

FREE CITY CLINIC GIVING NEW HOPE TO TUBERCULARS

Real Progress Shown in 6 Months' Operation.

The new public tuberculosis clinic, opened six months ago in the old Iroquois Memorial hospital, 23 North Wacker drive, which at that time was called a new hope for thousands, is justifying the prediction, according to Dr. Allan H. Hirshy, secretary of the board of directors of the Municipal Tuberculosis sanitarium, which conducts the clinic.

Positive Progress Shown. "Almost 60 per cent of the 1,973 have assurance now that the tuberculosis ulcers in their lungs are healing," explained Dr. Hirshy.

"The clinic was opened so that the tubercular patients in Chicago whose disease was advancing, sometimes even to death, while they waited to get into the municipal sanitarium and other charitable institutions, would have a break.

There is no waiting list at the clinic and will not be, according to Dr. E. P. Troy, superintendent of the dispensary for the sanitarium.

The record of one patient was obtained. It was that of a man who on Oct. 14 suffered from an advanced case of pulmonary tuberculosis.

Now his temperature is normal, he weighs 165 pounds, he has been germ free since Jan. 17, and his cough has gone.

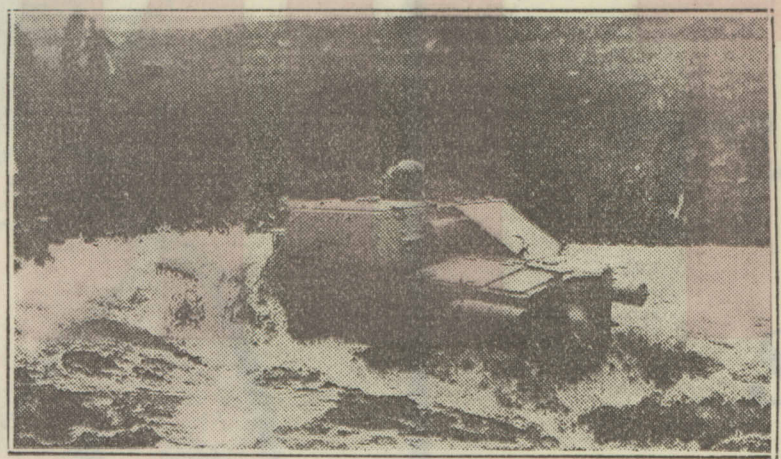
Mrs. H. A. Wiley, 50 Years Chicago Resident, Is Dead

DRY ERA TAX CLAIMS AROUSE CANADA DEALERS

Washington, D. C., April 25.—(AP)—Conferees have been started secretly here, to settle troubles arising from a threat to bar shipments of liquor into this country by four Canadian concerns, unless they pay taxes on whisky sent across the United States border during prohibition.

The negotiations began last Monday. The Canadian government had protested against a bill pending in the house to ban imports from liquor concerns against which tax claims have been filed, unless those concerns agree to submit the tax claims to the courts.

The discussions then began between treasury and justice department officials with representatives of the Canadian liquor concerns. The treasury tonight refused to give any information, except to admit the conferees were now in progress, though the names of the Canadian

concerns and the amounts were disclosed. Representative Robert L. Doughton (Dem., N. C.) had introduced an administration measure, which was opposed by Canada after liquor interests there said such a law greatly would reduce exports of whisky to the United States, their best customer.

The Canadian protest was understood to have pointed out that the recent reciprocal trade treaty pledged equality of treatment to Canadians that would be violated by the proposed law.

Under the trade pact the duty on Canadian whiskeys was reduced to \$2.50 a gallon, which caused a large increase in sales to the United States.
