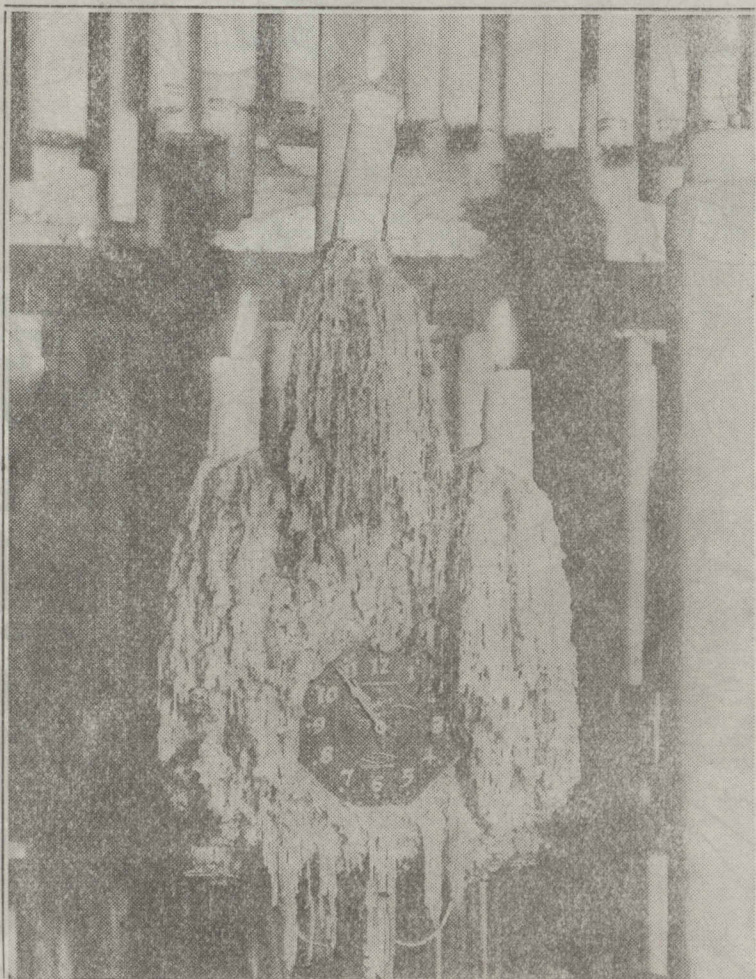

"IT'S A BOY!" Well-what then? After the tiny red wrinkled countenance of the new arrival has been inspected with awe and wonder comes the momentous problem - "What shall we name the baby?"

Family councils, knitted brows, inspirations and denunciations, decisions and indecisions. It's practically eternal this debate. Each generation has its own distinctive ideas about appropriate monickers for its offspring, and cycles of fashions in names are as vivid in reviews of history as cycles of fashions in clothes.

Fond mothers are far more frequently inspired to name girl babies after their heroines than boys after popular heroes. Thus the career of Florence Nightingale in the Crimean war inspired whole flocks of Florences; the publication of a best seller, "St. Elmo," led to a crop of Ednas, named for the heroine, Edna Earl; while Ellen Terry and Sarah Bernhardt were similarly commemorated. But Theodore Roosevelt, Ulysses S. Grant and other public men had comparatively few namesakes.

Other names come and go, but Mary, like Tennyson's brook, runs on forever. The most plausible explanation is that it is the name of the mother of Christ. And the interesting fact in that connection is that historic research indicates that there were women of that name long prior to the era of Mary of Bethlehem and Nazareth. Aaron and Moses with being the original Mary or at least with the first historical mention of the name. She it was who led the songs of the Israelites when they saw their enemies dead upon the seashore.

One historian, Gesenius, states

that this name, derived from Meri (stubbornness) so as to make it mean the rebellion of the children of Israel. Other commentators refer it to the word Marah (bitterness), and thence to the bitter gum, myrrh.

The first known Elizabeth was

Aaron's wife, Elisheba, meaning "God hath sworn"; i. e., an appeal to his covenant. A Muscovite Princess Elisavetta was wooed by the romantic King Harald Hardrada of Norway, who composed nineteen ballads in her honor, thus perpetuating the name in the northern peninsula, as Elsebin, Lisbet, or Helsa.

In different languages Elizabeth varies thus:

English: Elizabeth, Eliza, Bessy, Betsey, Betty, Lizzy, Libby, Lisa.

German: Elisabeth, Elise, Lise, Lischen, Elisabet, Elsbabe.

Danish: Elisabeth, Elsebin, Helsa.

French: Elisabeth, Elise, Babet, Babette, Babichon.

Italian: Elisabetta, Elisa, Betta, Bettina, Lisettina.

The popular John reads thus:

English—John; Scotch, Welsh—Jan; Gaelic—Jan; Erse—Shawn; German—Johannes; Danish—Johan; Dutch—Jan; Belgian—Jehan; Swiss—Johan; Spanish—Juan; Italian—Giovanni; Russian—Ivan; Lithuanian—Jonas.

NAMES AND THEIR ORIGINS

ANNA, one of the most ancient names, had its origin in the Hebrew word Chanach, signifying grace or mercy. The first known Hannah was the mother of Samuel in the Old Testament. Both the Greek and the Romans used it.

Variations include Nancy (Eng.); Annette, Nanon, Ninon, Ninette (Fr.); Anita (Sp.); Annica (It.); Annchen (Ger.).

Adelaide—a German name meaning noble cheer. Believed to originate in the universal word atta, meaning a father. Another form is Adelheit. Heit, translated as the root of the German word cheer, and combined with atta, gives the significance, (noble) father's cheer.

Variations are Elsie, Adela (Eng.), Alice, Adeline and Aline (Ger.).

Alfred—comes from Elberich, the fabled king of the elves. Alfr as he was known in England and Germany, belongs to the sagas of the Vikings. After the introduction of Christianity all these familiar spirits became a forgotten phase of life.

Albert—an English name, meaning nobly bright. It is derived from the Teutonic name Ethelbert. The prefixes Aethel, Ethel, Athel, Adel or Edel signified noble. From this comes Albert into the French and English, Alberto into Italian, and Adalbert into the German lists of masculine names.

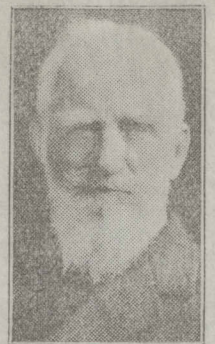
HEALTH
