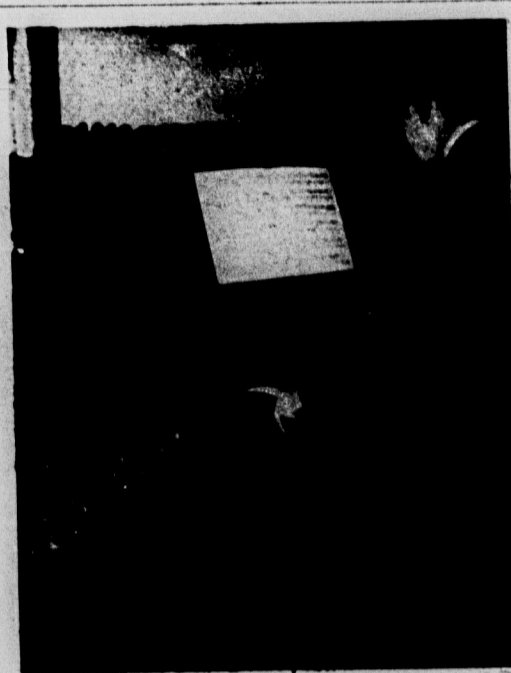

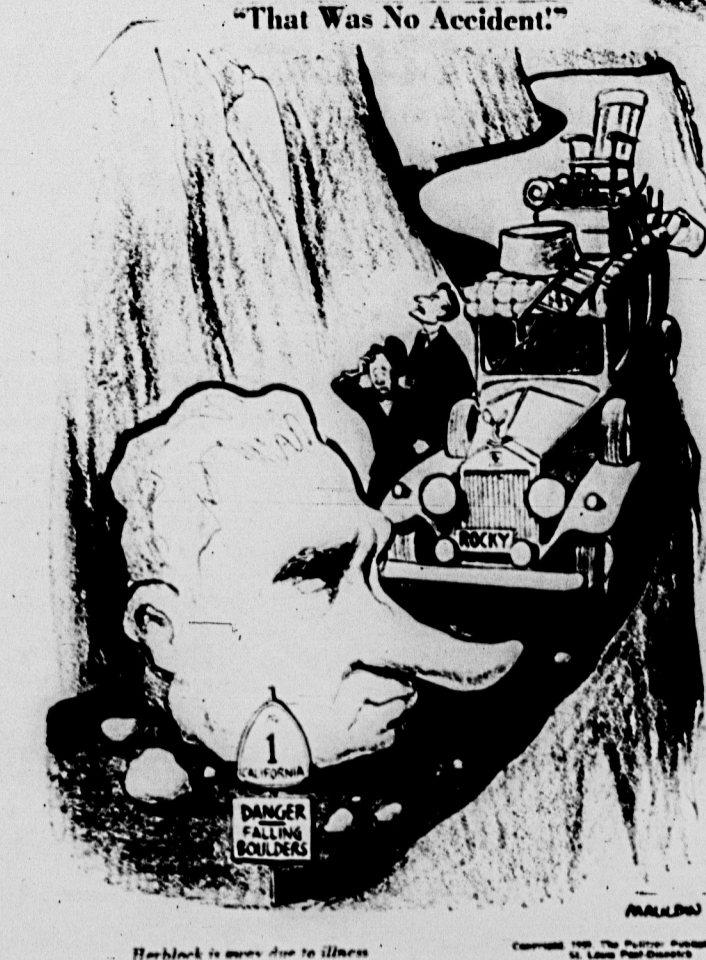

7 Returning Lettermen Give Depth To State's Hopeful Gymnastics Team

Michigan State's gymnastics team, with seven returning lettermen, can be considered a strong contender for Big 10 and National honors this season, according to Coach George Szypula.

Szypula after a third place league finish last year, looks to "goed north everywhere" to contribute to dual meet, league and NCAA wins.

Leading the Spartan team are Angelo Festa, team captain, and

Stan Tarshis, defending Big 10 and NCAA high bar champ. Also returning, after a year's ineligibility, is Dick Becker who was NCAA free exercise runner-up in 1958.

