Spartans Set To Meet NW

THE MICHIGAN State football squad will attempt to rekindle their faint hopes of a title slot when they meet Northwestern at 1:30 Saturday. The Spartans will be facing one of the most powerful teams in the league with their own crippled squad. The Wildcats have three of the top 10 scorers in the league. Burton is tied for first and Ray Purdin and Mike are fifth and sixth respectively. The Spartans will be without the help of Carl Charon and Blanche and Mickey Walker are doubtful starters. The Spartans will be attempting to play the spoiler for the second week in a row. Last week against Purdue they killed the Boiler-makers chances of going to the Big Ten Bowl.

Northwestern was favored in last Saturday's game by as much as 10 points in some of the polls. The Spartans behind the leadership of quarterback Dean Look dumped the favorites

Northwestern lost its first game of the season last week Wisconsin, 24-19, and the two teams moved into a tie for the top spot in the Big 10.

The Spartans and the Wildcats are similar in many respects. Both squads have better than average speed, with Northwestern

Reds Again Raise Old Berlin Question

Kremlin Protests Reports Of New 'Propaganda' Station

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union thrust the dormant Berlin issue to the fore again Thursday by charging that the West German government plans to build a new radio station in West Berlin for propaganda.

The Kremlin released a stiff note of protest to the United States, Britain and France asking them to take measures to prevent such "unlawful" action. It charged the plan was a premeditated attempt to interfere with the success of the forthcoming negotiations on the Berlin question.

It said this came when the Camp David talks of Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev and President Eisenhower had created more favorable conditions for reaching an agreement on Berlin.

Setting up the West German radio station, Deutschlandfunk in West Berlin, Russia charged, would violate the present status of the divided city and was aimed at "fanning up

the cold war" and increasing "subversive activity and hostile propaganda" against East Germany.

Socialists argue that Joseph Goebbels used just such a set-up to put over Nazi propaganda. Interior Minister Gertard Schroeder says however, the national bookshops would be managed by representatives chosen from public and private life and would remain free of government control.

The West Berlin headquarters would direct broadcasts to all Germany and neighboring countries, but the measure does not say where the transmitters would be located.

There will be a FM stereo set-up in the Union music room 4-5 Sunday afternoon for those who do not have special sets and wish to hear "Sunday Concert."

The program, "Sunday Concert," will consist of short examples of difference between stereo and monaural broadcasting. This will be followed by 30 minutes of well-known classical music.

A second concert of similar nature will be heard Nov. 29 from WSWM and the second from WKAR-FM.

This is the first time either station has broadcast stereo. Those desiring to hear the program should tune in one FM receiver to 90.5 mc, and another receiver to 99.1 mc.

WKAR-AM/FM will broadcast stereo programs on a regular basis in December.

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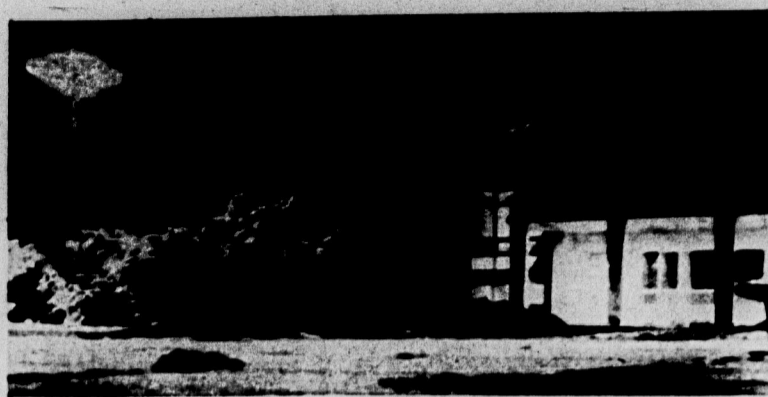

Victory Shows in Vocal Freedom

London Conquers Aud. Crowd With Varied Musical Program

The barn has been beaten! The University Aud has met its vocal master. George London moved in Thursday night. He brought Mozart, Ravel, Gounod and some folk songs and spirituals along to make the conquest complete.

London sang the first song, "Boris epais," from the opera "Amadis de Gaule," with chin down and heavy voice—in character with the morbid melody.

The second song, "Air de Charon, from the opera "Alceste," had a more emphatic ring than the first and this reporter had the feeling that London had begun his conquest. By the end of the song, he had undisputed ownership of the stage.

The next part of the program was Johannes Brahms' difficult Op. 121, "Vier ernste Gesänge." The first song began lightly, then gained strength. London masterfully handled the difficult jumps in range near the end.

The second song of the group was marked by London's deep rolling bass. In the third song "O Tod, wie bitter bist du," the words, "How bitter" seemed to have a terrifying depth of feeling.

London had nearly finished the Brahms selection and he knew he had conquered the Aud. His voice became brighter and seemed to gain a conqueror's freedom.

