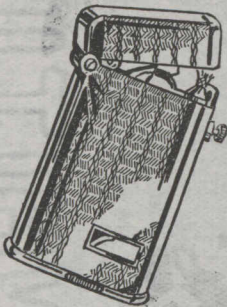

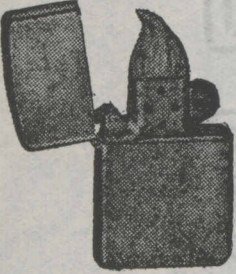

LAST OF POKER BANDITS SOUGHT AS TWO CONFESS

Fugitive Implicated in Triple Slaying

Police began a search yesterday for Albert Horodecki, 25, of 1722 Erie st., after two confessed bandits named him as one of the participants in a poker game robbery attempt, in which

Those who confessed and implicated Horodecki are Edward Stanislawski, 17, of 1521 Thomas st., and Alfred Puziewicz, 24, of 1341 Bauwans st.

Host Is Slain

The double murder occurred May 18 in the apartment of Albert Fineberg at 3929 Adams st. Fourteen couples were playing poker and other games when three men entered. In a fight which followed, George Stanislawski, 32, one of the bandits, was slain. He was a brother of Edward. Also killed were Fineberg, the party host, and Benjamin Eisenstein, a guest and Municipal court bailiff.

Edward Stanislawski surrendered to police June 3, but denied involvement in the crime. Two nights ago Capt. Philip Breitake, Sgt. Peter McGuire, and a squad arrested Puziewicz, reportedly on information from Stanislawski.

Yesterday Puziewicz confessed at the detective bureau. He said he only drove the bandit car, and did not participate in the fatal holdup attempt. Stanislawski, informed of his pal's statement, then also confessed.

Story Is Told

This is the substance of Stanislawski's story:

The brothers picked up Puziewicz and Horodecki to aid them in the holdup. Puziewicz remained in the car. The Stanislawskis and Horodecki invaded the party. George Stanislawski and Horodecki had guns. Edward heard shots, and saw several men beating his brother, then heard, but did not see Horodecki's gun being discharged.

Edward Stanislawski and Horodecki fled, Horodecki, in the confusion, picking up the fallen gun of Bailiff Eisenstein. When they separated, Horodecki gave Stanislawski Eisenstein's gun, saying, "I'm hot, and going to get out of town." The gun was recovered yesterday.

House Beats Move to Put FEPC Bill on Calendar

Springfield, Ill., June 9—The house today defeated an effort to put on its calendar a bill to create a fair employment practice commission to work against discrimination. The 45 to 40 vote supported the judiciary committee's recommendation for defeat of the bill.

JURY PONDER'S FATE OF CHURCH 'URGE SLAYER'

Death Penalty Urged for Pastor's Son

St. Joseph, Mo., June 9 [Special]—A jury of 11 men and one woman tonight began deliberating the guilt or innocence of Stuart B. Allen, 16, adopted son of an Episcopal minister, in the "urge to kill" slaying last April 1 of John A. Frank, 58, church sexton.

The death penalty, which in Missouri is administered in a gas chamber, was demanded by the state in final arguments while defense counsel asserted Allen is insane and should be placed in an institution as "permanently dangerous."

Circuit Judge Du Val Smith instructed the jurors to bring in one of five possible verdicts: Guilty with the death penalty; guilty with life imprisonment; not guilty by reason of insanity at the time of the crime; not guilty by reason of still existing insanity, and not guilty.

Two Chances for Freedom

Either an unconditional not guilty verdict or a verdict of not guilty

reason of insanity at the time of the crime would free Allen, it was said. A verdict of not guilty by reason of still existing insanity, which the defense asked, would result in his commitment to a mental institution.

Judge Smith refused a defense request that the jury be instructed an "irresistible impulse" is indicative of insanity.

Assistant Prosecutor William H. Kimberlin told the jurors imposition of the death penalty was the only method by which they could make certain Allen is never again admitted to society.

Charges Boy Was Spoiled
Kimberlin said Allen had been spoiled "to the nth degree" by his foster parents, the Rev. and Mrs.

James Allen, asserting that at 14 the boy had charge accounts and a \$50 a month allowance. The Rev. Mr. Allen is rector of Christ Episcopal church, scene of the slaying.

Frank was beaten to death with a hammer in the church basement and his body punctured several times with an electric drill. A signed confession by Allen that he killed the sexton in obedience to an "urge to kill" which came over him while playing the church organ, was admitted in evidence.