Other returning monogram winners are John Daniels, Chuck Thompson and Tom Temple, free exercise, tumbling and trampoline experts, and Harold Shorr, an all-around performer. Szypula is counting on newcomers to the varsity squad, Larry Bassett, Gani Brown, Bob Dandy, Jim Durkee, Fred Hebel, Steve Johnson and Ralph Verne. Dandy, who was ineligible last year, could be State's best

horse expert. A junior transfer student from Wayne State, Hebel, is expected to give a good deal of depth to the high bar and parallel events.

Sophomores Johnson and Brown should push Shorr and Festa to even greater heights in the parallel bar and all-around classifications, Szypula believes. Giving strength to a somewhat weaker area are Durkee and Verne on the rings.

Freshman prospects Don Seaton, Jack Esmond, Jim Penrod, Gary Moreland, Bob Carman and Barry Smith will not be able to compete in Big 10 or NCAA meets until next year, but may participate in the Midwest open meet on Dec. 5 in Chicago.

The Spartans meet defending Big 10 champion, Illinois, at Champaign Feb. 6. Other top contests will be Jan. 23 against Minnesota and Feb. 12 against Iowa, both at East Lansing. Feb. 25 will find MSU pitted against traditional rival University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

Michigan State has had 10 All-Midwest soccer players since it began competing in the sport in 1956.

Dittrich Can Relax Now

Triple Win Concludes Season

The cross country season's "We've had it."

When Coach Fran Dittrich said, "We've had it," however, he said it like a man who is re-

laxing after a good meal.

The season concluded with a triple win of Big 10, IC4A and NCAA titles for the second year in a row. This was the fourth triple crown for MSU runners, but the first one two years in succession.

MSU won the first triple crown ever garnered by any university when it won the senior AAU, IC4A and NCAA trophies. Later the university joined the Big 10, so the team participated in that meet instead of the AAU.

The Spartans won their second triple crown in 1956, but placed second in the NCAA in 1957. Big 10, IC4A and NCAA team titles went to MSU in both 1958 and 1959.

State lost the individual title, though, when its defending champion Freddy Kennedy ran third to Houston's stars. Al Lawrence, a 26-year-old sophomore, holds the world's record for the indoor mile with an 8:46.8 time.

The first five places in the race went to foreign runners. Lawrence is from Sydney, Australia; Macy is a Polish refugee; Kennedy is from Scotland; fourth place Bill Reynolds of MSU is a Canadian and fifth place Tom O'Riordan of Idaho

State is from Ireland.

Other runners for MSU were Jerry Young, 11th place; Bob Lake, 20th; Clayton Ward, 25th; Tony Smith, 68th, and Ed Graydon, 83rd.

Though some of the performances weren't as good as expected, Dittrich said that they showed that every man can't run up to his potential each time he's out as he felt was done in the IC4A and Big 10 meets.

Out of 40 schools entered, 15 had full teams, as compared to last year's 14 full teams out of 27 schools entered. The finishers numbered 113.

The 52-degree temperature was the highest recorded on the day of a meet.

Dittrich was pleased to see such a big crowd, which he estimated to be around 1,500, at the meet. Gibbard said there were around 4,000 in the IC4A meet, but that was in New York. The pressure of a home crowd may have affected the runners somewhat, though, coupled with the week in-between races.

Houston placed second with 120 points to MSU's 44 points. The Texas university just had one man last year that finished 20th.

Bechinski Sidelined With Broken Nose

Richey May Start as Guard For Cage Squad in Opener

With the freshman-varsity game past history and the practice season rapidly coming to a close, Freddy Anderson is looking forward with a little skepticism to the 1959 season.

Anderson, recovering from a recent hernia operation, is having more troubles at the field house than he would like to handle. One of these is the absence of Jim Bechinski, from the line-up.

