

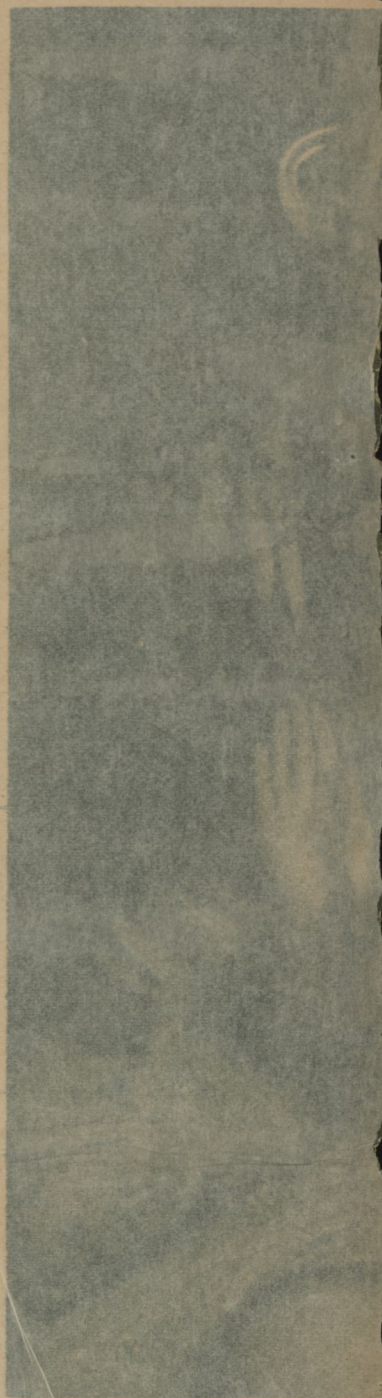
IN THE LIMELIGHT

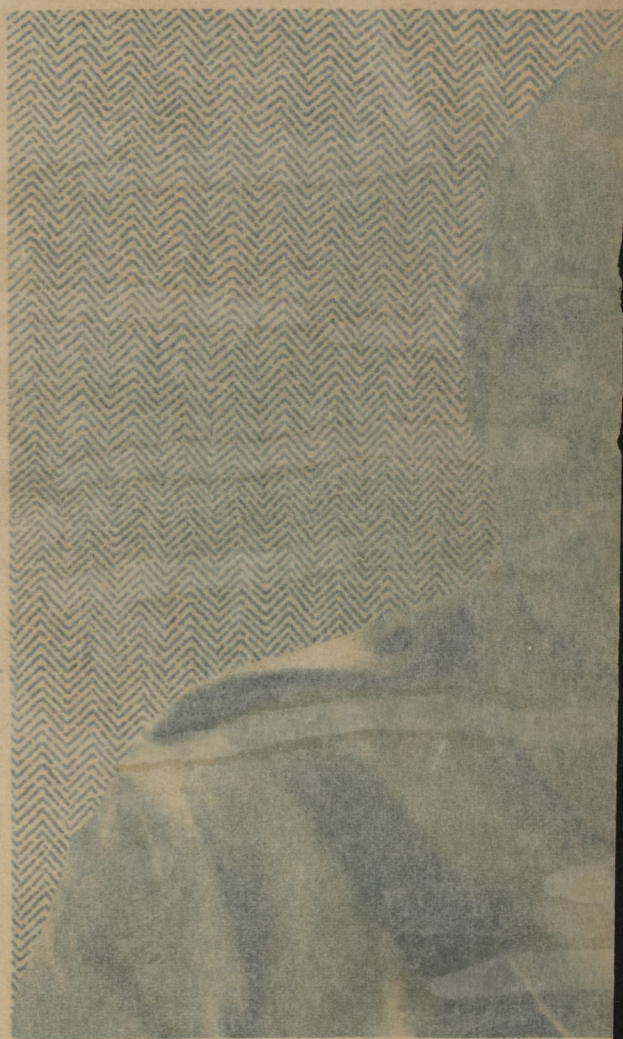
