

ALL FAITHS JOIN VAST FESTIVAL OF FREE RELIGION

Pageant and Masque Will
Climax Ceremonies.

A program for a vast festival of religion with a Soldiers' field pageant and masque as a climax in September was announced yesterday by a civic committee headed by Judge John P. McGorty of the Superior court. The committee includes members of all faiths.

Judge McGorty emphasized the need for a demonstration of religious faith which goes beyond individual creeds and which recognizes the right of varying groups to religious freedom as guaranteed by the American bill of rights.

"I doubt if any city in the world could project such a program as our civic committee has set in motion," said Judge McGorty. "We have been thinking of this festival and dramatic pageant in comprehensive terms which, I suppose, no other city of our own country has yet dared to contemplate."

Will Bespeak City's Destiny.
"The festival and pageant will reflect the city's spiritual devotion and bespeak, under God, its destiny. We live in troubled times when spiritual keynotes of divine fatherhood and human brotherhood need greatest emphasis."

The executive committee announced by Judge McGorty includes the following lay leaders representing various creeds and faiths: Fred W. Sargent, Methodist Episcopal; Otto C. Rentner, Evangelical Lutheran Missouri synod; Alexander O. Ram-

lose, United Lutheran synod; Leo A. Ryan, Arthur J. Hughes, and Edward J. Mehren, Catholic; John Balaban, Col. A. H. Rosenberg, and Charles Weinfeld, Jewish. Mr. Rentner announced that a nonprofit charter is being issued by the state of Illinois to conduct the festival.

Invitations to become members of the committee were sent yesterday to the city and suburbs. Judge McGorty said. Clerical leaders of all faiths will be unofficial consultants concerning the festival, he added. No church is officially represented in the committee which will be entirely composed by laymen, he pointed out. Offices have been opened at 33 North La Salle street.

Affirmation of Faith.
"We wish to undergird the work of all representative faiths and stimulate laymen into greater church and synagogue activity," Judge McGorty explained. The project grew in the minds of laymen who desire to perform a civic service of elemental importance. Our economic and social problems arise from unfaith. The

festival will be Chicago's affirmation of renewed faith."

Judge McGorty said Bishop George Craig Stewart of the Episcopal church will direct a field demonstration at the festival dramatizing the world conference on faith and order and life and work of the churches to be held this summer in Edinburgh, Scotland, and Oxford, England. Bishop Stewart will be aided by the Episcopal Church Club of Chicago, organization of laymen.

The Dominican fathers at the Dominican House of Studies, River Forest, have accepted the committee's proposal for a service to signalize not only the centenary jubilee of Chicago's incorporation as a city, but also the beatification of Martin de Porres, which occurred in 1837. Process toward canonization of Martin de Porres will be conducted by the Dominican order. This service will also feature the social justice encyclicals of Pope Leo XIII. and Pope Pius XI. Judge McGorty said.

Other Groups Invited.
Other groups have been invited to

participate in the festival. A Jewish Sabbath evening observance, where celebrated rabbis and cantors will take part, is proposed. Walter R. Mee, executive secretary of the Chicago Church federation, plans a series of centennial services at the festival in cooperation with the Sunday Evening club.

The pageant and masque at the climax of the festival in September, Judge McGorty announced, is now in preparation. A cast of 5,000 persons is to be recruited from public and parochial schools, church institutions, hospitals, seminaries, and universities, he said.

Marcus Bach of the Rockefeller Foundation, noted dramatist, has been called by the committee to write the script and evolve the drama. He is being assisted by a group of unofficial consultants, including Dr. Solomon Goldman, author of the 1933 Jewish pageant at a Century of Progress; the Rev. Dr. James A. Magner of Quigley Preparatory seminary, and the Rev. Dr. Fred Eastman of Chicago Theological seminary.

ESTIMATE MAY 1 MOVING DAY WILL BREAK RECORDS

About 40,000 Chicago families will move during the May 1 moving period—probably the largest number since 1930—according to an estimate made yesterday by Fred M. Loris, president of the Chicago Real Estate board. His estimate is based on requests to service companies for changes in addresses of installations. The Peoples Gas Light and Coke company reports that these have been more numerous than at any other time in the last 15 years.

Mr. Loris said part of the increase in moving is due to higher rents.