London, to complete his victory, used Mozart's Non plus and from the "Marriage of Figaro." The artist swept out on the stage and became Figaro to a now smiling, head-bobbing, foot-tapping audience.

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Lawmakers To Resume Next Week

GOP Tax Package Introduced in Senate

Legislative action came to a standstill Thursday. Most senators and representatives left for an extended week-end of deer hunting and other pursuits after Republican senators formally introduced their tax package and debated a resolution to place a constitutional amendment permitting corporate and personal income tax.

Political fireworks are expected to resume in the Senate next Tuesday when the tax bill will be eligible for action.

House members, who have no work before them, expect a quorum on Wednesday.

The GOP finance tax package reached the Senate floor, embodied in four bills approved by the taxation committee. Its size was increased 1 1/2 million dollars to 14 million by changes in beer and cigarette tax items.

Only 24 of 106 House members answered roll call. No business was transacted.

Majority Republicans tried for a quick adoption vote on separate resolutions to put sales tax increase and income tax propositions on the ballot for a state-wide vote in November, 1960.

However, they needed Democratic votes and when the minority announced none would be forthcoming the possibility of decisive action without delay was ruled out.

The tax package comes first. We've got all next year to decide what should go on the ballot," said Harold Ryan (D-Detroit).

He told newsmen that Democrats might agree to at least the sales tax resolution, entirely

sought by Republicans, after an emergency tax settlement is reached, possibly in a week or two.

At Republican insistence, rambling debate and political fencing, but no vote, ensued on the income tax resolution.

As it came from the judiciary committee, carrying Republican amendments, the resolution would empower the Legislature to impose graduated taxes on income of both individuals and corporations.

Sen. Philip Rahot (D-Inel Mountain) sponsor of the proposal, asked that his name be removed after the GOP amendments were tacked on. His request was turned down.

Rahot had called for granting such authority only with respect to corporation profits.

Sen. Carlton Morris (R-Kalamazoo), judiciary chairman and GOP tax strategist, said Democrats appeared to be backing off from their stand in favor of state income tax on individuals.

Administrative Visit Could Incite Profs

THE FACT that many students feel a need for voluntary attendance of classes indicates that there is something lacking on the part of some instructors at MSU.

The university might do well to copy some practices at other universities to attain better quality of teaching by professors.

Johns Hopkins University has an open-door policy, as do the military academies. These are not unlike the graduate training schools of some corporations.

If the practice is so common in elementary and secondary schools, why not in college? Instructors might learn from observing others and be more worthwhile when they know they're being observed.

A few schools have a regular system whereby administrators visit classes. The president of Harvard has done this, as have the deans of Purdue, Columbia and Minnesota.

THE FACULTY of Colorado College recognized the gap between administrative ideals and actuality, and asked the dean, by unanimous resolution, to visit classes regularly.

Paul Davis, a former educational administrator, in an article in the booklet, "Liberal Education," quoted a dean of a school he visited as saying that, though he doesn't visit classes, "When I hire a new man, unless he is a full professor, I assign him for a semester to assist one of our best teachers. That way he has a half year of seeing and hearing good teaching."

MSU DOES HAVE one policy, listed in the handbook "Faculty Facts," which could have value if it were followed more strictly.

The regulation further provides that faculty members who have been with the institution longer than one year will use either the student opinionnaire or the teacher evaluation sheet in at least one course every term for at least one year.

These evaluation reports are not in any way made for comparative studies, but for the instructor's individual growth. The results are the personal property of all staff members, except graduate assistants, who confer with the department head concerning the rating scale results.

These rating scales should be adhered to, and extended for longer periods of time.

We are not in favor of compulsory attendance of classes, as we have stated before, but if more instructors could give lectures worth attending, there would be no need to require students to be present.

Under present regulations, Dean King has no choice. Any rule or provision which so disallows evidence in extenuation and mitigation is autocratic.

These regulations should be changed at least to exclude students over 21 living in unapproved housing and married students over 21.

Dr. Truitt recently said this could promote a double standard.

In the pursuit of justice, any attendant administrative headaches are unimportant.

If a double standard is socially or administratively unpalatable, what will be done about the double standard now working effectively against any faculty?

If a student creates a slight disturbance, he can be reported to the university and receive disciplinary action. But on a student even by inference threaten his neighbor with being fired, say, by Oldsmobile or

It is unfortunate that the whole house must suffer suspension, but where's all the brotherhood feelings? Does "all for one, and one for all" disintegrate when things get a bit sticky?

Secretary Puts Blame on Reds Hertz Hits Chinese Use of Force

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Christian A. Hertz Thursday condemned the use of force by Red China in its border dispute with India.

He had said in response to one question that the United States naturally assumes that the border claims made by the Indians against Red China are correct but that the United States has only the word of its friends to go on and has no objective information.

His later statement was issued by press officer Lincoln White and it said: "The questions asked me on this subject (at the conference) seemed to me directed at the legal rights being asserted and my answers were limited only to the legal and rival claims."

