## Controversy Rages

### Student Congress Ends Fall Term by Giving \$50 to Sparta Claus

The Student Congress closed out its fall term meeting Wednesday night by approving \$50 to Sparta Claus, the annual campus charity drive. The vote was 17-13 in favor of the appropriation. The motion was introduced by Bruce Plapp to give Sparta Claus \$100. Congress then agreed, via a roll call, to appropriate the \$50 to enable the organization to distribute Christmas baskets to needy families in the Lansing area. The vote resulted in a close 17-13 affirmative margin.

Bob Renbarger, president of the Vet's Club, who is sponsoring the event, appeared before Congress to request the appropriation. He said that the money should come in the form of a contribution that would reflect the spirit of giving of the entire university community.

"Something like this would also transmit a good picture to the citizens of the state of Michigan," he said.

Quickly countering for the negative side was Congressman Dave Gronauer who questioned the advisability of giving Sparta Claus the \$50 when Congress hadn't appropriated any money for its own charitable organization, Campus Chest.

"This is in conflict with the goals of student government," he said. "Congress is a legislative body and as such cannot take money that rightfully belongs to the student body and give it to any one particular charitable group."

In other action, Congress passed a bill to appropriate funds to the MSU UN Organization. The amount appropriated was \$100 and was granted with a comparative aura of peace prevailing.

Other legislation passed included a resolution to recommend the release of saboteurs, juniors, and seniors from dorm contracts at the end of any term. The resolution cites the presently crowded conditions in the dorms and alleges that fraternity, sorority, and co-op houses are in financial need of the possible revenue they would receive from housing more students.

A resolution to construct bicycle paths on campus was referred to the traffic committee. The statement suggested that when funds are made available to the university, the construction of bicycle paths should be given top priority.

Congress also called for an investigation by the U.S. Congress into the national need for compulsory ROTC. This would be the first statement made by Congress or the President concerning the national need for compulsory ROTC.

This resolution recommends that the U.S. Congress undertake an investigation to determine the national need for ROTC. This investigation, the resolutions further states, should be made public and reported to those institutions that have ROTC programs.

### Sparta Claus Charity Run Opens Today

Sparta Claus, campus Christmas charity drive, opens its second annual run today, bolstered by a \$50 donation from All-University Student Government and aiming to top last year's \$955.50 total.

The project, coordinated by Veterans Assn. and backed by several other campus groups, distributes Christmas food baskets to needy area families. Ninety-seven such gifts were presented in 1958.

Recipients are selected by the Lansing Christmas Clearing Bureau, which determines validity and degree of need.

"This is a worthy program," said President John A. Hannah, "being a direct contribution to deserving people in time of need."

Sparta Claus solicits contributions from individuals and organizations. Group donations are being taken beginning today from 2-3 p.m. in 334 Student Services. Individual collections will be taken in the Union, Berkeley and other central locations. Contributions will be accepted through final exams.

Bob Renbarger, president of Vets Assn. and chairman of the drive, said Sparta Claus hopes to double last year's number of gift baskets.

# Senate Passes Nuisance Taxes

## Ike Aims to Prove U. S. Peace Hopes

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower declared Wednesday the major aim of his 22,000-mile visit to 11 countries, beginning today, will be to prove to foreign peoples that the United States is a "good partner" in the search for a just peace.

Eisenhower told a news conference that "such prestige and standing as I have in the earth" will be used during his last year in office to carry out that theme.

The President is scheduled to leave Washington early this evening after making a broadcast to the nation about his 19-day journey. That trip will take him, at its furthest point, to four days of talks with Prime Minister Nehru of India, then bring him back to Paris for a Western Summit meeting Dec. 19-21.

Discussing the trip and other foreign issues at his meeting with newsmen, Eisenhower made these main points:

1. He has received medical clearance from his doctors who found in a physical examination three days ago that he was "capable of doing it." But he said his family is understandably concerned that he is "probably here and there taking on a load that he shouldn't."

2. Nehru is right in trying to settle the border dispute with Red China by negotiation and that China's leaders are wrong in using force.

3. The President will be prepared to discuss the border issue and other specific problems with Nehru, including hopeful signs of an improvement in relations between Pakistan and India.

4. He will discuss other specific problems as he visits other capitals and everywhere will emphasize the need to resolve issues by negotiation rather than force.

## Cagers Set To Defend Big 10 Title

Michigan State's Big 10 defending basketball champions will face their first challenge of the 1959-60 season tonight in Jenison Fieldhouse when they meet Bowling Green State.

Coach Fordy Anderson has only two starters back from his great club of last year. They are co-captains Horace Walker and Lance Olson, a pair of forwards who stand 6-3 and 6-4 respectively.

Others rounding out the starting five are center Art Gowens, 6-2 and guard, Dave Pabs, 5-9. The fifth spot on the squad is presently up for grabs due to a broken nose suffered by Jim Bechinski, a 6-2 guard. Dave Richey, 5-8, may play if Bechinski hasn't fully recovered by game time.

Leading the Falcons is Jimmy Barrow, an All-American candidate at guard last year. Barrow also led the squad in scoring with a 21.1-point average. The Falcons have seven lettermen returning, four of which have seen extensive action to date.

Bowling Green is defending champion of the Mid-America conference and finished the 1958-59 season with an 18-8 record.