Dan Healy, secretary of the Movers' Association of Chicago, and William O'Brien, secretary of the Van Movers' union, reported moving companies had been swamped with orders, which Healy said were heavier than in any other of the 13 years he has been with the association. He also said rates this year would be a little higher.

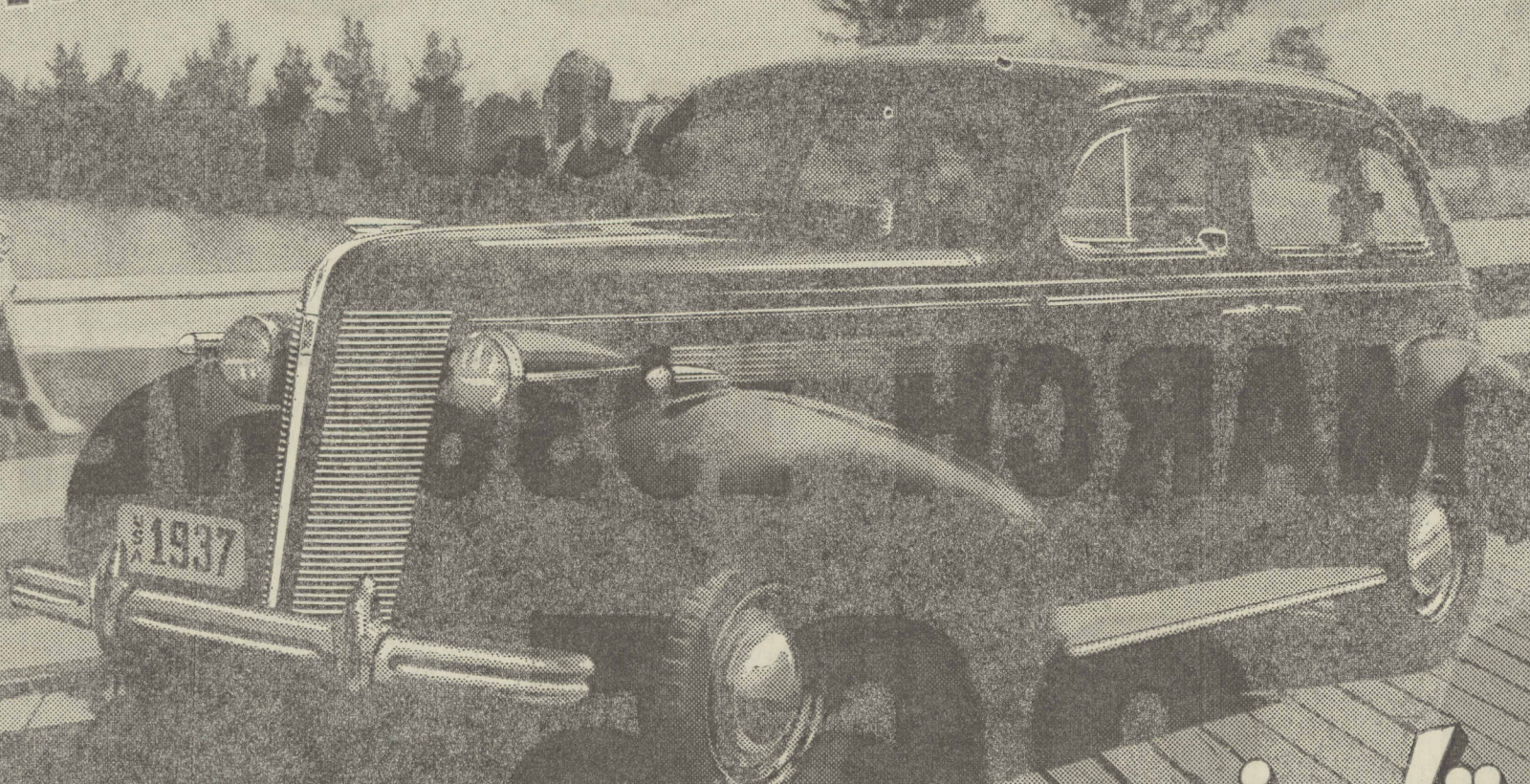
MOTHER OF BABY, AMNESIA VICTIM, SHOOTS HERSELF
