




The Bank's first building, Clark and Lake streets, occupied

July 1, 1863.




Second building of the First National Bank, State and Washington streets, built in 1868 and restored after the great fire of 1871.

These new quarters facing Dearborn, Monroe and Clark Streets are finished in white marble, bronze and mahogany and afford every facility for the transaction of financial business.






Third building, of typical Romanesque architecture, was erected at Dearborn and Monroe streets in 1882.