The Spartans will get little rest after tonight's game. Notre Dame will be facing them Saturday evening.

Bowling Green opened its season with a bang Tuesday night by swamping Hilldale 99-31.

This will be the Falcons' first start against a Big 10 school.

The Spartans will be facing another "Anderson coached" team. Bowling Green is directed by Harold Anderson, in his 18th season as head coach of the Falcons.

Notre Dame, Saturday's opponent, has seven letter winners returning from the club which posted a 12-23 record in 1958 under coach Johnny Jordan.

Leading the Irish will be Capt. Mike Graney at guard. Big man on the Notre Dame team is John Tully, a 6-7 center.

## Summit Meet Hope Grows In Paris Talks

PARIS (AP)—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, ending two days of talks with President Charles de Gaulle, came out Wednesday for an East-West summit meeting in Paris late next April.

The West German leader announced he and De Gaulle were agreed on all important issues. But he did not say whether the French President agreed with him on a time and place for a summit meeting.

De Gaulle has been talking about a top-level meeting in the spring after Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev visits Paris in March. This has annoyed the British, who want a summit meeting sooner. Geneva previously has been mentioned as a likely site.

Asked at a news conference about the best time and place for a summit conference, Adenauer replied "I think in the second half of April in Paris."

Adenauer declined to go into details of his discussions with De Gaulle and Premier Michel Debre.

## Few First Nighters View Moving Drama

The opening night of a world premier is not usually avoided by theater-goers; it seems strange that less than fifty people attended the first night of "Face of a Stranger." The absentees missed not only something to tell their grandchildren, but a deeply moving dramatic experience.

The play concerns the search of a mid-nineteenth century Italian immigrant for artistry as well as craftsmanship in his work as a furniture maker. The Faust theme enters the plot when he almost barbers his daughter to the devil in exchange for his yearned-for creative ability. At the last moment he destroys his Satonic bonds to regain the real beauty of his life, his daughter.

Pauline Schmoekler, the author of the play, has succeeded in successfully re-creating her ancient theme in somewhat more tangible terms than we are used to. The substitution of a human life for the abstraction of the soul, however, and the subsequent resolution change the form of the play from high tragedy to high melodrama. But the dramatic effectiveness of the theme remains virtually unchanged.

Both the arena and the stage of the Kiva are used by the cast. This combination utilizes the advantages of both a regular stage and theater-in-the-round. The ultra-modern surroundings of the building set against the

1850 household interior, however, rob the period furniture, etc. of some of their importance.

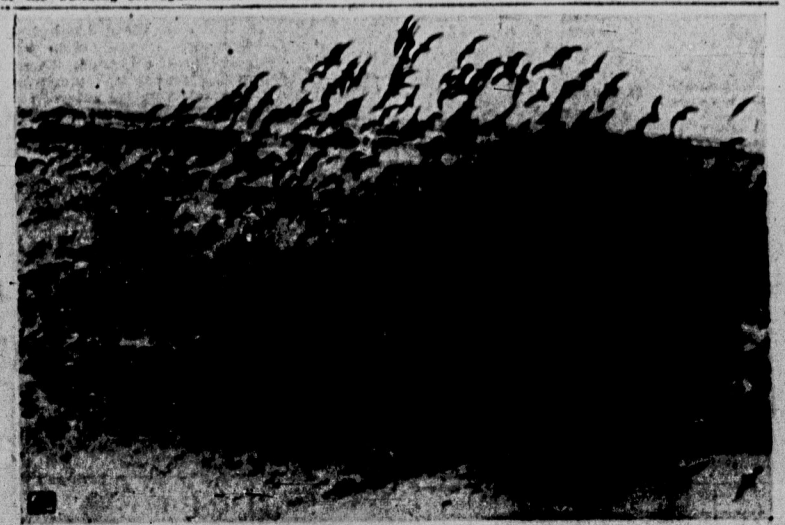
The characters number only six: Pino, the furniture-maker; Angela, his daughter; Rosa, his blind mother; Phillip, Angela's fiancée; Luigi, Phillip's father; and Nicolla, the devil.

In so small a cast, it is difficult to single out the outstanding members. But three appeared to give exceptional performances: Bernard Tate as Pino, the tormented craftsman; JoAnn Roe as Rosa, his nagging mother who gives amazing authenticity to her part as a blind woman; and Robert Weiss, as the devil, a master of Satonic nuances, who performs admirably in an extremely difficult non-speaking role.

There were, however, shortcomings in the acting. On several occasions, lines with real impact lacked adequate emphasis. But the action never lagged, and the two climaxes were handled brilliantly.

The first comes at the close of the second act, when the audience is assured that Nicolla is the devil himself. Not having uttered a sound on stage as yet, he exits slowly, chuckling, and finally shrieking, insanely, as a red spotlight leaves his infernal glow in his features.

The other takes place when Pino emerges, agonized, but triumphant, from Nicolla's room, after hacking his beloved creations, the symbols of his underworld ties, to bits.

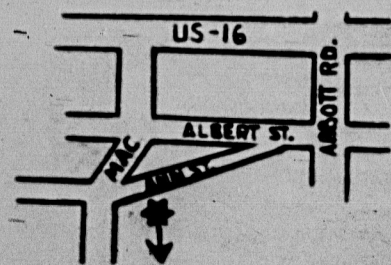
