy of Form," Christopher Caudwell's "Masses and Reality," Robert Briffault's "The Mothers" and "Rational Revolution" and Jennings C. Wise's "A Philosophical History of Civilization."

The "Psychiatric Quarterly" of last January calls the book "a noble endeavor well-planned, well-argued and well-written," and the "British Journal of Psychology" included a flattering review indicating that the book is "deserving of serious attention from anyone interested in the function of art and artists in society."

The reviewer, Joan Reeves, indicates further that Professor Abell does not seem to have lost himself in the metaphysical, subjective-ekphrastic of the Jungian collective unconscious not taken over the archeological baggage supposedly deposited there. Professor Abell is well aware of the fallacies in Marxism.

The "College Art Bulletin" states that Abell's book can be a basis for continuing exploration of the larger problems of art historical epiphany.

He will speak on the topic "Education and Communication," in 31 Union.

Flight Instruction Program AFROTC Cadets Start Flying

The contract for the AFROTC Flight Instruction Program in Spartan Aviation Inc. at Capital City airport, under terms of the more than \$18,000 contract, the first flights began Oct. 23.

The contracted amount will provide 27 senior cadets with a total of 10 1/2 hours each of flying time. This time consists of 20 hours dual and 10 1/2 hours solo time.

The cadets will fly 134 horsepower Tri-Pacer Cessnas and will practice traffic procedure, navigation, aircraft familiarization, cross country, and aerobatics.

There are three main objectives of the FIP as defined by the FIP Project Officer, Captain Thomas King. The first is to motivate future Air Force officers.

The second is to encourage young men into the AFROTC program. The third is a process of selection of the cadets who are capable of becoming pilots in the Air Force.
