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## BRITAIN PLANS TO SPLIT PALESTINE IN THREE STATES

Take Steps to Ward Off Arab Revolt.

LONDON, July 5.—The British admiralty's dispatch of the warship Repulse to Palestine and the readiness of troops there to face trouble coincided today with the cabinet's meeting to discuss the royal commission's report embodying recommendations to solve the Arab-Jewish problem in Palestine.

The report, which is due for publication Thursday, advocates a division of Palestine into three parts, according to political sources here. There would be a Jewish state, an Arab state, and an area under permanent British mandate.

**Both Sides Oppose Scheme.**  
Advices from Palestine indicate that both Arabs and Jews vigorously oppose the commission's recommendations and Arab Nationalists are threatening to break out in armed rebellion as they did last year.

Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchop, high commissioner for Palestine, is under instructions to impose martial law at the first signs of disturbances.

[The grand mufti of Jerusalem, spiritual leader of Palestine Arabs and an opponent of the British plan, yesterday presided over a meeting of the Arab higher committee which directed last year's general strike against Jewish immigration and sale of land to Jews.]

The proposed new Jewish state, according to authoritative sources to-night, would comprise the whole of upper and lower Galilee, the vale of Jezreel, the greater part of Beisan, and all the coastal plain from Rasen-Nakurah in the north to Beer-Tuvia in the south.

ing frontier of Palestine along the southern boundary of Lebanon to the Mediterranean to Syria and would continue along the present frontier of Syria, along the Jordan and sea of Galilee by the outfall of the Jordan down to a point north of the town of Beisan.

**Jews to Have Coastal Plain.**  
In the west the boundary would run along the south of the vale of Jezreel to Megiddo, then south along the edge of the coastal plain in the foothills with an arc to exclude Tulkarem.

The Jewish settlement in Transjordan, it is reported, would be included in the Arab state. Haifa would belong to the Jewish state.

The Jewish state thus planned would contain 225,000 Arabs and besides the Arab population of Safed, Acre, Haifa, and Tiberias. These towns, which are part of the Jewish state, would for some time remain under a temporary British mandate and the Arab population would not be obliged to assume Jewish citizenship as long as the mandate existed.

**Permanent British Mandate.**

The report, it is learned, also recommends that Britain should receive a new permanent mandate over the cities of Jerusalem, Bethlehem, Nazareth and over the corridor from Jerusalem to Jaffa covering the area between the Jaffa-Jerusalem road and the Jerusalem-Jaffa railroad.

The Arab towns of Ludd and Ramleh would be included in the mandate. The town of Jaffa would be part of the Arab state. Under the mandate would be included also a part of the southern area bordering on the gulf of Akaba. The rest of the country together with Transjordan would form the new Arab state.

For the establishment of these two independent states the British government would conclude treaties with representatives of the Arabs on one side and the Zionist organization on the other. The Arab state would receive a grant of \$10,000,000 for the transfer of the Arab population.

## SYPHILIS PERIL TO YOUTH TOLD BY DR. PARRAN

U. S. Surgeon General Is Congress Speaker.

Milwaukee, Wis., July 5.—[Special.]—Syphilis is a youth problem, Dr. Thomas Parran Jr., surgeon general of the United States department of health advised the social hygiene committee of the American Youth congress today. Ten thousand victims each year are less than 15 years old, he stated. Half of the syphilis acquired in the United States each year is contracted by persons under 25 years old and while the incidence of gonorrhea has not been tabulated as exactly as syphilis, it is well known, Dr. Parran said, the means of infection are comparable for the two diseases.

As a primary step toward a remedy, Dr. Parran recommended that pupils in the latter years of high school receive a course of scientific instruction not only on biology and sex but on the diagnosis of the two venereal scourges.

**Cases Reduced by Half.**

A message from Dr. Parran revealing the latest factual information on the prevalence of syphilis was read to the committee by Dr. C. A. Harper, Wisconsin health officer, principal

speaker who also described how Wisconsin by nearly 20 years of marriage law enforcement and universal diagnosis has reduced the prevalence of syphilis in the state by one-half.

Dr. Parran's message described a recent one day survey of all recognized sources of treatment in 50 areas in the United States.

"The fact that so many adolescents and young adults acquire syphilis indicates a grave need for teaching not only the biologic facts of life to all individuals about the time of puberty but also to let students, particularly in the latter years of high school, know the simple facts with regard to the diagnosis and treatment of the two diseases," Dr. Parran's message explained.

"Too often the health officer's educational activities come at a time after the individual has been infected. Agencies not primarily responsible for health work must cooperate in the prevention of communicable diseases if they are to be controlled effectively."

