A FLOATING MOUNTAIN OF ICE—This iceberg, which Sir Ernest Shackleton called "Rampart Berg," drifted north for twelve months with the Endurance and the expedition's camp on a drifting floe, and often seemed on the point of plowing its way through the ice and destroying the ship and all concerned. Finally a sudden change in the drift caused the iceberg to wander out farther to sea.

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
