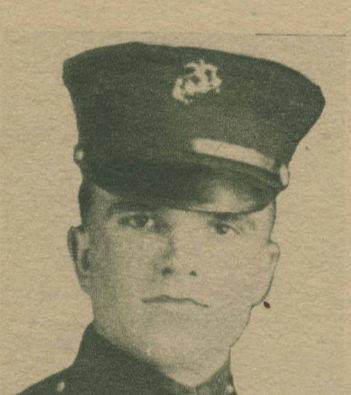
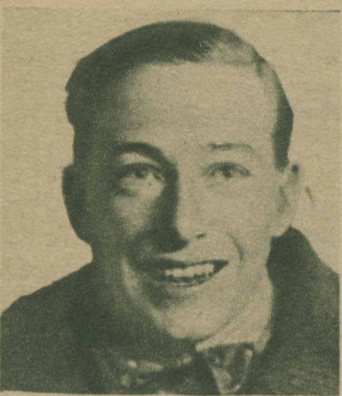
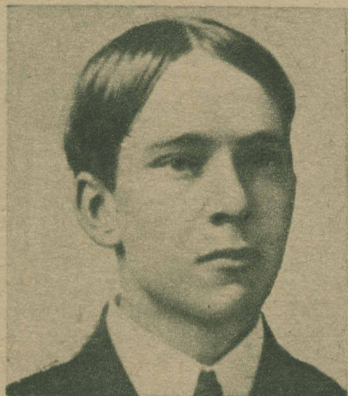


# FIGHTING FAMILIES