**"The Greatest Vocation."**  
Wisconsin, Dr. Harper said, has for eighteen years had two staff members of the state board of health who have given instructions on venereal diseases in 416 of the 430 high schools of the state.

The Youth committee approved three resolutions which were presented by Maj. Bascom Johnson, legal adviser of the American Social Hygiene association.

"Marriage," Maj. Johnson commented, "is the greatest vocation in life and marriage is the vocation for which American youth is least prepared."

The resolution adopted endorsed the purpose of modern laws which require blood tests to determine the absence of venereal diseases from both applicants for marriage licenses; they endorsed state public health service, based on the New York law as a model. The law provides free treatment for indigent patients and for an expanding health service.

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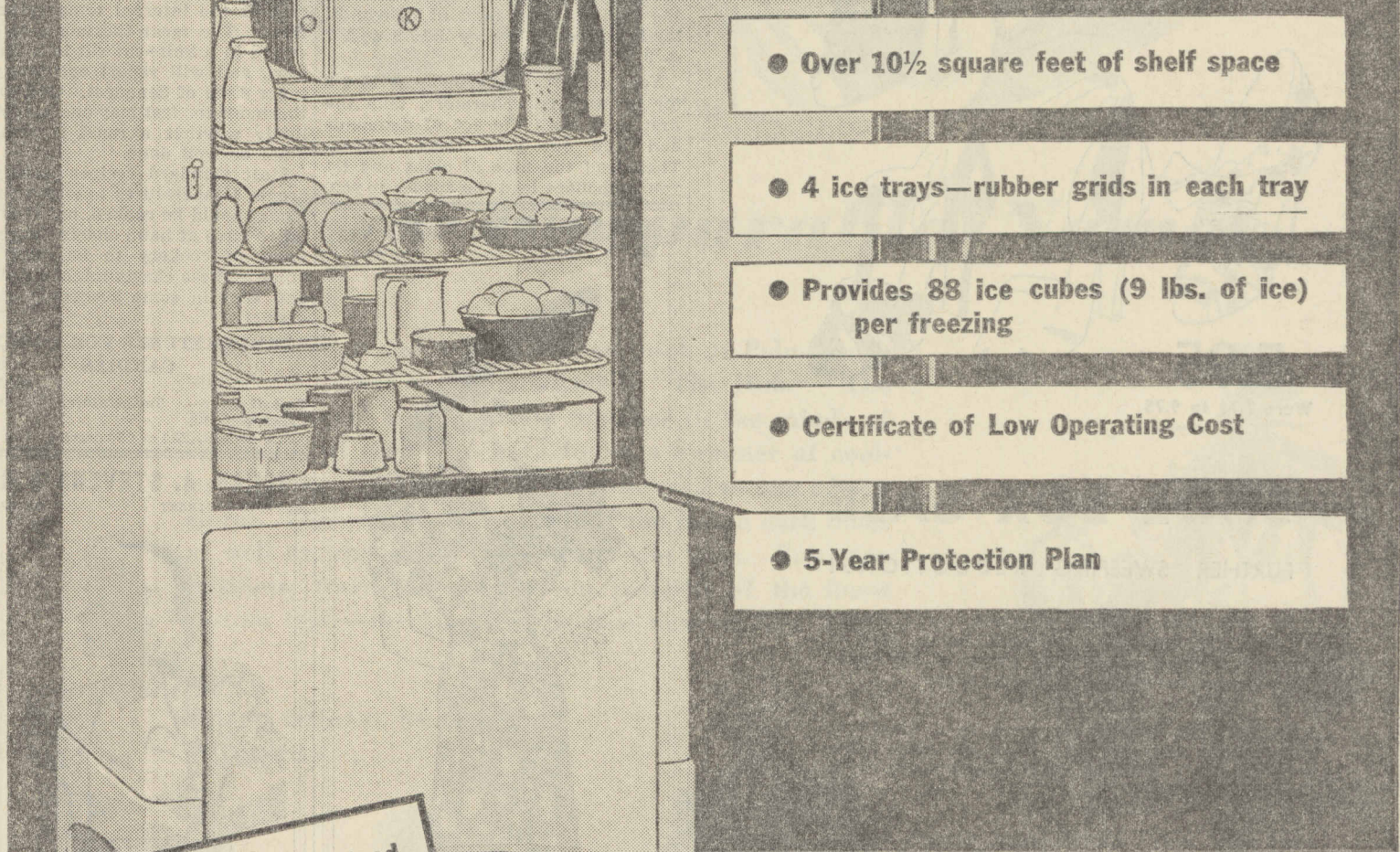