The first-string guard has not been to practice since he acquired a broken nose in the fresh game a week and a half ago. Coach Anderson said that it would be doubtful if Bechinski will start against Bowling Green in the opener Dec. 3.

Probable starter will be Dave Richey, Anderson said, although he has a height disadvantage, standing at only 5'9". Also being considered for the starting position is sophomore Art Schwarm, whose scrimmage performances have pleased Anderson.

In commenting on their chances for a repeat Big 10 title, Anderson said, "It is a long way off. We know that our problems are going to be double what they were last year. We do not go into any game that we do not believe that we can win. This is the way we will go into the season this year also."

"However," the coach said, "we will have to use all the facilities at our command in the way of coaching, practice and especially the support of the students."

Anderson was glad to see a crowd of over 6,000 at the freshman-varsity game. He said, "We hope we will be able to produce enough exciting basketball to keep the interest of the students this high all year long."

The main problem facing the 1959 squad at present is the lack of sufficient rough competition, according to Anderson. He hopes that the seven teams it plays prior to the Big 10 season may give it some of this competition.

Another problem Freddy has on his mind is the physical condition of the players. Many of them seem tired at practice but he thinks this can be overcome by next week.

Bobbitt and Eaton Win Frosh Honor

Monday night at a special meeting, the freshman graders voted on whom they felt was the most outstanding player on the team for this past season. This year's co-winners are Jim Bobbitt and Jim Eaton.

Applicants are not obligated until after they have accepted an appointment, said Anderson. One of several routes to an Air Force commission is the Officer Training School which offers a second lieutenant's commission after three months' schooling at Lackland Air Force Base, Tex. This opportunity is open to qualified men and women graduates regardless of the type of degree or major.

Anderson emphasized the Air Force interest in attracting women graduates into the WAF Officer Corps. WAF officers have interesting executive positions, are well paid and have plenty of interesting travel and social activity, he said.

Readmittance Possible

Flunk Out Policy Explained

Getting back into Michigan State after being withdrawn is fairly easy in the opinion of some students. However, the majority of these students are basing their beliefs on particular cases they can cite.

In a talk with Edward Carlin, Dean of the Basic College, it was discovered that this opinion for the most part is false.

If a student fails into any one of four categories, he is withdrawn. These are: any student with two F's and a D during one term; any student whose honor points fall 25 below C standing; students who reach junior standing and don't have a two point average; and those who fail to meet the requirements of readmittance.

A particular case was cited of a student who had had a 1.5 average for three straight terms

before he was withdrawn. At the end of fall term 1958 over 700 students were withdrawn but only 232 of these stayed out of school.

The rest can be broken up into several categories. Some were those who had reached junior status without a C. These students are usually readmitted for a term on probation for a chance to attain the C average.

The rest of the students fall under MSU's strange probation policy. Michigan State doesn't put students on probation when they get poor grades, they withdraw them from the University.

The philosophy of this probably is to throw a scare into the students so they will be ready to settle down and work when readmitted to the University.

This also gets the students to see the Dean of the Basic

College and explain any difficulties they might be having.

This policy is going to be changed in the future. The new policy will be one of telling the students that their grades are such that they can't be readmitted to school until they go in and talk to the Dean of Basic College.

According to Carlin, lack of maturity is the one biggest factor in "flunk-outs" and lack of intelligence is one of the lesser factors.

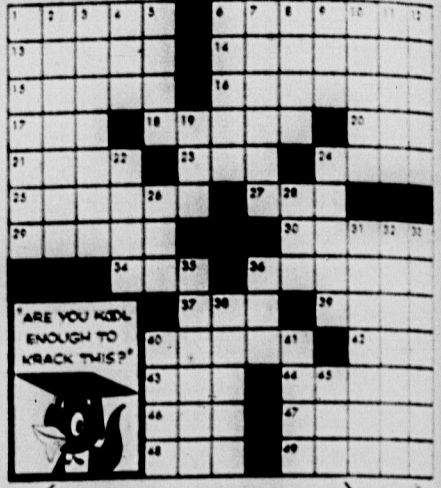
