Business Men Join
to Rout Old Idea of
"Back of the Yards"

"Back of the yards" does not mean "whisky row" and streets of sordid homes and cheap shops. It means a great business community, with banks having \$20,000,000 on deposit, many large factories, progressive business houses, smart shops, a \$300,000 theater, and many other things that the rest of Chicago knows little about.

An organization dinner to eliminate the "back of the yards" idea forever was held last night at the Swift club, Forty-first street and Michigan avenue. The dinner was given by the Stockyards Community Clearing House to business men of the southwest district, including the Forty-seventh Street Business Men's association, Fifty-first Street association, Ashland Avenue association, and some from west of Western avenue.

The new organization will be called the Stockyards Business Men's Civic association, and will include women, several of whom were at the dinner.

Hartley Laycock, cashier of the People's bank, was elected president; Felix Janowski, former alderman of the Twenty-ninth ward, was elected vice president.

The organization adopted bylaws and promises to be an effective working force for the betterment of the district, the promotion of business and good legislation, improvement of business methods, the increase of friendship and cooperation.

Lutheran Leader
Tells Causes of
Crisis in Germany

"The causes of the collapse of the Weimar government are the increasing economic strain and the attempt of the entente to try German leaders for war responsibility."

The Rev. G. Pandrey, delegate to the National Lutheran council, which will open its two-day meeting here today, offers this explanation of the crisis in Germany. Dr. Pandrey was a member of the commission sent to Europe by the Lutheran council last summer to study conditions.

The board of claimants of the Methodist church, at its annual meeting yesterday at the Hotel La Salle, made the 1920 apportionments for the 7,500 pensioned Methodist ministers and their wives and children. The amount required is \$15,000,000.

Washington Valentine
Succumbs to Operation

New York, March 17.—Washington S. Valentine, financier and founder of numerous Latin-American business enterprises, died in Atlantic City following an operation for a complication of diseases. Funeral services will be held here next Saturday.

He founded the Honduras syndicate with John Jacob Astor, Chauncey Depew, Seward Webb, and others.

In 1907 Mr. Valentine began work on a plan to merge South and Central American countries into one great body for the betterment of all Pan-America. The principal result of this was to develop the Central American peace conference, which was conducted in Washington by the United States and Mexican governments.

MRS. MINNIE BRENNER KENT, widow of William D. Kent, commissioner of public works under the late Mayor Swift, died yesterday at her residence, 1429 Congress street. She was the daughter of Matthias Brenner, who was fire marshal at the time of the Chicago fire.

CHARLES HAFNER, president of the Charles Hafner company, boiler manufacturers, who died at his home in Riverside on Tuesday, will be buried tomorrow at Oakwoods cemetery. Mr. Hafner came to Chicago in 1862 and was the oldest member of the Pleiades lodge No. 478, A. F. & A. M.

JAMES GLASS, father of Assistant District Attorney James R. Glass, died on Tuesday in the family home at 4536 Forestville avenue. He was a retired baker and a Chicagoan since 1869.

CHARLES E. McLENNAN, 62, librarian of the Milwaukee Public library, died yesterday following a stroke of apoplexy.
