
Strike War and Spanish War



WHEN EMBATTLED FARMERS CAME TO GRIPS WITH 500 SITDOWN STRIKERS in the Hershey, Pa., plant of the Hershey Chocolate corporation, fifty persons were injured; the strikers were beaten, captured, and run through a gantlet of missils. Causes of the battle: Farmers' resentment over loss of their milk market, strikers' failure to comply with a nonstriker ultimatum to evacuate the plant.