TV in Need of Ethics, Prof Says

Character will soon command premium prices in television, says Leo Martin, head of the department of television, radio and film.

The quiz investigations have illustrated the need for personal ethics in the TV industry, Martin said at a meeting of the University's YMCA and YWCA.

"More and more, colleges and universities will be expected to provide professionally-trained men and women with a high sense of responsibility toward the TV viewer," he commented.

"That part of the education which is devoted to broadcasting must, of necessity, keep the issue of social consciousness paramount at all times."

Martin noted that ethics was a required course in MSU's television curriculum.

"There are unlimited opportunities ahead for young people who have a high degree of intelligence and a strong college preparation in broadcasting," he prophesied.

125,000 Cars, No GM Help

DETROIT (AP)—Automotive makers will build about 125,000 cars in the first two weeks of this month with almost no help from General Motors.

Automotive news Thursday estimated production for the current week would run 61,700 cars. Last week 61,451 were built. GM plants contributed only about 10,000 to the total before shutting down completely Wednesday.

General industry production is running about 75 percent of normal, due to steel shortages. GM quit entirely when it ran out of steel. Chrysler is slowing down.

Bloomfield to Receive Distribution Award

Daniel Bloomfield, founder and director of the Boston Conference on Distribution, has been selected to receive the MSU Marketing Award for 1959.

The award is presented annually by the Marketing and Transportation Administration faculty in recognition of service to the improvement of American business and economic performance by a distinguished business executive or public servant.

The Marketing award will be presented to Bloomfield by Provost Paul Miller in Kellogg Center on Thursday. Bloomfield will deliver an Awards Address at 8 p.m. entitled "Advances in Marketing and Distribution in a Changing World."

The address will be preceded by a dinner in the Centennial Room at 6:15 and a reception in the Red Cedar room at 7:30. A number of leading executives from the Lansing and Michigan business communities are expected to attend.

The Boston Conference on Distribution, which was founded by Bloomfield 20 years ago, was an outstanding pioneer attempt to bring together businessmen and academicians for the serious exploration of business problems. Today it is a major international forum for the discussion of marketing and distribution.

Bloomfield graduated from Harvard in 1912 and took his law degree at Boston University law school. He is a member of the Massachusetts and Federal Bars and the author of numerous books including "Labor Maintenance," "Trends in Retail Distribution," "Commercial Arbitration" and "Chain Stores and Legislation."

Dr. Mario Castelnuovo-Tedesco gives his seventh lecture on Opera in a series of ten Monday lectures in the Kellogg Center of the Music Building at 7:30 p.m.

The opera to be considered is one of the most popular in the entire opera repertoire, Bizet's "Carmen." Its most dramatic action, and perhaps the most frequently performed, is well known. 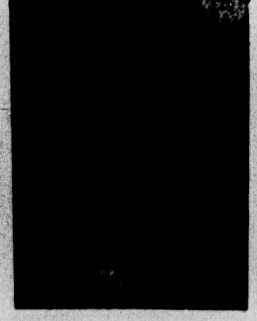

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Senator Says Buy Cranberry Crop to Prevent Money Loss

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—The government official who publicly put cranberries under suspicion is going to get them with his Thanksgiving dinner, his wife says.

Mrs. Arthur Fleming, wife of the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, told the Evening Tribune that the furor over her husband's Monday disclosure that some cranberries had been contaminated by dangerous weed killer was unwarranted.

She said there would be about a dozen family members and friends at the dinner in Washington and as far as cranberries go, we will all have them.

Mrs. Fleming said in Wednesday's telephone interview that she hadn't even considered a substitute.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Richard Neuberger (D-Ore.) suggested that the government buy up untainted portions of the cranberry crop to prevent serious money losses to producers.

Neuberger's proposal, announced through his capitol office, varied somewhat from those which have been made by others for some kind of reimbursement to cranberry producers not at fault in the current situation.

Secretary of Welfare Arthur Fleming, who announced Monday that portions of the crop grown in Oregon and Washington have been found to be contaminated by a weed killer, was asked by reporters Thursday about industry assertions that the government should pay damages amounting to perhaps 100 million dollars.

"As to any responsibility to indemnify the growers," Fleming said, "I have not looked into it and I do not want to get into that."

Neuberger said he is having legislation drafted to authorize federal purchase of untainted portions of the crop.

N. H. Primary Decision Date

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Gov. Nelson Rockefeller pinpointed the New Hampshire primary as his likely target date for deciding whether he'll campaign for the Republican presidential nomination.

The New York governor hinted his possible candidacy to his legislative program and ho who goes over with Republican leaders.

Rockefeller told a press conference, marked by a dispute with television newsmen, that entry into the first-in-the-nation New Hampshire primary next March would be his first specific decision.

"The framework for dealing with the problems of New York will have been established by the time I have to make the decision," he said.

More than 30 witnesses were scheduled to appear before the senate group, headed by Eugene McCarthy (D-Minn.). The committee is studying areas and states hit by chronic unemployment. The hearing ends tomorrow.
